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US Commits \$205 Million to Polio Eradication



President Obama signed an omnibus appropriations bill in January that provides \$205 million to support polio eradication in 2014, through the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and U. S. Agency for International Development.

The largest government donor to polio eradication, the U.S. has contributed more than \$2.3 billion since the mid-1980s, when 125 countries were polio endemic and the disease afflicted 350,000 people annually. Today, only Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria are endemic, and in 2013, the combined incidence of polio in those countries fell to a record-low 157 cases. Last month, India reached a three-year milestone without polio, paving the way for the entire Southeast Asia region to be certified free of the disease.

"Eradicating polio will leave a lasting legacy of health care infrastructure, experience, and expertise that is already being used to benefit a broad range of global public health efforts,"

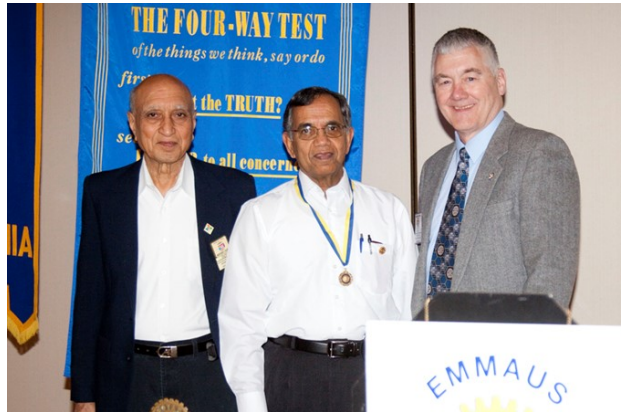
Doylestown

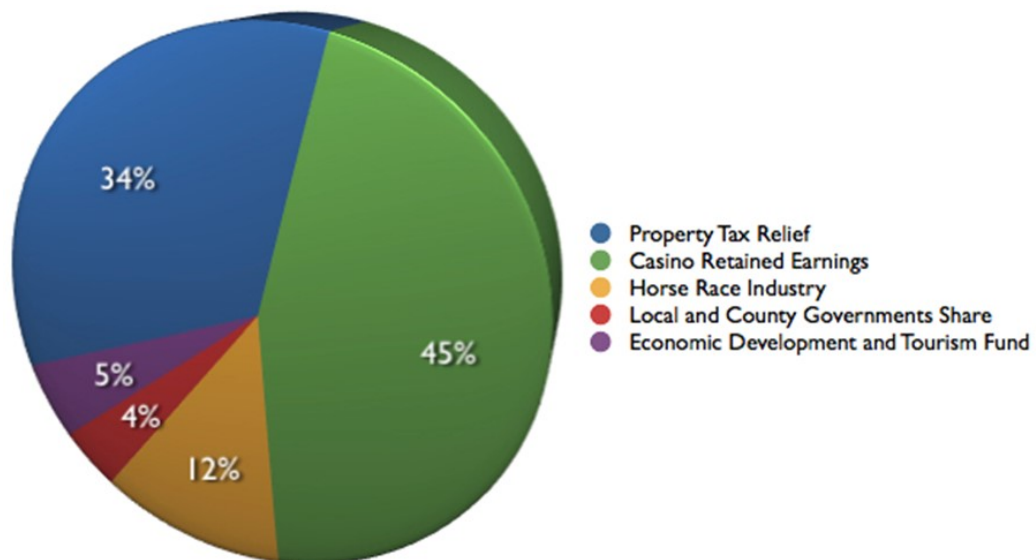
Annmarie Kaiser, Commissioner, of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board was the speaker at the AMBLER RC's March 9th meeting. This commission oversees our gambling, i.e. casinos.

Mission Statement: The Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, guided by the Gaming Act and supported by a dedicated professional staff, will protect the interest of the public by ensuring the integrity of legalized gaming through the strict enforcement of the law and regulations, the licensing of qualified individuals and entities, and fulfilling the objectives of limited gaming in the Commonwealth to deliver a significant source of revenue, assist the horse racing industry, provide broad economic opportunities and enhance tourism.

Gaming Benefits for Pennsylvanians

The Pennsylvania Race Horse Development and Gaming Act was designed to produce tremendous benefits for Commonwealth citizens through the legalization of casino gaming. To date, more than 16,000 new living wage jobs have been created along with more than \$6 billion of tax revenue that is improving the quality of life in local communities, reinvigorating our horse racing industry, and lowering the property tax of homeowners.

