


Run for Polio Eradication



ERC & InterAct joint meeting held at the East Penn Administration **Building**









Foundation:



PLEASE REMEMBER THAT RC GOALS TO APF & POLIO+ NEED TO BE WORKED ON.

<u>Fund Raising – The Monthly Contribution Report – 12-13 as of Feb 18th:</u> 64% of the Rotary year is now history. Clubs have reached 65% of their Annual Fund goal, \$107,364.41 of \$167,570 pledged. 17 Clubs are at 64% of their goal or better. Current *EREY* status: There are now 7 Clubs at \$100 or more per capita!

PolioPlus contributions are \$31,892.

Endowment Fund: Steady at \$2,065.

Events – District Foundation Recognition Dinner will be held March 20th, a Wednesday evening, at the William Penn Inn

<u>Grants – District/District Simplified Grants:</u> The request for 2012-13 funds has been submitted.

Global/Matching Grants: The Emmaus project with Nagpur Club for a neonatal ICU has been approved by the Rotary Foundation for a total project of \$30,804. That is the 3rd approval this year. \$24,477 of \$74,232 available is obligated for these projects. The Sierra Leone follow-on water project and the Malawi sanitation project remain under review by the Foundation.

<u>Future Vision Transition –</u> Seventeen Clubs have now signed District Grant MOUs. ONE GLOBAL GRANT MOU HAS BEEN SUBMITTED, from the Blue Bell Club.

People continue to evaluate the ClubRunner module to manage

<u>Recruiting for Open Positions –</u> More immediately, members need to be recruited for the District and Global Grant review teams, 4 or 5 each. These will meet in early April to review the proposals and recommend inclusion in the spending plan for the District Grant.



Spotlight on an Outstanding Rotarian





Dan Ritter

Dan G. Ritter was presented The Rotary Club of Ambler <u>Achievement Award</u> by Bob King, on behalf of the Club. Unlike most awards, this recognition is not given on a regular basis; it is given only when it is determined that there is a worthy recipient who has given service to the club and the community over an extended period of time.

Dan was chosen because of his involvement in all aspects of the Ambler Club and his commitment to the Ambler community. When Dan opened his business in Ambler, he wanted to become a contributing member of the community. He approached local banker, John Shoemaker, and inquired about joining Rotary. Interestingly enough, Mr. Shoemaker told Dan that "he hadn't been in business long enough" and that his membership in Rotary "would have to wait."

Undaunted Dan joined the Rotary Club of Ambler in 1966. Dan was President of the Club during its 50th anniversary celebration in 1975. In 2003 Dan was asked to become a Trustee of the club. Until then a trustee was a largely honorary role. Dan proved to be a valuable resource for the Board of Directors and the Trustee role has developed to become one of wise counsel to the directors.

Dan has been active at the District level as a member of the Camp Neidig committee for over 30 years, where he serves as the Treasurer. He is a strong member of that committee and has helped educate and train over 4,000 High School students.

Dan is a major donor to the Rotary Foundation. His wife Anne is a Paul Harris fellow. Dan has attended many District Conferences and several R.I. Conventions.

Dan has 46 years of perfect attendance. He attributes his desire to attend his club's meetings as well as "make-up" opportunities, not to keeping "perfect attendance" status, but instead to his love of Rotary, the friendships he has made through it and Rotary's ability to bring about a positive impact in all that it does.

In addition to his involvement with Rotary, Dan has left a lasting mark on the Ambler community through his involvement with Ambler Savings Bank. Dan joined the Board of Directors of the Ambler Savings and Loan Association in 1972.

Eagle Scout Recognition





Rotary Fellowship of International Scouting on behalf of Rotary International honored Matthew Kessler, of Bethlehem PA with a certificate recognizing his attainment of the rank of Eagle Scout. DG Tony Jannetta presented this certificate on Sunday, February 17th at Matthew's Court of Honor. Matthew, 16, has been a scout since he was 10 years old. He is joining an elite group of Scouts (3%) that attain this highest level in Boy Scouting. Matt is a junior at Freedom H.S., a black belt in Karate and active in his Church. He is the son of Lindsay and Gary Kessler and the grandson of PDG Bill and Karen Jahn.

Rotary International has been a partner with the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides in serving young

people since their inception. As Rotary spread around the world, its support of Scouting and Girl Guiding also spread. In 1916, Rotarians in Edinburgh, Scotland, joined by 100 local Scouts, organized a special Christmas party for children whose fathers were serving in World War I. In 1922, the Rotary Club of Manila, Philippines, established a local Scout council. Rotary Clubs from Australia to Brunei built huts for Girl Guide groups.

IFSR has produced full color recognition certificates for your Rotary Club or District to present to U. S. and Canadian Scouts and Guides that achieve their association's highest award. What a great opportunity not only to recognize a young man or woman for his/her Outstanding Achievement, but to make these prospective future Rotarians aware of Rotary and its programs. 

Matching Grants History in D7430:

The first on record was approved 30 Dec 1992 and was from the Springfield Twp-Flourtown RC working with the Port au Prince RC of Haiti and


helped provide medicines. The Club provided \$8,000 which was matched by The Rotary Foundation for a total budget of \$16,000.



Clubs have provided more than \$325,000 and the District has committed \$505,000 in District Designated Funds. The Rotary Foundation has added almost \$1.7 MILLION to those funds and funding from Clubs and Districts elsewhere to bring the total project value to very near \$3 MILLION.

Those numbers include 9 grants to support District Simplified Grants with a total of \$150,000, all from The Rotary Foundation, based on the contributions from Rotarians and Clubs in District 7430.

Did you know that Rotary founder **Paul Harris** wasn't the first President of a Rotary club? That distinction is actually held by Harris's friend Silvester Schiele, who served as the first President of the Rotary Club of Chicago. Harris deferred his club leadership duties until February 1907, when he was elected the third president of the Chicago club.


