their successors information and support for the 2014-15 Rotary year.

From my visits to the Clubs this year and the various newsletters, events I attended and updates I received, I know there were many progressive and successful initiatives energizing many Clubs in our District.

Sri Lankan Name Rotary International's 105th president



K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran, a businessman from Colombo, Sri Lanka, has been named the 105th president of Rotary International, a global network of 1.2 million volunteers working to solve the world's humanitarian challenges.

A member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, he begins his one-year term July 1, 2015. He is the first Sri Lankan to hold the position.

Ravindran said his main priority will be to strengthen clubs by attracting those committed to volunteer service.

After the devastation of the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, the Sri Lankan led Rotary's recovery efforts by helping raise \$12 million to rebuild 22 schools, enabling nearly 15,000 children to resume their studies.

"The tsunami could take away schools, homes, possessions and even loved ones, but it would never be allowed to take away the spirit of children," Ravindran said.

He was also involved in tsunami-related projects in Sri Lanka, Indonesia, India and Thailand. The projects included housing, orphanages, water and sanitation systems, solar oven technology, community-based credit unions, health centers and replacement of destroyed fishing trawlers.

It is important to build on these positive efforts as the new leadership sets the seeds for their own endeavors to invigorate our Rotarians.

However, it is not time to take the foot off the accelerator for this year's leaders. There are still four months left to fulfill our goals and contributions to the life and success of our Clubs. As we hit the two thirds mark in our year, we need to make sure we are completing our goals. Are we two-thirds of the way towards our Foundation goal, our membership goal, and our fundraising goal? Is our grant application for RY 2014-15 submitted? Have we made the planned progress toward our development of an Interact Club, Rotaract Club, community service projects, 4Way Test Speech Contest, Youth Exchange Sponsorship, Camp Neidig candidates? Have we taken the time to review the various awards that our Club is eligible for or the deadline dates for applying for these awards?

Sri Lankan Named RI President continued

As president, Ravindran will oversee Rotary's top humanitarian goal of eradicating polio. As chair of Rotary's polio eradication campaign in Sri Lanka, he led efforts to eradicate polio from the country, which became one of the first in Asia to be polio-free.

Ravindran is founder and CEO of Printcare Plc, a publicly listed tea packaging company. He is also founding president of the Sri Lanka Anti-Narcotics Association, the largest antinarcotics organization in Sri Lanka.

A Rotarian since 1974, Ravindran has been a director and treasurer of Rotary International and a trustee of The Rotary Foundation.

RI President Ron Burton's CITATION for ROTARY CLUBS & Interact & Rotaract Clubs



Most of our D7430 Rotary Clubs have done enough good things to help others so that they have earned a Presidential Citation from RI President Burton for this 2013-14 Rotary year. Just fill out the application form to make it happen.

The 2013-14 Presidential Citation recognizes Rotary clubs for an array of achievements that promote our membership growth, enhance

humanitarian service through our Foundation, and strengthen our network through the family of Rotary. By qualifying for the Presidential Citation, clubs contribute to Rotary's strategic goals and multiply the impact of their good work through the collective focus of more than 34,000 Rotary clubs worldwide.



Procedure:

Clubs are asked to use the form at https://www.rotary.org/en/document/587 to assess their accomplishments this year. To qualify for the Presidential Citation, clubs must complete all three required activities, along with three additional activities in each category.

Clubs that complete four additional activities in each category will qualify for the <u>Presidential Citation with Distinction</u>. Unless otherwise specified, all activities must be undertaken and completed between 1 July and 31 March of the 2013-14 Rotary year.

Clubs should complete the form and send it to the District Governor, Frank Romano, no later than March 31st. Forms sent to Rotary International will NOT be processed.

Let's maintain that spirit because we can and we care."

What's It Like at an RI International Assembly?

My wife Lynne and I had the distinct privilege of attending the Rotary International Assembly in San Diego this January 12 – 17 and it was, in a word, FABULOUS! From the moment we arrived until the closing ceremony we were in awe of the power that Rotary International has around the world.