For every dollar produced as revenue from slot machine play, 55¢ is returned to Pennsylvanians. Below is a breakdown of this taxation:

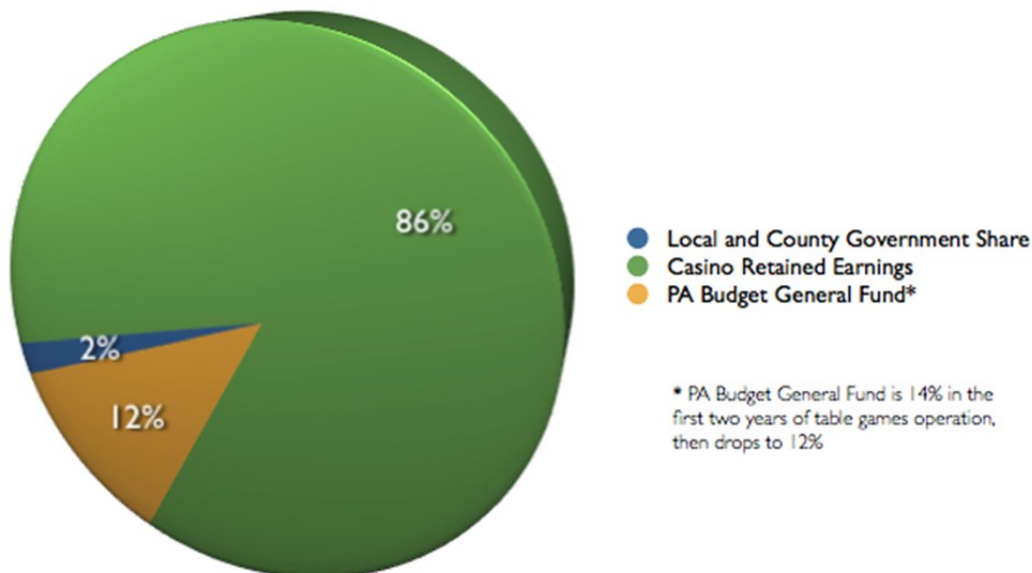

The significant portion of revenue generated from the play of slot machines are used to fund general school property tax reduction or wage tax reduction. Each April 15, the Secretary of the Budget certifies the amount of revenue available for distribution as general school property tax reduction and Philadelphia wage tax reduction during the upcoming fiscal year. School tax bills reflect the homestead and farmstead exclusions funded by slots as a separate line item. While the amount of reduction varies between school district, homeowners statewide have received an average reduction of nearly \$200 yearly.

In addition, slots revenue has been used to expand and supplement the Property Tax and Rent Rebate (PTRR) program for senior citizens, widows/widowers 50 and over, and people with disabilities. The program expansion increased the income limit from \$15,000 to \$35,000 (which excludes half of Social Security income) for homeowners and raised the maximum rebate for both homeowners and renters from \$500 to \$650. Each July, the Department of Revenue begins issuing rebate checks for taxes/rent paid in the preceding calendar year. The result of combining general property tax reduction with rebate money allowed approximately 100,000 Pennsylvania seniors to see an elimination of any school property tax in 2011.

The revenue split for table games is different. For each dollar generated, the casino retains 86¢... a larger percentage than slot machines primarily due to the much higher overhead costs associated with operating table games compared to operating slots. State and local governments receive all of the tax revenue from table games.

Nick Charles Horsham Rotary Happy Birthday

Here are two pictures of 94 (?) year old Nick Charles. He said he was a junior in college when he enlisted before the war broke out in 1941. He regaled us with great stories on Monday March 17th over lunch at Otto's that Horsham Rotary President Frank Gerome arranged.



Nick was on the original committee that was formed out of Hatboro Rotary to charter Horsham in 1965. He was Base Commander, and a Captain in the US Navy, Willow Grove at the time (1964-1967).

