A Message from your Governor

NEW SATELLITE CLUB

There are few things that warm a District Governor's heart like helping induct twenty four young professional Rotarians at once. That happened last week when I traveled to the Denver Southeast Club to help celebrate the launching of their new Satellite Evening Club. It was a grand event.

President John Hughes beamed as each new Rotarian came forth. Every Club member was proud of their new Rotarians. I commented to one DSE Rotarian that this will change his Rotary Club and the change will be for the better. When his eyes grew wide I knew I was in trouble. I quickly clarified first with, "Not that the DSE Club isn't already a great Rotary Club", and it is. I further explained that this large number of young adults



at one time will suddenly provide the Club with a wider perspective, new energy, and different ways of doing business. I pointed out that while the DSE Club has developed and conducted an amazing number of high quality projects

in the past, this group could bring them at a new level.

His eyes were not narrowing, so I took my best out and employed the Number One Rule of Holes: When you find yourself in a hole, stop digging.

This exchange lays bare a point that we need to recognize and discuss. Instilling a satellite club, whether a group of young professions or a group centered on another commonality, does not mean the existing Club will suffer and become unrecognizable to the existing members.

However evolution will come to a Rotary Club with a new satellite club, especially if they are in large numbers. It is the positive change that comes to any organization with an infusion of new energetic members. The new

members will undoubtedly have their own ideas and ways of doing business. The existing Rotarians serve a critical and invaluable role, including: incorporating them into existing efforts and projects, leading by example, teaching leadership, providing encouragement when plans go awry, sharing their knowledge of how Rotary works and how to get things done, and, importantly, giving them the freedom to make mistakes and become true Rotarians and Rotary Champions. It is this combination of the traditional with the new that will make Rotary Clubs with a satellite club incredibly powerful and productive!

We should also stop referring to them "satellite clubs". The new Rotarians are full members of their Rotary Clubs and not a separate club at all. They just follow different rules to meet the membership requirements.

This is a wonderful concept. I am amazed how many Clubs in this District are considering and working on including a satellite club.




As in the past, the float committee needs your assistance, as this incredibly unique public relations project is totally funded by District, Club and individual Rotarian donations.

Up Close and Personal: First Person Report from Peg Johnson

Having traveled through Ethiopia these last few weeks, I have seen a fair number of what I believe are polio cases, especially in the cities. Here disabled are often put out by families believing the devil has visited them, so they become homeless beggars. It's all very sad. Ethiopia has after 10 years free of polio, seen an upsurge coming from Somalia with 7 cases identified so far.

Somalia now has 180 paralytic cases as of Oct 30, largely from insecure areas not allowing health workers, and Syria claims 10 cases though that number is expected to triple. Worldwide 233 cases of polio reported for 2012. According to Bruce Alyward, WHO, 200 million children will be immunized in the next 3 weeks in these areas.


