Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

The Rotary Clubs of Apple Valley, Minnesota, USA (International Club) and Lucea, Jamaica (Host Club) will outfit and equip a dental laboratory, provide two mobile dental buses, and perhaps more excitingly implement an oral hygiene preventative care education program in Jamaica's remote rural communities. The busses will be an equipment, supplies, and people mover to simultaneously operate five dental clinics.(clinics are sometimes an hour apart from each other) Mobile technology equipment will provide upgraded oral treatments and impressions for patient dentures. Oral impressions will be transported to the lab at the University of Technology dental school in Kingston for processing.

This Rotary Global Grant will have a major impact in rural Jamaica. This area is considered the second poorest region in the Western Hemisphere. Up to 80% of the dental patients have never received any type of dental treatment. Research has

shown that individuals with dental diseases are at a 300% greater risk of developing heart disease and other life threatening

diseases. Many patients receiving oral treatments have several missing teeth, or no teeth at all. This Rotary grant will provide

dentures and partials for those patients. The mobile technology will provide Jamaicans with additional oral treatments.

The grant will provide dental hygiene education and supplies at the dental clinics. Dental students will receive an opportunity to

participate in the Kingston lab to process dentures. This project ensures sustainability of disease

prevention and a long term economic impact, as dental graduates provide services in Jamaica. Patients receiving dentures,

with great pride, can seek employment in the tourist industry, wearing that life-changing smile.

Dr. Myron Henrickson and his son Dr. Michael Henrickson, and charter member, Joseph Sterling of Apple Valley Rotary have made several personal mission trips to Jamaica, volunteering their professional dentistry time with the dental staff of Henrickson

Dental Clinic in Maplewood, MN. Inspired by their leadership, the Apple Valley Rotary Club and other District 5950 & 5960

Rotary Clubs, along with Lucea Rotary Club are launching this exciting project. Pledges from 12 Rotary Clubs are listed in

this application. Presentations were made at District 5950 clubs by Joseph Sterling and Dr. Myron Hendrickson.

Invitations to speak to other clubs came from visiting members of District 5960. As we presented, many District 5960 clubs submitted pledges soon after the presentations were made to this exciting project.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

The Apple Valley Rotary Club has boots on the ground experience over the past five years in Jamaica. Rotary volunteers have worked along side the volunteer dental professionals in the rural clinics. Great Shape, Inc. (since 1988), was organized to rebuild Jamaica after the devastation of Hurricane Gilbert. Great Shape, Inc. director, Joseph Wright oversees the operations and logistics of this non-profit organization. Mr. Wright has served over 25 years as an employee of Great Shape, Inc. They schedule the volunteer dental professionals into the local Jamaican communities. They have built long term relationships with the local communities and the Ministry of Health. Great Shape, Inc. continued growth and acceptance in the Jamaican communities has defined this stable and sustainable organization. Board member and volunteer, Dr. Newton Gordon is the chief of Dentistry and Oral Surgery at San Francisco General Hospital Medical Center.

He is a native Jamaican. Dr. Gordon is the recipient of several teaching, leadership, civic and international humanitarian awards and honors. He volunteers his skills and leadership skills in the clinics and guides the dental students in patient treatments. Apple Valley Rotary volunteers have developed a strong working relationship with Dr. Gordon and Joseph Wright, the director of Great Shape, Inc. Rotary volunteers have observed the quality of dental health care provided by Great Shape, Inc. and its close relationships with communities in Jamaica. Our club's daily meetings with other professionals and experts while volunteering, have continued to form strong relationships and shared knowledge. These Rotary relationship meetings have forged a network of passionate professionals and volunteers that enable Rotary to pioneer a leadership role. These meetings, put together by the Rotary volunteers, have pioneered a think tank to envision a denture lab at the Dental Technology University in Kingston. The University's dean is a strong advocate. Volunteer expertise from retired lab operator/ technician Bob Irlbeck is assisting in making our project a reality. Rotary Club members rounded up local support for this extraordinary project. Rotary relationships over the years, and think tank meetings have paved the way to collaborate with locals. In transferring the knowledge of experts in our think tank, Rotary will charge ahead with, mobile x-ray equipment, two dental support busses, and greater access to dental treatments for Jamaicans. Rotary relationships will prosper in the future in Jamaica. The Rotary volunteer list continues to grow. This is a very exciting relationship project that is gaining strong appeal with our cooperating organization and local Jamaicans.

Describe the role that host rotarians will have in this project.

