Foundation Matters

Morning Star Shines a Light on Literacy

In Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, Morning Star Rotarians are making Rotary International's Literacy Initiative a priority. The club has partnered with Lehigh Valley Cops 'n' Kids (CNK), a local non-profit organization affiliated with the national Cops 'n' Kids Children's Literacy Program founded by Julia Burney Witherspoon, a police officer from Racine, Wisconsin.

The goals of the program include ensuring that all children have access — in their home — to books and the knowledge, inspiration and hope that such access can provide. The program also

encourages positive relationships between children and police and inspires creative learning for children and families by providing meaningful literacy-based experiences. As a result of the organization's efforts, approximately 285,000 books have been distributed to local children!

Morning Star has partnered with Cops 'N Kids in a variety of ways:

In lieu of a mug or other gift, guest speakers at the club meetings are asked to sign a book donated in their honor to the Cops 'n' Kids program.

On the third Thursday of every month, the club is charged with coordinating a fitnessthemed Reading Room for the program. In addition to a short fitness program, club members read and interact with young Reading Room participants.

Cops 'n' Kids is one of two beneficiaries of the annual Morning Star Rotary 5K event, which is approaching its twentieth year.

Rotarians also are encouraged to participate on an individual basis in a variety of local activities sponsored by the Cops 'N' Kids organization. From science fairs to local festivals and Alex's Lemonade Stand events, club members assist CNK by serving as positive and community-minded role models involved in actual book distribution.

In February, the Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce will honor Cops 'N' Kids as the selected recipient of its Silent Auction proceeds. Morning Star Rotary is intimately involved with soliciting sponsorships and supporting this very important event.

This unique partnership allows Morning Star Rotary to take a hands-on approach to the literacy needs of its community.

Polio Progress - Nigeria Leads the Way

Nigeria is in the news a lot here, but this is for a very positive reason. 2009 will be seen as a year of significant progress in eradicating polio. The World Health Organization attributes 95% of the world's success to the work done in Nigeria. Cases there are down OVER 50%, from 783 in 2008 to 388 in 2009. Those children not immunized are below 10% of the population for the first time!

Rotarians have played a significant role through helping to overcome resistance to the vaccine, airing public service announcements, participating in and supporting National Immunization Days, advocating with government, religious and traditional leaders for increased support to end polio and holding a national workshop for Rotary leaders.

New Opportunity for International Hosting Fellowship

Initiated by the Emmaus Club in October, our District hosted a group of 10 Rotarians and spouses from District 9930, on the North Island of New Zealand. It was the first Friendship exchange in District 7430 for a good many years.

The New Zealanders were with us for 15 days and had an opportunity to visit the Emmaus Club, the Bethlehem Morning Star Club and the Saucon/Center Valley Club. Each club developed itineraries of sightseeing, cultural events, social activities and Rotary meetings and presentations. Some of the highlights included the celebration of American Holidays: Thanksgiving dinner(early), a Halloween party (even adult trick or treating), a 4th of July barbecue and the all American Potluck dinner.

The group also visited New York, Lancaster, Philadelphia, Bucks County and Washington, DC. They had a rare opportunity to see the weekday noon Bach Choir perform along with special tours of Martin Guitar and Just Born Candy. The most rewarding experience of all was the closeness and friendship that was developed between all of the hosts and our visitors. A special thanks to all of our Rotarians and families who opened up their homes to our visitors.

In February/March, 2010, 11 members and spouses of the Emmaus Club will be traveling to New Zealand on the reciprocal exchange.

Rotary's Friendship Exchange program is one of the unique programs that RI offers around the world. Rotarians and their spouses can have an opportunity to travel to another country and stay in Rotarians' homes for a period of time—generally between 10 to 15 days. Rotarians and spouses pay their expenses for travel and activities while having an opportunity to learn the culture of another country by staying with families. We plan on expanding our opportunities in our district with the Friendship Exchange program in the coming year.

Several years ago Patrick Meehan, then-US Attorney for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, spoke to the Rotary Club of Allentown about the spread of criminal gang activity in the communities along US Route 222 from Phillipsburg to Lancaster. He challenged Rotarians to become involved in activities to counter this disruptive blight.

The US government and many local and county agencies have been collaborating in different ways, one of which is the Youth Crime and Violence Task Force. A number of productive things have been initiated. Among these is the formation of the <u>Eastern PA Mentoring Partnership</u>. It works with mentoring programs and mentoring stakeholders to increase the quantity and quality of mentoring programs. The result is pro-social behaviors by persons endangered by criminal influences.
