

The Rotary Foundation rises on expert list of top nonprofits



The Rotary Foundation has continued its steady growth, moving up 35 spots to 85th in The Chronicle of Philanthropy's annual ranking of the top 400 nonprofit organizations in the United States. The ranking is based on monetary contributions from private sources and reflects the increasing generosity of those who support Rotary's mission.

According to The Chronicle of Philanthropy, The Rotary Foundation received \$239,576,000 in 2013, a 32.4 percent increase from the previous year. "This clearly shows our members recognize the unparalleled value of giving to their Foundation," says John Hewko, Rotary's general secretary. "They know that by giving to the Foundation their dollars have a much greater







impact. And friends of Rotary respect that the Foundation puts their gift to great use."

The Foundation recently earned a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator, the largest and most prestigious independent evaluator of nonprofits in the United States. In the 2013-14 Rotary year, 92 percent of the Foundation's expenditures were applied to programs, with only 6 percent spent on fundraising and 2 percent on administrative expenses. The Foundation funded \$23.5 million in district grants and \$47.3 million in global grants. These grants support local and international humanitarian projects as well as scholarships.




Rotary Peace Fellows help refugees start over



The importance of telling Rotary's story

Why we need to share Rotary's good news

I know a Rotary Club that has changed the lives of hundreds, if not thousands, of young people over the years. I know this because I have attended some of their meetings. And because I am one of the lives they have changed.

The Rotary club I am referring to is one of the largest in London, **so they don't need to generate publicity around their activities. Or** do they?

This Rotary club is doing incredible, life-changing work. But there is one thing they are not doing. They are not sharing their story with the community. They are well known and respected within Rotary circles, but they are not very well known at all outside the family of Rotary. And they are not alone. Many of our clubs are doing incredible work, and impacting many lives, but the public does not know about it.

Here are two reasons why I think we must start telling others our **Rotary "good news."**


It will attract new members

I understand and love that for many Rotarians, it is more about serving than recognition. But it is not being a glory seeker to tell people in the community the impact we are having. It should actually be the duty of club members to do this. Why? Because more people will hear about Rotary, they will learn what Rotary is about, and they will see the impact that can be made by being a member. Seeing Rotary in action, and seeing the positive results we have, is attractive to prospective members. And that is good for Rotary, that is good for our projects, and that is good for the new members, who gain the added ability to help others through Rotary.

It will motivate others to support our projects

If you, your campaign, and your project are the world's best kept secret, you are not likely to break any fundraising records or have the massive impact you were hoping for. The Global Swimarathon and World's Greatest Meal were incredibly successful because they

were incredibly visible, and launched amazing campaigns that shared every milestone they reached.

Hopefully by now I have convinced you why it is important to share. There are many ways to do so, through social media, through videos, through partnering with others, through your local media. Here in the United Kingdom, we have three Rotary members who have excelled at doing this, Paul Wilson, Eve **Conway, and Mukesh Malhotra. I'm sure there are examples near you, and they would probably be happy to give you advice if you ask them.**

In April of last year, I started a website to share inspiring stories from charitable organizations around the world. If you want to read some good news, visit my website, Good News Shared, and get in touch with me if you have news to share. But by all means, let others know the good you are doing, so the world will understand how awesome Rotary is.


Partnership with UN enhances Rotary’s ability to make a difference



Allentown:

Centennial Project Goes Forward

The Rotary Club of Allentown has announced that it will construct a Rotary-themed **“Centennial Fountain” on a 22’x 20’ site located on the southeast side of Center Square in** downtown Allentown. The Rotary Club was founded in 1914 and this is the centennial project designed to celebrate its 100 years of service to the community as well as to be part of the remarkable renaissance taking place downtown.



The announcement was made by Christine Bauder, president of the Rotary Club. The Centennial Fountain is a collaboration with the City of Allentown. A license agreement to seal the arrangement was signed by Allentown Mayor Ed Pawlowski and Bauder on January 30, 2015.

The City will assume ownership of the fountain at a dedication ceremony upon completion of the project. It is anticipated that the Rotary Centennial Fountain will be flowing by June, 2015.