Host Rotarians will participate in the dental clinics as volunteers. Also, they will gather data as to the number of treated patients and treatment. They will be our eyes and ears while participating in the clinics. They will volunteer for the mobile dental van. The members of the Lucea Rotary Club have already been familiar with the operations and education programs in the dental clinics. Joseph Wright, director of Great Shape, Inc. has had a lasting relationship with their club. Members of the Lucea Club are assisting in local sourcing for the mobil dental busses. The Lucea Rotary Club will:

- A. Coordinate with the advisor at the Apple Valley Rotary Club on ordering and shipping.

- B. Help vet suppliers of equipment and supplies to be purchased.
- C. Help with the promotion of the dental clinics services, treatments and education.
- D. Assist with meetings with the community - in churches, local authorities- to help explain the kinds of dental services that are and will be provided.
- E. Liaison with the Apple Valley Club on all facets of clinical operations and surveys.
- F. Help prepare reports of numbers of patients and types of treatments, and dental impressions completed.
- G. Recruit other local Rotary clubs to volunteer in the dental clinics.

Describe the role that international Rotarians will have in this project.

International Rotarians will provide administration services that include welcoming and scheduling the patients into the dental clinic. Upon arrival, supplies must be unpacked and organized for each of the eight dental stations in the assigned clinic.

Blood pressure and pulse readings are recorded. Instruments and dental tools need to be sterilized and packaged continuously.

Compressors and work stations need continuous attention for air and water supply. Patients have to be arranged according to the specialty care needed, so there is a constant flow of patients to the dental specialty. Examples are, tooth extractions, fillings, impressions for dentures and partials, root canals, cleaning. Daily supplies have to be packed for the bus ride to the clinic. On the final day, all equipment must be sterilized and packed for storage. Water and air lines coiled up and compressor made ready for storage. Biological waste must be properly bagged and disposed. A day can be taken to visit a local elementary school and teach dental hygiene classes.

This year volunteers purchased soccer goals to replace the bamboo posts kids used in the practice field outside our clinic.

It is our responsibility to build relationships based on love and respect of the Jamaican people. Joseph Wright from Great Shape Inc. says, 'build a love bubble with the people.' Take time to talk with them and make an impact with your time together.

Club interest and pledges have fanned out to the surrounding District 5960, signaling strong acceptance and funding for our global grant in Jamaica.

Joseph Sterling has made numerous trips to Jamaica and is the main contact with Great Shape, Inc. He formed discussion

groups with volunteer dentists and Great Shape, Inc, director Joseph Wright to envision the build out of the dental lab and

mobile technology equipment and the expansion of dental treatments available. Wayne Hilbert member of the Apple Valley

Rotary and his late wife Natalie, volunteered in 2014, and Wayne is signing up to volunteer in 2016.

The Apple Valley Rotary Club will be coordinating fund raising and record keeping of equipment, supplies, mobile vehicle, and

reporting direct patient contact and surveys from the Great Shape, Inc. and the Lucea Rotary Club.

Rotary members will continue to volunteer annually to dental clinics in Jamaica and help connect the dots of the projects, and interface with the director of Great Shape, Inc., Joseph Wright and the Lucea Rotary Club with assistance from Bruce Nordquist

and Wayne Hilbert and other participating club members. We will report to the other District 5950 Clubs and District 5960 Clubs

who have pledged funds for our global grant.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Through Great Shape, Inc and Joseph Sterling, Dr Myron Henrickson, Dr. Michael Henrickson and Dr. Newton Gordon, D.D.S.

Chief of Dentistry and Oral Surgery at San Francisco General Hospital Medical Center,(native of Wakefield, Jamaica) we have firsthand knowledge and awareness of chronic oral health care problems in the rural communities of Jamaica. Due largely to poverty and their rural locations remote from any city locations, residents of these areas have virtually no regular dental care or dental treatments. Mobile technology equipment and dental buses will service many more additional patients unable to attend the dental clinics The vehicle will also supply the Dental Technology University with impressions made in the clinics to provide dentures for patients. This is a life changing event for Jamaican dental patients.

According to 1000 Smiles/Great Shape, Inc. and the dental professionals it works with, the conditions most prevalent in adults are:

- Tooth decay
- Severe coronal destructions
- Septic foci (root fragments)
- Located marginal simple gingivitis
- Adult periodontitis

There is one dentist for every 100,000 people in Jamaica. The demand for dental services in rural areas of Jamaica is exponential. The Jamaican health care system does not include dental services and over 90% of our patients have never seen a dentist. Many of the patients we see have few or no teeth at all. Providing a denture program

opens up employment opportunities in the tourism industry. A bright smile is required for employment in the tourism sector.

