Ignite Your Membership

Turn up the heat on Club Membership to make your Club flourish

In case you are not aware of the significance, the Rotary monthly theme for August is Membership. In last month's article, I wrote "Every Month Is

Membership Month." This will always ring true.

At the recent Zone training (members make up Clubs, clubs make up Districts and districts make up a Zone) Lynne Baker, our Zone Rotary Coordinator, educated us about the IGNITE program that has the purpose of attracting prospective members as well as engaging existing club members. The formal purpose is "to ignite every Rotarian by involving them in one or more" of a slew ofactivities because "EVERYONE has something to contribute toward the success of their Club. Therefore, every person has the power to make a difference."

IGNITE is innovative and brings elements of fun and a little competitive spirit to the program. Our District Membership Team will be training as many membership chairs as possible to roll out the programin the first half of this Rotary year. We are hoping that most, if not all, clubs will welcome and embrace this new program that reaches beyond

getting new members.

Leaders at our District and Zone levels

view IGNITE as a tool that will bring additional energy to our clubs which will translate into stronger and more sustainable clubs. All participating clubs have the goalto achieve the Governor's Membership Citation by reaching the status of a Premier Club. A spreadsheet details 18 action items with points assigned to each item. For example, an existing member who brings in anew member will receive 25 points.

For the Denver Cherry Creek club of 29 members to become a Premier Club, at least 290 points must be earned during this Rotary year.

Each club can incorporate processes already in place to earn points, such as assigning a mentor for the Red Badge members (10 points), or holding a training, orientation or fireside with new members (10 points per new member.) The main caveat is that your club can't grandfather in any actions prior to the start of IGNITE.

Peace Fellows, and even RYLA). This is such an untapped segment offering great potential for growthLastly, the launch of new clubs within our district is another method for growth. The Aurora Southlands club had its charter party in late June and it was genuinely exciting. We found a new venue for people to come together to embrace "Service Above Self." And, soon a new club will be forming in Kiowa! This area was just brought into our district and there is no Rotary club nearby to serve this community.

We are a vibrant district and membership is the foundation for all the wonderful things we are doing and will do in years to come. Please don't stop ASKing.

Bingo Success with Broomfield Rotary

What does your club do to raise money?" is often a question you'll hear when Rotarians gather. Broomfield Rotary has the answer and wants you to learn from them...

In March, 2007, the Broomfield Rotary club successfully completed an application to be designated a 501c3 nonprofit. The IRS granted approval of our request in June, 2007. This action led to the formation of the Broomfield Rotary Charitable Foundation that would be legally able to raise tax exempt contributions to be used to help qualified groups, both local and international, fund worthy programs.

The BRC formed a fund raising committee to examine various ideas to raise funds for worthwhile programs. During early 2008, this fund raising committee, led by John O'Hayre, researched the idea of BRC managed bingo games as a fund raiser. The committee met with tax advisors and the State of Colorado Gaming Department personnel. With the approval of the full club membership, the game of Bingo, BRC's first on-going large fund raising project, rose to replace the Broomfield Odyssey.

John O'Hayre, along with several Rotarians, met with the manager of Bingo Mines in Lafayette to discuss the possibility of contracting for a designated time for Broomfield Rotary to host a Broomfield Rotary Bingo game. Following negotiations on a fund sharing arrangement, our Rotary Bingo commenced during the month of June, 2008. Four Rotarians, John O'Hayre, John Abboud, Bill Ayres, and Tom Maier volunteered to act as Bingo Managers. The majority of the club membership volunteered to act as workers each Sunday for one year.

In 2009, Rotarian Ron Rimer learned from friends that an opening was

available at the Turn Bingo II bingo parlor located at 72nd and Pecos. Ron's friends assured Ron that the bingo games at this location had proved to

As of May, 2012, the bingo fundraiser has allowed the BRCF to award grants to various charitable organization in excess of approximately \$175,000. The following Broomfield area groups were among the BRCF grant awardees:

In addition, the Broomfield bingo monies allowed the Club to partner with other Rotary Clubs to provide clean water and sanitation systems for homes, hospitals, and schools in

as part of Rotary International's on-going international clean water/sanitation program.

be very profitable. The four managers investigated this bingo parlor and predicted that the move would prove beneficial to the Broomfield Rotary Charitable Foundation's work to raise funds sufficient to support their grants in aid to deserving charitable non-profits. In June, 2009 Rotary Club members decided to move their Bingo Night to the Turn Bingo II bingo parlor located at 72nd and Pecos.

The three year old Bingo Project has increased Broomfield Rotary's giving

to many charitable causes serving humanitarian needs in our home community area and communities worldwide. This program of giving fully illustrates the motto of Rotary, "SERVICE ABOVE SELF".

The Broomfield Evening Rotary Club membership has shown a willingness to work tirelessly and unselfishly to support the Bingo Project and deserves to be recognized for their hard work.

Well done, Broomfield Evening Rotary membership!

Sarah is proud to promote her club's work with Homes for Our Troops and ongoing support for Kids for Our Troops. Douglas County raised over \$45,000 in one year to benefit severely injured veterans with custom-built homes specially-adapted for their injuries and disabilities.

According to Sarah, "All 6 Douglas County clubs actually partnered together and we have collaborated on 3 builds this year for Cpl Nick Orchowski, SSG Brian Schar and Capt. Patrick Glavey. I would have to estimate over 100 Rotarians from our 6 clubs and other clubs through various fundraisers, the actual builds etc. We have created a "How to" manual for Rotary clubs to support Homes for Our Troops builds across the nation in their respective areas."



Rotary Foundation District Grants

District grants are block grants made to districts for up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund (DDF). District grants offer the flexibility to respond quickly to immediate needs or to plan projects with clubs locally or in other countries.

Rotary Foundation Global Grants

Global grants support large international projects with sustainable, high-impact outcomes in the six areas of focus that correspond to the Foundation's mission.

The district website lets you find anyone in the district (assuming their information is up-to-date) by going to the Search Member eDirectory link under Administration. The information on the web is what Bev turns to when people ask her questions.

Bev was thrilled to commit to the job as District Office Manager. "The job is a really good fit and I get paid to do something I love." It doesn't get much better than that, does it?



Chipping away at Polio

A recent article in the Wall Street Journal (July 24, 2012) *How to Eradicate Polio Once and for All* by Jay Winsten and Emily Serazin told the world something that Rotary has known all along... that polio can be stopped.

Polio is still looming in three countries, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Nigeria. Due to religious beliefs, politics, geography and lack of funds these countries still live with polio in their mists.

In order to eradicate polio, clear steps must be taken:

- Halt the spread in the 3 remaining countries
- Stop the spread of the poliovirus in northern Nigeria and Pakistan
- Quickly stop polio outbreaks in previously polio-free countries
- Continue with immunization in polio-free countries
- Maintain funding and political commitments to implement these

strategies Currently there is a funding



shortfall of \$945 million which leaves the door open for polio to enter again.

The Global Polio Eradication

Initiative's total budget for 2012-13 is \$2.19 billion. To date, the initiative has received \$1.24 billion in commitments, of which 20% comes directly from the countries conducting the immunization campaigns. Another 15% comes from private institutions including Rotary International and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, 14% from G-8 countries, and 6% from multilateral organizations such as Unicef. (Wall St Journal, July 24, 2012)

Rotary has been working on polio eradication since 1985. India is poliofree now and still the effort continues. Rotary International, the spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) has committed to polio eradication.

There has been much progress over the past 25 years. There is still work to be done. The question do we have the funds to achieve this goal?
