Around the district this time of year if you spy the "jolly old elf" it's most likely to be a Rotarian supporting needy families in our communities. During this holiday season many of our district clubs run events to make the season bright for hundreds of families. Here are just a few of them:

Operation Sugar Plum

Every year for the last eight years the Blue Bell Rotarians run a holiday party at the Willow Grove Naval Air Station to benefit military families. Last year almost 500 soldiers and their families were treated to a party at which each child received a \$30 gender-and-age-appropriate toy. Additionally a splendid array of donated door prizes adds up to a truly memorable way of saying thank-you to our military. Blue Bell Rotarians raise \$9,000 each year to make this party work, and the Blue Bell Rotary Foundation is still welcoming sponsors at \$30 per child.

Adopt-a-Family

The Spring Ford Rotarians, in partnership with the Spring Ford High School Interact Club and their teachers association, has for the past 5 years run this event during the holiday season. The teachers and Interactors identify specific needs of approximately 100 families in their school district. These "gift lists" consist of food, warm clothing, children's toys and supermarket gift cards. Every year the Rotarians and Interactors get together and wrap all of these gifts, which are then distributed by the Interactors. This annual event not only helps the needy families but also gives the Interact club a lesson in "service Above Self". Head Start Christmas Party

The Norristown Rotarians in partnership with the local Head Start Program are sponsoring this long running Christmas Party. Head Start is a federally funded, family focused and community oriented program meeting the social, emotional, health, and nutritional needs of income eligible children aged 3-5 years. Every year "Santa" takes the "elves" (Rotarians and Interactors – with hats & bells) to the Head Start center in town where they distributes gifts to about 125 children. Additionally the librarian elf gives each child an age appropriate book. Snacks are served and a good time is had by all. A Magical Rotary Day at the United Nations - 2010

The UN is a magnet, drawing people to New York from all over the world. And on November 6th more than 1100, including 500+ for the Youth Program, came from all over the Rotary World to <u>Ro-tary-UN Day</u>. Three Past Presidents of Rotary International, and a fourth by video, addressed the crowd assembled in the spirit of the special relationship Rotary enjoys with the UN – A "club of nations" which Rotarians were so instrumental in nurturing.

Contrary to some rumors, the UN is <u>not</u> a world government, it does not tax people, it has no military component. It is a place to discuss issues and reach consensus on priorities. One of those efforts resulted in the Millennium Development Goals in 2000, specific goals in 8 areas to reduce poverty and hunger, improve health, education and human rights, address environmental issues and promote sustainable economic development by 2015. Past RI President ('87-'88) Charles Keller, from California, PA, connected the goals to the Rotary Foundation's 6 Focus Areas: <u>Peace and conflict prevention/resolution</u>

Disease prevention and treatment

Water and sanitation

Maternal and child health

Basic education and literacy

Economic and community development



Other speakers reinforced this connection, including emphasizing the impact improving water and

sanitation has on the Polio Eradication and other health improvement efforts.

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A panel on Literacy highlighted the impact of the effort focused on educating girls: One girl will educate her mother and make sure her own children are educated, at least 3 generations. The Youth Panel featured Rotaractors, one from Australia and one from Hungary. These articulate young people's projects combated human trafficking in Asia and addressed the education needs of the Roma minority. The latter was sparked by his experience as a Youth Ex-

change student in Washington state!

Past RI President ('06-'07) Bill Boyd brought us up to date on the Rotary/USAID International H2O Collaboration. Each contributed \$3 million to fund three projects in the Dominican Republic, Ghana and the Philippines. One of the speakers on this issue, Frederik Pischke, UN-Water's adviser to the Secretary, had spoken at a March 2010 meeting of the Reading and West Reading-Wyomissing Clubs with the World Affairs Council of Greater Reading. (PROGRAM CHAIRS: The UN offers speakers to Rotary Clubs on a variety of topics for large enough crowds!) He made the point that we should think about the "water footprint" of our choices, just as we might think of our carbon footprint.

On balance, it was sobering to hear what needs to still be done, it was encouraging to hear the progress made and it was inspiring to realize that we Rotarians, in our communities and joining together, are making real contributions to that progress!

Group Study Exchange -- Friends for a lifetime

Did you ever meet someone-- become friends-- spend some time-- the other person lives halfway around the world-- so they leave---- you say "you will keep in touch"-- "we will see you again"--- but-- life goes on-- you keep in touch for a while-- you are busy- they are busy-- and eventually you never hear from them again.....sound familiar???

It doesn't have to be that way!!!!

