## Highlights from the April 2019 Rotary International Board of Directors Meeting

The fourth 2018–19 RI Board of Directors meeting was held on 8–11 April 2019 in Evanston, IL, USA. At this meeting, the Board reviewed 11 committee reports and recorded 44 decisions.

#### **Clubs and Districts**

The Board

□ agreed to implement to all districts, beginning 1 July 2021, a new district governor funding model (in pilot now through 2021), whereby RI funds governors via district accounts and governors are required to document full use of their funds, returning any unused portion to Rotary;

□ amended its qualifications for serving on a district committee to allow for the selection of Rotaractors;

□ agreed to continue conducting its non-club-based participant model test, which aims to create new channels into Rotary, build awareness of the Rotary brand, diversify participation in Rotary, and to increase Rotary's openness and appeal;

□ approved the formation of Rotary clubs in Iraq.

#### **Administration and Finances**

The Board

□ took several decisions regarding the power of the RI president, including

o requesting the president-elect to nominate no fewer than twice the number of candidates for election as Foundation trustees as there will be open positions for (not including the position to be held by an RI past president);

o agreeing that effective 1 July 2020, Rotary will not fund the expenses of a president's representative to district conferences that do not meet certain attendance requirements;

o agreeing that effective 1 July 2020, president's representatives shall not be appointed to more than one conference per Rotary year;

□ regarding Rotary committees

o agreed that all Board decisions creating a new committee or task force that is to last beyond the current Rotary year must identify:

a. a defined trial and evaluation period of not more than four years;

b. anticipated impact on Rotary's resources for the duration of the trial and evaluation period;

c. criteria by which the success or failure of the committee or task force will be measured;

d. dates for interim evaluations and reports to the Board;

e. a date of the final evaluation, following which the Board may adopt it as an ongoing committee or task force, terminate the committee or task force, or extend the trial and evaluation period as needed;

Highlights from the April 2019 Rotary International Board of Directors Meeting continued

□ in reviewing the Rotary brand

o requested all users of the Rotary Marks to come into visual brand compliance as soon as possible;

o agreed not to publish in official Rotary media, after 31 July 2019, any advertisements or other information that are not in brand compliance;

o agreed not to permit any exhibitions at all official Rotary events that are not in brand compliance;

□ approved a five-year roadmap through 2024 as a guide for implementing the new strategic plan with specific activities and target completion dates for each of the four strategic priorities;

□ extended the strategic partnership with the Institute for Economics and Peace through 2022 and the project partnership with ShelterBox through 2022;

agreed to add the African Development Bank and the Asian Development Bank to the list of organizations to which Rotary has representation.



## A Rotary Meeting is Whatever You Want it to Be

Museums, hiking, movie festivals, tennis, live mu-sic, tango lessons and more. What do these all have in common? They are Rotary meetings.

Once a month, in addition to two formal meetings and at least one volunteer service project, the Rotary Club of Metro NYC has a cultural or outdoor activity. Says President Elect Valissa Mayers, "Metro is not your typical club, and as such not all our meetings are conventional. We see meetings as any activity which builds fellowship. Our Fireside Fourth meetings are relaxed and entertaining, energetic and informative, fun-filled and member bonding."

RCMNYC was chartered 17 years ago by Rotaractors who hit 30 and wanted a Rotary experience that reflected their diversity, need for schedule flexibility, and need for an affordable way to be a Rotarian. It was part of a pilot program that allowed Rotary clubs to only meet twice a month encouraging young professionals to join.

If in one month the Fireside Fourth isn't for you, it's OK because there will be something totally different next month! Nico played tennis in Central Park, Kelly invited to a nature documentary film festival, Sabina arranged a Friday night museum meetup, Dean invited to hear his friend conduct a symphony. Stefan, who has hosted everything from a Stock Exchange closing bell visit to a Bryant Park accordion festival, notes that "it is ideal for recent or prospective members to get to know our club." It's also been an amazing experience for international Rotarians who come for a Rotary meeting while in NYC.

For clubs who still have weekly breakfast, lunch or dinner meetings, why not try something different? Keep three of those meetings and make the fourth a social activity. It's allows members to really connect, prospects to get to know Rotary while having fun, and it's an easy way to show all members their ideas matter. Wherever you're located, there is something of historic, outdoor, cultural, culinary interest to share - make it a Rotary meeting!

## Highlights from the April 2019 Rotary Foundation Trustees Meeting

The Rotary Foundation Trustees met on 22–24 April 2019 in Evanston, IL, USA. At this meeting, the Trustees reviewed eight committee reports and recorded 42 decisions.

#### Administration

The Trustees

• elected a new chair, Brenda M. Cressey and vice chair Michael F. Webb, effective immediately, to serve out the remainder of the 2018–19 Rotary year;

 $\cdot$  approved a five-year roadmap through 2024 as a guide for implementing the new strategic plan with specific activities and target completion dates for each of the four strategic priorities;

 $\cdot$  extended the strategic partnership with the Institute for Economics and Peace through 2022 and the project partnership with ShelterBox through 2022;

 $\cdot$  agreed that any new Trustee-approved activities and programs must also include success criteria and be subject to review by the Trustees within three years of approval.

Fund Development

The Trustees

· received US\$2.09 million in realized estate gifts from two estates.

#### Programs and Awards

The Trustees

• awarded four Level III grants (grants requesting between US\$100,001 to \$200,000 from the World Fund) totaling \$538,048;

• after the first comprehensive review since the Future Vision rollout, the Trustees agreed to retain all six areas of focus with some revisions to each area's policy statement and a few name changes. The areas of focus for The Rotary Foundation are:

- o Disease prevention and treatment
- o Maternal and child health
- o Water, sanitation, and hygiene\*
- o Peacebuilding and conflict prevention\*
- o Community economic development\*
- o Basic education and literacy

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## Highlights from the April 2019 Rotary Foundation Trustees Meeting continued

#### <u>Finance</u>

The Trustees

• approved a contributions budget totaling US\$339,685,000, and net investment returns budget of \$43,553,000;

 $\cdot\,$  approve the 2019–20 total program awards expenditures budget of \$304,310,000 from the following funding sources:

- Annual fund: \$137,911,000
- Temporary restricted contributions and endowment spendable earnings: \$2,898,000
- · Donor Advised funds (subject to approval by the RI Board): \$10,000,000
- PolioPlus Fund \$153,500,000

## We note the recent passing of Rotarians

#### Tore Hartman-Hanson, PDG entered eternal rest on April 29, 2019.



Born in Sarpsborg, Norway, he lived through the occupation by the Germans from 1940 to 1945. Later, he went on to study engineering in Germany.