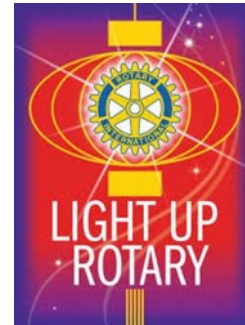

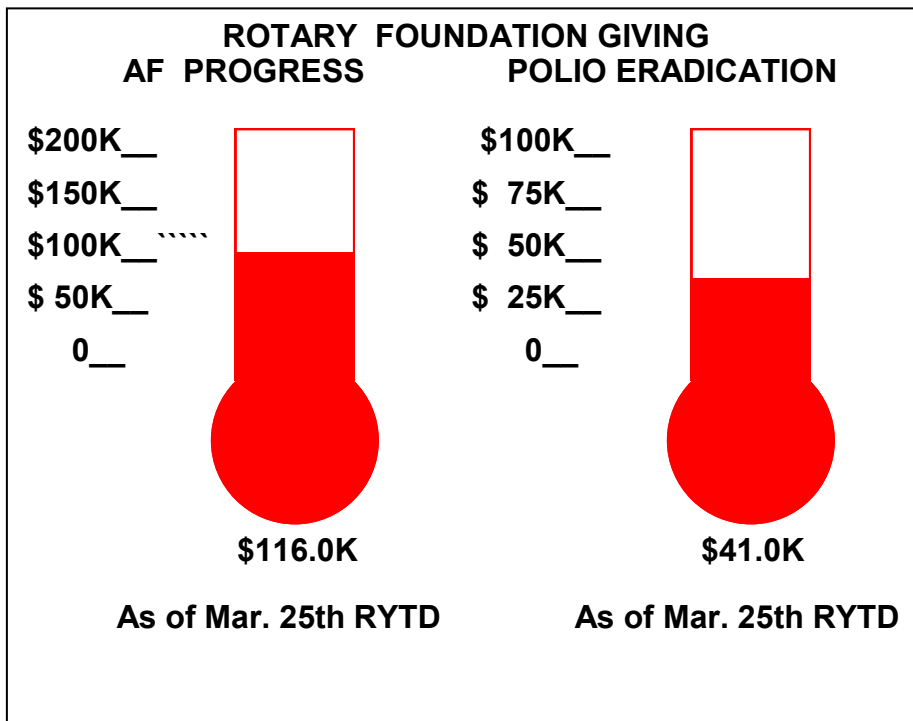

A murder that mesmerizes

Bob Vagnoni, president of the Huntingdon Valley/Churchville Rotary, emerged from the restaurant's side room to greet me and offer me a meal, but given the night's topic — the forensic details of the Kennedy assassination — I said no thanks.

"We usually have only about 20 people at our regular meetings. Tonight, it's 46. We're packed," Vagnoni said.

Fascination with the Kennedy murder endures, fueled by the stubborn belief it was a vast, shadowy conspiracy.

Rooms do fill to discuss the Lincoln assassination, which was a conspiracy. But when a local Rotary Club invites two professors from Philadelphia University to explain how Lee Harvey Oswald, an ex-Marine sharpshooter, Castro enthusiast and Communist loser, murdered a beloved president with an easy shot, the place sells out.

Professors Evan Laine, who teaches law and society, and architecture prof David Kratzer, with students, staff and a \$100,000 grant, have created "Single Bullet," an ingenious and eerie 3-D exhibit showing how the late Pennsylvania Sen. Arlen Specter concluded a lone sniper changed history with a single bullet.

Specter was a 33-year-old Philadelphia prosecutor in 1964 when he was appointed as an investigator to the President's Commission on the Assassination of JFK. Chaired by U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice Earl Warren, the commission used Specter's findings to conclude that Oswald, acting alone, fired a rifle from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository, killing the president and seriously wounding Texas Gov. John Connolly in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.

Specter, who died in October 2012, left his personal papers to Philadelphia University. From these, come the “Single Bullet” exhibit, which is free and open to the public through April 11. “We wanted people to see how Arlen Specter came to the single bullet conclusion using the CSI techniques of his day,” Kratzer said.

Specter’s theory has been under withering fire since, most famously mocked as a “lie” in Oliver Stone’s film “JFK,” an artful compilation of crackpot conspiracies. The “Single Bullet” exhibit shows how bullet trajectories from Oswald’s vantage point align perfectly with the shots he fired. It also proves how shots arriving from the “grassy knoll” or from atop the “triple underpass” miss.

Laine told the Rotary that, despite the evidence, polls show 51 percent of Americans believe there was a conspiracy to kill JFK. “It’s understandable,” he said. “It just doesn’t seem possible that a loser like Oswald could do something this big by himself.”

After the Rotary talk, attendees insisted to the professors that the CIA did it. Or mobsters. Or Castro. Or the Russians.

At the Paul J. Gutman Library at Philadelphia University sits the centerpiece of “Single Bullet,” a wire and wood mockup of the 1961 Lincoln in which JFK was killed. It was an enormous vehicle, 23-feet long and 7-feet wide, with a surprisingly cramped passenger compartment.

Visitors are invited to sit in the same spot as JFK. In front, a mannequin represents Connolly. Behind the car is a mockup of the book depository façade. From the sixth floor sniper’s nest, a camera is aimed at the visitor’s head. On a computer screen in front of the seated visitor, a red laser light marks precisely where Oswald’s gun sight is trained. To the right, a clear fiberglass cutout represents Abraham Zapruder, who filmed the assassination from Dealy Plaza.

“When people sit here and they see how easily Oswald did it, when they see themselves in the same position as Kennedy, they get quiet. Some have described it as a disturbing experience,” Laine said, as I sat in Kennedy’s seat, the laser dot on my neck.

Laine talked about the bullet trajectory, the “jet effect” on impact with the human skull, and how it explains Kennedy’s head snapping backward. An overwhelming sense of revulsion came, and I stepped from the mockup limo, fast.