The first and probably most amazing news is that polio has been eradicated in India. This announcement received a standing ovation from an international audience of more than 530 district governors-elect, their spouses, and many other Rotarians from around the globe. Eradication of polio is Rotary International's signature project. The success of this program has proven that such a huge goal can be accomplished through persistent and dedicated efforts of Rotarians and allied groups throughout the world.

The primary purpose of this assembly, which is an annual Rotary event, is to provide training to district governors-elect and their spouses to support their efforts in the upcoming year. And they introduce the assembly to the incoming Rotary International president.

This was a most impressive opportunity! Each day, Lynne and I met people from all parts of the world, all with goals and ambitions for improving the quality of human lives in the focus areas of promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, saving mothers and children, supporting education, and growing local economies. There were no political boundaries in this arena. Everyone was united through Rotary.

The conference was extremely well-organized. Our badges were scanned as we entered each plenary meeting, each session, and all meals. Seats were assigned in the plenary meetings with printed nametags on every seat! Sergeants-at-arms took attendance. All sessions began and ended on time! Large screens projected the images of speakers and headsets were provided to all members of the audience with eight different translation offerings. The mood throughout the week was upbeat, positive, and unifying.

Incoming Rotary International President Gary Huang, who is from Taiwan, presented his theme for Rotary during his year in office. The theme "LIGHT UP ROTARY!" was proclaimed through a series of Rotary moments and in a blaze of digital fireworks.

While both Lynne and I attended the plenary sessions together, a variety of separate workshops were provided for district governors-

elect and spouses. Lynne learned a lot about the goals of the Rotary Foundation and was extremely excited about having the opportunity to discuss Rotary with other spouses from around the world. I found the sessions that I attended offered me an opportunity to share leadership ideas with district governors-elect from many different cultures.

The people we met were professional, sincere, and very friendly. We were invited to visit our new friends in India, the United Kingdom, Italy, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Thailand, Taiwan, Australia, New Zealand, Zambia, Mexico, and Brazil. We both agreed that if Rotary ran the world, there would be no wars, people would work together, and human conditions would improve.

Some of the featured activities and programs included a most impressive "Presentation of Flags of the Rotary World" and many excellent, dynamic speakers who shared their Rotary moments and inspirational stories. Two especially fun evening events included International Night and Festival Night. Both evenings provided participating countries an opportunity to dress in native costumes and present skits with a particular cultural flair.



As I reflect on my week in San Diego, I am proud to be part of such an amazing organization. I am inspired by Rotarians around the world and I am looking forward to my term as District Governor in the upcoming year. Building on President Gary Huang's theme "Light Up Rotary," I am announcing my theme – "Light Up Rotary With Education."

Monday 27 January 2014 Rebuilding likely to take years in Philippines

"The immense devastation on Leyte island is difficult to comprehend," said ShelterBox Response Team member Marie Vincent. "At first glance when you scratch the surface you soon learn that the typhoon also destroyed people's livelihoods and has left the survivors with traumatic psychological

scars. There are children who cannot make eye contact, individuals who are struggling to find the motivation to move on and an underlying anxiety that it will happen again. The economical and human recovery will take years rather than months."

It may be nearly three months since Typhoon Haiyan swept through the Philippines but the people have far from forgotten. Aid agencies like ShelterBox are still finding pockets of previously unrecognized need to address and continue to bring shelter and vital aid to communities who have been left with nothing.

"As the scale of the disaster area is so vast, we've been working in partnership with other organizations to join resources and maximize our combined reach," said response team member Steve Crabtree. "In this instance, we joined up with Handicap International who were already assessing some hard-to-reach areas to the west and south of Tacloban, on the island of Leyte."

One of the villages where ShelterBox and Handicap International have been working together is Cancajara in the Pastrana

municipality. It is a deeply rural area where the main source of income is agriculture though the local cocoa plantations have suffered heavily from the storm. As a result, rebuilding is likely to

take years for a family.
This is the case for the
Esperanza family. 80-year-old
Dora is a mother of two, still
caring for her sons who are
both in their fifties and work as
rice and cocoa farmers. They
had lost their home in the storm
and had built a dangerously
unstable makeshift shelter that
did not meet the minimum
humanitarian needs

requirements. This is where ShelterBox came in.