Great Shape, Inc.,cooperating organization,has been serving this population since 1988 but has been unable to effect a major change, due to the resources needed to serve so many people. The need has been identified by volunteer Rotarians, Great Shape, Inc. and dentists who travel and serve at their own expense.

How did your project team identify these needs?

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Local community members recognized the problem long ago but, unfortunately do not have the where with all to provide the professionals, equipment and planning needed to implement a solution. Great Shape, Inc. has been there as a local NGO and tried to address the issue of very limited dental care. However, they too, are limited in professional and financial resources. This project will help fund some of the capital equipment items for the dental lab and clinics along with consumables to make dentures, crowns and bridges for patients. Rotary will be working with Great Shape, Inc. as our benefiting partner and Great Shape will continue to organize the volunteer dental teams, scheduling and support. Lucea Rotary Club members will consult with the Jamaican Health Ministry and local volunteer aids of the community and broadcast the additional treatment and services that will be available at the clinics.

As noted previously, numerous missions and other trips by dentists, other oral hygiene professionals and clinic support staff have already been organized and executed. Several family members of local volunteers have already visited the various clinics and pledged their ongoing support, and are already helping to coordinate the delivery of supplies and equipment. Local carpenters have been contacted to provide assistance in the bus conversion process. Volunteer drivers have pledged their continual support for driving supplies, equipment, and patients.

Also, Great Shape, Inc. (since 1988) has a plan for sustaining the rural clinics through support from its international partners and donors and coordination with local governments, the Ministry of Public Health, companies that produce and market products for oral health, and the Jamaican Dental Technology University in Kingston (a strong advocate of the dental laboratory) to be a required lab course for dental students. Community health promoters and volunteer aids are giving instructions in basic health and hygiene practices. Tooth brushes, tooth paste, and flossing supplies are distributed to local elementary schools in conjunction with educational programs. Patients at the various dental clinics will receive tooth brushes, tooth paste and flossing supplies distributed to their families as well. A dental hygiene and disease prevention instruction will be made available in the waiting areas of the dental clinics.

This module will be rolled into the already-existing programs, initiated by other volunteer dentists and hygienists who have traveled to the area over the past several years.

The education program will use existing curriculum produced and made by 1000 Smiles / Great Shape. Each of the clinics will distribute oral health care packages that include the basics in oral hygiene, nutrition, and dental products and procedures.

Great Shape, Inc has storage units to house dental equipment and supplies. The storage units are in Montego Bay. Great

Shape maintains a list of trained volunteers whose training skills allows for safe operation of the dental equipment. They are

trained to maintain and repair dental equipment.

The laboratory equipment and supplies are located in Kingston, and maintained by Great Shape, Inc.

Great Shape, Inc will be the owner and maintenance manager of the dental equipment and vehicles. The staff at Great Shape,

be acquired at cost. Parts inventory would be available at the Toyota and Nissan dealership where the equipment is acquired.

Legal agreement

In consideration of receiving this global grant from The Rotary Foundation (TRF), the Sponsors acknowledge and agree that:

In addition, TRF reserves the right to audit the grant's financial activities at any time and suspend any or all payments if in its sole discretion progress is not considered to be satisfactory.
4. The Sponsors will keep TRF informed on the grant's progress by submitting progress reports every

twelve months during the implementation of the grant activities. The Sponsors will immediately inform TRF of any significant problems with the implementation of the grant or deviations from the planned activities, including deviations in the budget. The Sponsors will submit the final report with complete financial accounting within two months of the grant's completion.

5. The Sponsors shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Rotary International (RI) and TRF, including their directors, trustees, officers, committees, employees, agents, associate foundations and representatives (collectively "RI/TRF"), from and against all claims, including but not limited to claims of subrogation, demands, actions, damages, losses, costs, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and other legal expenses), awards, judgments, and fines asserted against or recovered from RI/TRF arising out of any act, conduct, omission, negligence, misconduct, or unlawful act (or act contrary to any applicable governmental order or regulation) resulting directly or indirectly from a Sponsor's and/or participant's involvement in grant-funded activities, including all travel related to the grant.
6. RI/TRF's entire responsibility is expressly limited to payment of the total financing amount. Neither RI nor TRF assumes any further responsibility in connection with this grant. Neither RI nor TRF is responsible for unfunded travelers.
7. TRF reserves the right to cancel this Agreement without notice upon the failure of either or both of the Sponsors to abide by terms set forth in this Agreement and the Terms and Conditions for District Grants and Global Grants. Upon cancellation, TRF shall be entitled to a refund of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.
8. The failure of the Parties to comply with the terms of this Agreement due to an act of God, strike, war, fire, riot, civil unrest, hurricane, earthquake, or other natural disasters, acts of public enemies, curtailment of transportation facilities, political upheavals, acts of terrorism, or any reason beyond the reasonable control of the Parties shall not be deemed a breach of this Agreement. In such an event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated and Sponsors shall refund all unexpended global grant funds within 30 days of termination.

