To do so required Clubs to have at least one more member by March 30th than they had on the previous July 1st.

During the Montreal RI Convention everyone learned how our Rotary Foundation has earned our respect, trust, pride and our contributions. A few points:

- The largest amount of funds ever have been budgeted for Matching Grants for the coming year. Let's repeat this: THE LARGEST AMOUNT OF FUNDS EVER HAVE BEEN BUDGETED FOR MATCHING GRANTS FOR THE COMING YEAR.
- Most of the Endowment monies have been recovered since the global meltdown of the 2008 making the above point possible and demonstrating excellent fiduciary responsibilities of the trustees and our staff.
- As of 14 Jul 10, there has only been -5cases of wild polio in Nigeria for this calendar year. Last year at the same time frame there were 343 new cases. PLEASE GIVE A BIG CHEER!
- Through 17 July 2010 there have been only 24 cases of wild polio since the beginning of the year in all of India. PLEASE, REPEAT THAT AGAIN EVERYWHERE AND CHEER!
- The reasons why the above 2 points are so exciting and encouraging, and that our final goal is now within reach over the next few years, hopefully, are:
 - a) Newer vaccines that are

working

- Better plans and schemes to get the drops into the mouths of children
- c) The tenacity and extraordinary efforts of Rotarians in India and Nigeria
- d) The governments of Nigeria
 and India giving strong support as well as collaborating
 with Rotary and our global
 partners

3H GRANT MAGIC UPDATE

A Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Project # 56447, to provide vocational training and micro-credit to women, in Poona, India, was approved by the Rotary Foundation in 2006. It was our district's first ever 3H Grant. The project's objectives and achievements as of 31 March 2010 are:

Objectives

Achievements

1. Vocational training: as needed	1,010 women beneficiaries
2. Micro credit: 3,900 women	3,312 women beneficiaries
3. Health awareness: 3,900	16,200 women beneficiaries

This marvelous project was funded by:

Emmaus Rotarians	\$ 10,000
Poona North (India) RC	\$ 20,000
The Rotary Foundation	\$270,000
Total Project	\$300,000

The final installment of the funds was disbursed by the Rotary Foundation in July 2010. As indicated by the foregoing results, , the project is going extremely well. It is expected to be complete in March 2011.

Much to the credit of our D7430 Matching Grants committee and other Rotarians, a second 3H grant was approved in 2008. This project was initiated by the West Reading-Wyomissing Rotary Club and also serves in India. Progress also is satisfactory and successful.

WHAT CAN THE "DISTRICT" DO FOR ROTARIANS?

Our district has important committees in place made up of Rotarians from our 48 clubs.
These committees provide services to all district Rotarians by providing leadership and operating plans that would not be practical for a single club to do. Some of these include:

Youth Exchange (YE) -- There will be 18 District High School students going out this Fall for nine months of study abroad. And our district will be hosting 18 inbound students.

Group Study Exchange (GSE) -- We will exchange teams with The Philippine Islands early in 2011.

Interact Clubs -- Our district has more Interact (High School) students sponsored by our Rotarians than we have total Rotarians in our clubs.

<u>Rotaract Clubs</u> -- There are two of these college oriented clubs sponsored by our district Rotary clubs, and more on the way.

<u>District Simplified Grants (DSG)</u> -These approximately \$1,000 grants are available to each Rotary club for local service pro-

jects.

<u>Matching Grants – leverage</u> – There are service projects that our district Rotarians sponsor with Rotarians in other countries where the funds are matched 100%.

Education -- There are 18 Rotarians in our district each of whom has trained and been certified as Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) Faculty. They also serve as discussion leaders at our annual President Elect Training Seminar (PETS). This a tremendous resource for every Rotarian. These Trainers are available to be a program at your regular meeting, or to conduct planning sessions and as consultants.

UNITED NATIONS DAY For ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Each year for many years Rotary International has sponsored a Day at the United Nations. Its purpose is to expose its members to the work of the U.N.—the world's most important international organization devoted to peace. This year it will be held on Saturday, November 6. Hundreds of Rotarians from many parts of the world will come together at the U.N. headquarters in Manhattan (NYC) to participate in panel discussions featuring leaders and officials from various U.N. agencies, affiliated Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) as well as senior officers of Rotary International.

Rotary and the U.N. have a long history of working together in the cause of peace and cultural understanding. In 1942, Rotary clubs from 21 countries organized a conference in London to develop a vision for promoting/protecting cultural diversity—a step that led to the founding of UNESCO, now a specialized agency of the U.N. In 1945, 49 Rotarians participated in the San Francisco Conference that created the U.N. itself. Rotary and the U.N. have been close partners ever since. Indeed, Rotary is one of a relative few private international organizations that has observer status before the U.N.

Registration for this year's event can be done on line at www.RIUNDAY.org. The pro-

gram will last from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The registration fee is \$37.50 for adults, \$20.00 for Rotaractors, and \$17.50 for students. There will be a special program for Young Rotarian guests of high school age, running from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon., featuring a model U.N. program, the Shelter Box project. Lunch is included and will be served in the main U.N. cafeteria overlooking the East River. Public parking is available nearby.

The event will be held in a new temporary building located on the north lawn of the U.N. Headquarters site. Because this building is relatively small, it cannot accommodate as many participants as in previous years. This is why it is crucial that you make your reservations early.

Interact and Rotaract Club advisors need to alert their students as soon as school begins. Club presidents and Foundation Chairs should make their clubs aware of this unique opportunity. Again, one can register and pay on line at www.RIUNDAY.org.

