Don't miss the sounds of New Orleans at the 2011 R.I. Convention

Grammy-winning trumpeter and bandleader Irvin Mayfield will be one of the entertainers during the 2011 RI Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana. Jazz, bluegrass, country, and opera will combine to provide a unique blend of regional music during the 2011 RI Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA, 21-25 May.

Grammy-winning trumpeter and bandleader Irvin Mayfield, the renown Preservation Hall Jazz Band, and internationally renown jazz pianist Ronnie Kole will represent their variety of music during plenary sessions. Michael Martin Murphy, known as the "singing cowboy poet," will perform at both the opening and closing plenary sessions, while Lacy J. Dalton will dazzle with her soulful voice and gritty style during the opening plenary session.

Also on stage for the closing plenary session will be Rhonda Vincent and the Rage. Vincent has been called "the new queen of bluegrass," but her music is more inclusive, incorporating contemporary touches while drawing deeply from classic bluegrass. World-renowned opera star Simon Estes performs during the opening plenary session.

Bill Gates, cochair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, will be a keynote speaker during the third plenary session scheduled for Tuesday, 24 May, at the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center. Gates will discuss the progress of the polio eradication effort and the need to finish the job. The session has been moved to the afternoon, 15:00-17:00, from its original morning time slot.

The Gates Foundation has awarded \$355 million in challenge grants to Rotary for use in the campaign to rid the world of polio. Rotary has responded with Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. Gates has made several trips to India and Nigeria, two of the four remaining polio-endemic countries, and has praised the work of Rotarians in his annual letter.

Other speakers will include Michael McQueen, founder of the Nexgen Group, who will discuss understanding Generation Y, and Patrick Chisanga, vice chair of the District Governors Review Committee, who will speak about Rotary's role in Africa.

Penny LeGate, a news anchor and reporter for KIRO-TV in Seattle, will share her experiences participating in and reporting on National Immunization Days in Ethiopia and India. See the speakers and entertainment page for more highlights of the convention, or download the preliminary program (PDF).

ShelterBox Relief Efforts Continue in Japan

The ShelterBox Response Teams (SRTs) are working in Japan to deliver emergency shelter and life -saving equipment to families who have lost everything after the earthquake and tsunami on March 11.

To date, nearly 2,200 ShelterBoxes have been committed to the people of Japan as they begin to rebuild their lives, and more than 10,000 of ShelterBox's winter gloves, scarves and hats are being sent as the freezing conditions continue.

Families in Japan say "Arigato" (thank you) to ShelterBox and supporters around the world. Rotarians on average finance about 50% of all of the world's ShelterBoxes.

Purple Pinkie 5K Raises \$4,500 for Polio



145 runners/walkers participate in DeSales University event.

Center Valley, PA (April 7, 2011) – The DeSales University Rotaract Club, along with Rotary District 7430, held its inaugural Purple Pinkie 5K Run/Walk on Sunday, April 3. The on-campus race raised funds for Rotary International's PolioPlus campaign to help eradicate polio worldwide. The combined145 runners and walkers helped raise a total of \$4,500.

PolioPlus, the most ambitious program in Rotary's history, is the volunteer arm of the global partnership dedicated to

eradicating polio. For more than 20 years, Rotary has led the private sector in the global effort to rid the world of this crippling disease. Today, PolioPlus and its role in the initiative are recognized worldwide as a model of public-private cooperation in pursuit of a humanitarian goal.

"I found the Purple Pinkie 5K to be an extremely rewarding event," said Laura Monahan '12, DeSales Rotaract Vice President. "Many people worked hard to make this inaugural event so successful – and for such a worthy cause. I know that we were able to make a difference with this event."

The Rotaract Club of DeSales University currently has 20 members and is celebrating its first year as a club. In addition to PolioPlus, the club supports a variety of other organizations in the community such as Second Harvest Food Bank, Ronald McDonald House, and Soldier's Angels.



The next Purple Pinkie 5K is being scheduled for April 2012 on the DeSales University campus.

"It means so much to me and to the Rotaract Club that we raised \$4,500 and help saved 10,000 children from Polio," said Heather Hope '12, DeSales Rotaract President. "All the work that was put into it by the Interact and Rotaract students and the Rotarians really paid off. It feels great to truly make a difference, and hopefully we're close to eradicating polio worldwide."
