TRF ALLOWS ROTARIANS TO IMAGINE HOW TO DO GOOD IN THE WORLD

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is the engine that funds many of the humanitarian activities of Rotary. During Rotary fiscal year 2022-23, District 5950 Rotarians contributed more than \$732,300 to the Annual Fund. These funds are used to match Club funds for Club projects. In addition, Polio contributions exceeding \$200,000 plus a couple special generous Rotarian endowment and term gifts exceeding \$450,000 resulted in total District 5950 giving of \$1,393,601. That is truly amazing and very generous. Thanks to all Rotarians who participated this past year fundraising!

These donations will provide future clean water & sanitation, maternal healthcare, disease prevention, economic development, peace efforts, and improved education globally, as well as community park improvements, furniture and transportation for homeless youth, and ecological tree planting locally in our District. Here are some of the 2022-23 projects:

- Clean water projects in 8 countries: Bolivia, Colombia,
 Guatemala, Honduras, India, Kenya, Nicaragua, and Uganda
- New toilets in a health clinic in Kenya
- Math and science curriculum for orphans in India
- Eye clinic equipment in Tanzania
- Preschool for Success Program in St Louis Park
- Minivan for homeless youth in Chanhassen

POLIO ERADICATION MOVES CLOSER TO REALITY

2022-23 was another exceptional year as District 5950 Rotarians and Clubs contributed \$217,980 toward Polio eradication. The Gates Foundation matched those contributions so the impact on ending Polio is doubled. The number of Polio cases worldwide continues to dwindle. 2022-23 provided some excitement regarding major donors.