Bethlehem RC & Phillies Strike Out Hunger

Who can 25 underprivileged Bethlehem area children thank for the chance to go to Wednesday night's Philadelphia Phillies game? Three former New York Yankees and the Rotary Club of Bethlehem.

The club raised \$400 of the \$650 needed to send

the kids to the game by auctioning a photo of former Yankees manager Billy Martin with his arms around former players Joe Di-Maggio and Mickey Mantle. Gerry Long, a former Rotary Club district governor, donated the photo, which was taken at a Yankees old-timers game and autographed by

all three men. Long is unsure of the date the photo was taken.

The children, ages 8-16, are affiliated with Bethlehem's Northeast Ministry, a nonprofit organization that helps disadvantaged youth and families. Some of the kids had never been to a baseball game, said Stephen Godbolt, executive director of Northeast Ministry, and wouldn't have had the opportunity if

Long hadn't auctioned the photo.

"The only reason I did it was because I wanted to make it happen for the kids," said Long, a big Phillies fan who says he has trouble parting with any collectible.

But Long doesn't have trouble remembering his

first baseball game: the Philadelphia Athletics against the St. Louis Browns at Philadelphia's Shibe Park.

The year was 1940, and Long's father made sure his 6-year-old son had a hot dog. Now, Long's hoping the kids had a similar ex-

perience during Wednesday night's game against the San Francisco Giants. It was Strike Out Hunger Night, and fans were asked to bring a nonperishable food item to the game.

Long wanted to make sure the kids didn't go hungry. So he made sure the funding from the Rotary Club was sufficient for the kids to have a hot dog at their first game, just as he did.

"You never forget those things," Long said.

Tax Filing Time for Clubs!

AN IMPORTANT REMINDER: All Clubs, regardless of size, have a tax filing requirement for the year ended June 30, 2009. The IRS deadline is November 15, 2009. If the Club generates less than \$25,000 in gross receipts, a Form 990n (e-postcard)

can be used. Otherwise Clubs should file Form 990EZ (most Clubs should be able to do this) or Form 990. Check with your friendly accountant! (If you don't have one in your Club RECRUIT one!)

LIFE CHANGING! We saw life changing for 90 persons, mostly children, in Pereira, Colombia, South America.

Picture over 220 families waiting quietly, in lines outside the Pereira Hospital, waiting patiently for hours for us to arrive at 7AM for what will take 14 hours before most will be seen. Each is hopeful that their child will be able to have surgery.

For many, this was not the first nor the last surgery. Lip muscles stretch as a little face grows. Sometimes it pulls their noses down for a flattened appearance, alters their speech. It requires another surgery. We saw some teens that had 5 or more surgeries in their lives. The good news is that they DID HAVE THOSE SURGERIES. The good news is that most get speech pathology.

The good news is we performed 137 procedures on 90 patients. Today, in Pereira, there are 90 people whose lives have been made better, whose self-esteem is a little higher when they look in the mirror, and whose families have been touched by a Rotaplast visit. Per Randy Floyd, Harleysville Rotary Club, "I feel blessed to have been associated with a team of such dedicated, competent and compassionate professionals who have taken their time to aid those less fortunate. I always think that one of the children (or adults), who have had their

life improved because of Rotaplast, may one day be the founder of world peace, win the Nobel Prize, discover the cure for a horrible disease".

Spring Township Centennial Rotarian on Extreme Makeover!

Trisha Urban, a member of the Spring Town-ship Centennial Rotary Club in Berks County, PA, District 7430 has made the national scene when she and her 1 ½ year old daughter Cora were selected by the popular ABC network TV Reality Show Extreme Makeover — Home Edition hosted by Ty Pennington to be the recipient of a brand new home at no cost to the Urbans. The excitement and hoopla surrounding the selection of Trish Urban to receive the new home became a centerpiece of activity and fun throughout Berks County for much of the summer.

Here's the story behind why the Urbans were selected to get a new home at no cost. Andrew and Trisha Urban bought an 18th century log home with some acreage in Tilden Township just north of Reading in Berks County and had a plan to restore the property which was in dire need to improvements and repairs. On their property they raised goats, horses and other animals. Money was tight, the amount of work the property needed was substantial and Trish and Andy (age 30) were busy with careers and Andy continuing his education. Trish became pregnant and was due to deliver their first child, Cora, in February 2009. On February 5, it was time to go to the hospital for the birth and Andy went outside to feed the animals. When he didn't come in, Trish went looking for Andy and found him collapsed near the front gate. Trish called 911

and Andy and her were taken to the hospital where Andy was pronounced dead at 12:53pm and less than 9 hours later, Cora was born. Andy had died of a heart attack caused by a congenital heart defect.

What a bittersweet day for the family. The horror of a young husband and father to be dying at age 30 and the birth a beautiful baby girl Cora the same day.

Suddenly Trisha became a single mother with a brand new baby and saddled with a mountain of debt and a home in total disrepair. Moldy basement, electrical outlets hanging off the wall, holes plugged with foam, contaminated water, and more. The financial burden, not to mention the pain of Andy's death, would have crushed many people. Not Trish. She chose to go on the offensive and do all that she could to keep on the path that her and Andy had planned. The community stepped up and helped in many ways. And then, to cap it off, the Extreme Makeover nomination arose and against significant odds Trish and Cora's story carried the day and they were selected to receive a new beautiful home.