Regain sense of normalcy

Sophie Meingast is Handicap International's Project Manager in their Emergency Response Division:

"Providing a ShelterBox as emergency shelter following typhoon Yolanda has been great for the most vulnerable households," said Meingast. "Including items such as kitchen sets and toys for the children in the box allows families to regain a sense of normalcy following the catastrophe."

Vincent added, "In Pastrana we distributed ShelterBox aid to some of the most vulnerable families. This may only be a small contribution to the overall recovery but the family hugely appreciated the help. One of the sons kept repeating 'salamat, salamat' meaning 'thank you, thank you, thank you'. It is important to pass on this thanks to our donors."

Paul Harris Fellow recognition was established in 1957 to show appreciation for contributions, and to encourage substantial ones, to what was then the Foundation's only program: Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships. Today, the recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.




Club Holds Membership Recruitment Night


Thirty or so Morning Star Rotarians, family and friends enjoyed an evening of BOWLING, fellowship and food on Saturday, February 8th.




Vocational Training Team (VTT) Project is Launched

A Global Grant covering a Vocational Training Team (VTT) Project dedicated to Improving Maternal & Child Healthcare Education in Uganda has been launched.

This project is an example of how a Rotary Foundation Global Grant was developed to provide for the exchange of a vocational training team of medical (Ob-Gyn, Pediatric, Nursing, Midwife)



The project has been envisioned as a three year/ three phase project. Phase I has been approved RY 2014-2015, sponsored by Rotary Districts 7430, 7450, 7500 in USA and 9211 (Uganda-Tanzania) and managed through the host club in Uganda, RC Kampala North and the international partner RC Bluebell USA. The Rotary Foundation award for Phase 1 was the amount of \$81,000 and is funding a two-way exchange of faculty doctor, nurses and midwives in the areas of OB-Gyn and Pediatric care, will purchase and install the computer networks and provide needed infrastructure and medical equipment at four "pilot" Health Centers in Uganda along with Mulago Hospital/Makerere University-College of Health Sciences (MakCHS).







Vocational Training Team (VTT) Project is Launched continued

Phase's II – III, under development, will support additional VTT exchanges and grow in size to better attend to the infrastructural and educational needs of the pilot Health Centers. We are envisioning an approximate total 3 year investment of \$450 - \$500,000. If your district would like to join in this precedent setting Global Grant for Maternal and Child Health in its future phases... please contact PDG Ron Smith of D7430.

The VTT-Drexel half visited Uganda from January 25th – February 14th. Eight members from Drexel University and I, the VTT Team leader spent three weeks engaging in health camps in areas around Kampala. Every member including the team leader has been transformed by the visit and by our hosts in Uganda. The professional relationships and friendships developed will sustain our efforts way beyond when our Rotary Foundation funding has ended... that is sustainability.



During our visits over 800 mother and child patients were seen by our team in partnership with Makerere University/Mulago Hospital and RC of Kampala North Rotarians. Our sponsored doctors and nurse-midwives were FANTASTIC on this first part of the project. They made lasting contributions to the professional collaborations, attended to hundreds of children, saving the life of one young boy and saw hundreds of mothers and delivered one emergency C-section.

A faculty team from Makerere University will visit Drexel University in May 2014 to complete the two way VTT and will solidify the professional and educational foundation that will be the basis of the success of this project. Our Rotary Foundation's New Grants Programs through a Global Grant has provided for this VTT to "Do Good in the World"...

The Global Grant / VTT was applied for on-line at the "Grant portal" of the Rotary website staring in August 2014. It was completed and authorized by October 2014, we had TRF's check list feedback in 2-3 weeks and after responding to the TRF review



questions the grant was approved December 5, 2013, the funds were sent to the host and international clubs by January 15th and the VTT-Drexel departed on January 25th... Approvals can move quickly but it all started with a solid plan developed over 24 months.