In 2007 our district hosted a Group Study Exchange TEAM from South Africa. At the time I was DISTRICT GSE Vice Chair-- so I had an opportunity to interact with the whole team. The team was lead by Rotarian Jaap Steyn with team members Keri Lynn Thompson, an IT professor, Ferdi Van Vyk a high school teacher, Jack Adams, an optometrist and Carl Haller a hotel/resort manager.-- re-member that group???

At the end of 2007, on a trip to Africa, my husband and I did have an opportunity to spend a couple of days with Jaap and Kim on their farm in the Free State. They told us that a couple of days is just not enough and we must come back and spend more time to see their part of South Africa.

Our wish came true. In September and October of 2010, Chris and I spent six weeks in Africa—two weeks in Zambia, two weeks in Zimbabwe and-- then we spent two weeks in South Africa with Jaap and Kim.

Ferdi has two daughters now and is still crazy as ever and very active in teaching at the private girls school. Keri Lynn continues in her career in IT and has met a special young gentleman (we will see what the future brings.) The highlights of our trip (too numerous to mention) included visiting the Valley of Desolation, tracking a sick roan with a veterinarian on a game farm, visiting a township in Port Alfred and staying at the highest point in South Africa near the Lesotho border...

All of the team says hello and sends their best to all of their past host families and would really like all of you to visit them sometime.

This trip is just another example of how Rotary interaction can span a lifetime, and how those friendships can last forever----Our theme this year "Rotary Is Magic" sure has been magic for me......hope it can be for all of you.

Polio Eradication Magic

Online contributions break records 18-24 October

As of 27 October 2010 RI reported that during the week of 18-24 October, approximately US\$2.8 million was raised in online contributions for PolioPlus. Since then the total has risen to \$3.8 million. To honor World Polio Day on 24 October, The Rotary Foundation offered for the first time double Paul Harris Fellow recognition points for online-only contributions of US\$100 or more during that week. Rotarians sure are generous.

The results represent a significant increase in online donations. To compare, \$660,000 in online donations to PolioPlus were made from January to September 2010.

As of November 15th 2010, Rotarians have raised about \$154 million for Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. These contributions will help Rotary raise \$200 million to match \$355 million in challenge grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. The resulting \$555 million will directly support immunization campaigns in developing countries, where polio continues to infect and paralyze children, robbing them of their futures and compounding the hardships faced by their families.

REMEMER THE IRS

As we approach December 31st we might consider sending in our donations to the RI Foundation Annual Programs Fund (APF) to help reduce what we might owe to the IRS for this tax year. RI's recent article reminds us that "TRF-DIRECT makes contributing easier."

There is an easy way for donors in North America to contribute to The Rotary Foundation. By enrolling in TRF-DIRECT, you can automatically transfer funds electronically from your checking, savings, or credit card accounts to the Foundation.

Once enrolled, you can choose whether to give to the Annual Programs Fund (to support the Every Rotarian, Every Year initiative) or PolioPlus (to support Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge). You no longer need to remember when to make your contributions. All transactions through TRF-DIRECT are secure and will eliminate the worry of checks getting lost in the mail.

One tax receipt is issued at the end of the calendar year for easy accounting. All contributions count toward Paul Harris Fellow and Major Donor recognition. Annual Programs Fund contributions count toward Sustaining Member recognition.

Membership Magic

Rotarians constantly are urged to bring in new members to our Rotary family. Why? Well the need for our services has not diminished over time. The world's population continues to grow, and the problems of poverty, sickness and hunger are in no way fully addressed.

Here are some specific reasons why membership growth is so important for Rotary:

- Membership growth increases Rotary's capacity for service.
- New Rotarians bring fresh ideas, new interests, and increased energy to our clubs.
- More members increase the volume of support for The Rotary Foundation.
- Diversity in membership ensures that the club is relevant to the entire community.
- Service-minded individuals are given the opportunity to help their communities through Rotary.
- More members create a larger network for both local and international fellowship.
- New and younger members ensure the future of Rotary and its work.

So, in our travels in the coming weeks, let each of us make an extra effort to invite a prospective member to visit our club. You surely will be doing that person a favor.

More Polio Eradication Magic

Something remarkable is happening in Rotary's effort to eradicate polio from the world. The number of new cases in Nigeria are down 97% and in India they are down 93%.

As of November 15th 2010 the number of new cases of the wild polio virus in the four remaining endemic countries are:

Afghanistan	20	24	38
Pakistan	111	76	89

We are getting even closer.
