

# NOMINATING COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS GEOFFREY RIES

The recommendation of the Nominating Committee the for our 2013-2014 District Governor is Geoffrey Ries of the Rotary Club of Ambler. Pursuant to Rotary District 7430's Procedures & Guidelines at a meeting that took place on December 13, 2010, all proposed candidates were considered for this position.



Please note that our District Procedures and Guidelines state that "any club in the district may propose a candidate for district governor nominee whose name had previously been duly submitted. If the district governor receives a proposal from a club on or before February 1<sup>st</sup> and it remains effective as of February 15<sup>th</sup>, the district governor shall notify all clubs in the District of the name and qualifications of each such candidate and that all such candidates will be balloted upon at the next succeeding District Conference by certified electors from each Rotary club.

In the absence of any alternative nomination per above, and within the specified period, Geoffrey Ries will become the District 7430 Governor-Nominee effective July 1, 2011.

1,450 different people visited our site 5,850 times they logged in 15,275 times they looked at item pages 1,775 bids were made on 249 items






#### **TV Show**

These preparations include contacting their local high schools to encourage student participation, making in-school presentations about Rotary and the Speech Contest, and planning for the club contests.

The top finishers in the club contests will compete in one of three Regional contests in April. The top finishers in each of the Regional contests will compete for the District championship on April 30 at the District Conference.

# THE BASIS for CLUB SUCCESS

<u>MEMBERSHIP!</u> This is one of the key measures of a Rotary Club's effectiveness. Does it attract new members? Are its numbers growing?

You have heard the reasons for the need to attract new members:

- To replace those the Club will lose in the year, due to a variety of reasons;
- To retain fresh contacts with the community the Club serves;
- To replenish the Club's energy with new ideas;
- To ensure the Club has the talent and resources to meet the Club's, and its community's, needs.

So, how are Clubs doing? So far, the 2010-11 Rotary year has seen a growth of more than 40 members from the starting point on July 1<sup>st</sup>. Some Clubs are up significantly, while a number have smaller gains.

The key, still, for successful Clubs: <u>They have a plan!</u> Almost every one involves members in meeting the goals. Members are consistently reminded of their role to be on the lookout for candidates. Some Clubs turn referrals from members over to a person or team for the follow up work.

# MEMBERSHIP MAGIC

#### Rotarians share ideas on member retention

When it comes to recruiting and retaining members, creativity is the name of the game. Consider these ideas.

Diana Wood Howard, president of the Rotary Club of Spring Valley (Columbia), South Carolina says membership has never been better since the club decided to move its meetings to a brand-new grand hall at a local church. "We've inducted 20 new members in less than 18 months," Howard notes. "Don't be afraid to think outside the box for a new meeting venue" she advises.

Howard says it's also important to get new members involved early. "Our 'newbies,' as we refer to them, organized a PolioPlus fundraiser this past July."

Elizabeth Penny, president of the Rotary Club of South Ukiah, California, says her club encourages members to bring their children to meetings. As a breakfast club, it meets early enough to allow members to get their children to school.

"We're a pretty informal club, and we wanted to be welcoming to younger parents," she says. "It has worked really well for us. The children have their own table and call themselves 'Rotary kids.' They even have their own project: collecting used towels and blankets from hotels and donating them to the humane society."

The Rotary clubs of Sebastopol and Sebastopol Sunrise, California, focus on fellowship. Every Spring, Rotarians volunteer to host an evening meal at their homes for three members of their own club with whom they're less familiar.

"We match participants based on their not having significant relationships with each other," says David G. Mark-Raymond, of the Sebastopol Sunrise club. "The idea is to develop new relationships and be more inclusive."

Mentoring new members is a most effective way to improve retention. A club in North America created a committee to provide up to three years of mentoring to newer members. The club saw retention improve significantly in the first five years of the program.

Another club holds a "mixer dinner" once a week: One member volunteers to host three other members, selected by lottery, and their significant others for dinner. A third club developed a buddy system, pairing up new members with existing ones.