ADDITIONAL AGREEMENT TERMS FOR GLOBAL GRANTS INVOLVING FUNDED TRAVELERS Sections 9-14 apply to those traveling on global grant funding ("Funded Travelers")

9. Rotarians serving on the selection committee have exercised complete transparency and disclosed any actual or perceived conflict of interest due to the committee member's association with a candidate or participating institution.
10. The Sponsors confirm that the Funded Traveler(s) are qualified to provide and/or receive this training and have the endorsement of our club or district. Additionally, the Sponsors affirm that the activity/scholarship has been planned in accordance with the host sponsor and beneficiary community.
11. If it is decided that Funded Travelers are not performing adequately, TRF must be notified. TRF reserves the right to terminate this Agreement and arrange for immediate transportation for the Funded Traveler(s) back to the Funded Traveler(s)' home country.
12. Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, in the event the Funded Traveler(s) terminate their participation for any reason not necessitated by serious illness or injury or safety of the Funded Traveler(s) or the serious illness or injury of a Funded Traveler's family, TRF shall be entitled to a refund of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. In addition, any Funded Traveler who terminates his/her participation prior to the end date listed in the Application for any reason other than serious illness or injury or safety shall be responsible for his/her own return transportation home. Additionally, any Funded Traveler who elects not to travel or participate in grant-funded activities shall refund the full grant, including any interest earned, within 30 days of notification.
13. Funded Traveler(s) are required to secure, for their trip, travel medical and accident insurance to cover medical care and hospitalization, emergency evacuation, and repatriation of remains with limits as outlined in the terms and conditions. This insurance must be valid in the country(ies) that the Funded Traveler will visit during their participation and cover the periods from the date of departure through the date of return. Upon request, Funded Traveler(s) shall provide evidence of such coverage to the Sponsors and TRF.
14. Sponsors acknowledge and agree that Funded Traveler(s) are not employees of RI or TRF and are not entitled to or eligible in any way for, or shall participate in, any compensation, employee pension, health (medical or dental), workers compensation, life, disability, or any other insurance or other fringe benefit plan of RI or TRF. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed by the Parties or any third party as creating the relationship of partnership, joint venture, or principal and agent between or among any Funded Traveler(s), Beneficiaries, Sponsors, RI and/or TRF.

16. Only the laws of the State of Illinois, USA, without reference to its conflicts of laws principles, shall govern all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including, without limitation, its interpretation, construction, performance, and enforcement.
17. Any legal action brought by either Party against the other Party arising out of or relating to this Agreement must be brought in either the Circuit Court of Cook County, State of Illinois, USA or the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, USA. Each Party consents to the exclusive jurisdiction of these courts, and their respective appellate courts for the purpose of such actions. Nothing herein prohibits a party that obtains a judgment in either of the designated courts from enforcing the judgment in any other court. Notwithstanding the foregoing, TRF may also bring legal action against Sponsors and/or Funded Traveler(s) in any court with jurisdiction over them.
18. This Agreement binds and benefits the Parties and their respective administrators, legal representatives, and permitted successors and assigns.
19. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be illegal, invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
20. Sponsors may not assign any of its rights under this Agreement except with the prior written consent of TRF. Sponsors may not delegate any performance under this Agreement without the prior written consent of TRF. Any purported assignment of a Sponsor's rights or delegation of performance without TRF's prior written consent is void.
21. TRF may assign some or all of its rights under this Agreement to an associate foundation of TRF. TRF may delegate any performance under this Agreement to an associate foundation. Any other purported assignment of TRF's rights or delegation of performance without the Sponsors' prior written consent is void.
22. Sponsors will comply with all economic and trade sanctions, including those implemented by the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) of the United States Department of Treasury, and will use reasonable efforts to ensure that it does not support or promote violence, terrorist activity or related training, or money laundering.
23. This Agreement constitutes the final agreement between the Parties. No amendment or waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless it is in the form of a writing signed by the Parties.