The Rotary Centennial Fountain at the Rotary Plaza will become a gathering place for citizens and visitors as they relax on benches and enjoy the visually pleasing scene created by the fountain. At night, the fountain will be internally lighted with blue and yellow lights, the corporate colors of both the City of Allentown and Rotary International.





Ukrainian Ambassador Speaks at LV Meeting

Almost 200 Rotarians and guests attended the joint Rotary meeting at the Renaissance Hotel in Allentown on Friday March 27, 2015.. Our thanks go to Allentown West Rotarian Dr. Ihor Fedoriw who arranged for the Ukrainian Ambassador to the United Nations to be our guest and speaker.

Ambassador *Yuriy Sergeyev* gave a speech on the conflict between Ukraine and Russia. He said that the Ukraine-Russia conflict is a global problem. The world should be watching the crisis in Ukraine; It isn't a national or regional issue, he stressed. "The entire globe has been challenged," he said, referring to the Russian Federation's takeover of Crimea. "The whole system of international order has been destroyed."

Allentown West Rotary President Dr. Barbara Kistler and Allentown Rotary President Christine Bauder arranged for the special event and invited all D7430 to attend. Christine conducted the meeting, and Allentown Mayor Ed Pawlowski provided a welcome. Congressman Charlie Dent said a few words and then introduced the Ambassador.

D7430 Governor Gary Fedorcha and Lynne, PDG Bill and AG Sue Weber, PDG Mike McCarthy, PDG Bill Palmer, PDG Tony Jannetta, DGN Linda Young represented the District 7430 leadership. There was a special reception for the Ambassador before the luncheon meeting.

"All together we can stop it. All together we can bring peace to the region and restore national order," Sergeyev said.

Ambassador of Ukraine Yuriy Sergeye received a Proclamation from Allentown Mayor Ed Pawlowski proclaiming it Yuriy Sergeyev Appreciation Day on Friday at the Renaissance Hotel in Allentown.



Inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) was launched late March in Bangladesh, as part of global efforts to introduce the vaccine globally by end-2015, ahead of the planned **switch from trivalent OPV to bivalent OPV in early 2016**. **“Together with GPEI, Gavi is supporting an unprecedented push to introduce IPV into most countries by the end of 2015. Strong routine immunization is an essential factor to interrupt and maintain zero polio transmission,” commented Dr. Seth Berkley, CEO of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.**

The GPEI is currently accepting applications from students and recent graduates interested in summer 2015 internships at the World Health Organization.

Let us all do whatever we can to support the movement for Total Literacy and Quality Education.





New Visual Identity

Rotary is rolling out a new visual identity for our youth programs that will better align Interact, Rotaract, RYLA and Youth Exchange with Rotary, making it more clear how these youth programs are connected to Rotary and an important part of our story.

In our survey last year, we learned that our new design should include Rotary, be consistent with our voice and visual identity, and convey our history even as we reach out to future participants. We wanted our design to communicate what these activities are and how Rotarians support them; for each, we did that through the Rotary Masterbrand and the Rotary wheel:

- RYLA is a program that develops young leaders. Since it's organized by Rotarians, we lead with your club or district logo featuring the Rotary masterbrand signature next to "RYLA" or the words "Rotary Youth Leadership Awards" in lowercase.
- Rotary Youth Exchange is a program that builds cultural understanding. Since it's organized by Rotarians, we lead with your district or multidistrict logo featuring the Rotary masterbrand signature next to "Rotary Youth Exchange" in lowercase.
- Interact is a club for emerging leaders. These clubs are sponsored by Rotary clubs, and they're connected to a school or a community. To show that, we put the Interact wordmark next to the Rotary wheel along with the phrase "A Rotary Sponsored Club."
- Rotaract is a club for young leaders, such as university students or young professionals. These clubs are Rotary partners, and they are based in universities or communities. We put the Rotaract wordmark next to the Rotary wheel with a phrase that affirms the role of Rotaractors as partners in service.

The Interact and Rotaract graphics live on our Brand Center, under our Logos section..

You can put this visual design into action in different ways on T-shirts, banners, and websites. You're also welcome to develop your own designs that share what RYLA, Rotary Youth Exchange, Interact, and Rotaract mean to you. If you do, be inspired by the fonts, colors, and ideas in our voice and visual identity guidelines **to connect your creativity with Rotary's overall design principles.**


