The focus of the Duck Race is to give these organizations a way to raise money for their endeavors - and the more tickets they sold, gave them more reward to take home. Organizations like Vietnam Veterans, Campfire USA, Springford Rotary Club, Meals On Wheels and the PRCEF know how valuable this can be they're going back with over \$1,000 each. Eighteen other organizations receive monies varying from \$100 to \$800.

We have requested and obtained two Matching Grants from The Rotary Foundation for \$10,000 each. Both of these Grants supply clean, potable water to very poor communities that live in slum areas around Lima, Peru. Water filters will remove the solid particles and the pathogens in the water.

The ceramic portion of the filters contains colloidal silver that effectively eliminates the pathogens. The cost of each filter is \$23 ; they are manufactured in Peru , and have an estimated life of 3 years.

For both of the Matching Grants, the Primary Host is the Lima Sunrise Club, District 4450, and our Club is the Primary International Club.

Linda R. Young, Rotarian

During the month of May in 2001 a wonderful event took place. Linda Young became a member of the Quakertown Rotary club. Since then she has continued to make a positive difference to others across many borders and within our district.

The first time that Linda heard the story of children receiving smiles because of Rotaplast missions is when she changed from being a member of a Rotary club to being a *Rotarian*. Her passion arew and arew and led her to become the Chair of the District Rotaplast Committee. It also took her on a mission to Barquismeto, Venezuela in 2008. A six-year-old boy, blind from birth, plays for the Yankees in the Miracle League and takes his turn with the other 14 team members, ranging in age from 5 to late teens. On this special ball field there are no obstructions. The pitcher's mound and the bases are flat.

Representing the RC of Easton and a principle speaker at this dedication was Michael Woodley, club president. Looking on proudly was Easton RC's PDG B.J. Metz, and wife Kristie and many members of Easton RC. Representing our D7430 leadership was our DG Tony Jannetta. Allentown-west RC's PDG Bill Palmer was present with his camera.

Before this dedication 96 players had signed up and have been placed on six teams. Each team is outfitted with major league jerseys and caps.

Indemnification / Hold Harmless Language in Contracts

Individual Rotary clubs and the district may be incurring more risk than realized when signing contracts with third parties to use facilities or services. Most contracts will contain an indemnification clause. An indemnification/hold harmless provision is a basic contractual device in a contract or agreement that is used to transfer risk from one party to the party which controls the risk.

Indemnification/hold harmless language in contracts is separate from insurance. When a club/district agrees to this type of language it is important to ensure there is insurance that covers the requirements. The club/district should only agree to indemnify/hold the other party harmless for our club/district's own acts and omissions in which you have control over. A club/district should not agree to take responsibility for the acts and omissions of the other parties, which you don't control. <u>Many</u> <u>indemnification clauses require the first party to assume all risk</u> for loss, which extends well beyond any insurance coverage.

When a club/district signs a hold harmless agreement, the club/ district, not the insurance company, is agreeing to pay for all applicable losses. If there is insurance coverage under the Program, the insurance company will pay for the loss; if there is no coverage under the Program, the club/district will still be responsible for paying for the loss.



- Ensure the contract does not combine the indemnification requirements with the insurance requirements. There is a possibility that the courts could void the indemnification requirements in a contract, so you don't want the insurance requirements to be voided along with it.
- Often the indemnification and insurance provisions contained in contracts include inappropriate language that contradicts the coverage provided through the Program. Know what you are signing!
- Do not agree to sign a contract that requires your district/club to be responsible for another entity's acts or omissions.
- Keep in mind that the contract a club signs is independent of insurance coverage. If a club agrees to terms not contained in the insurance policy, the club will be responsible for complying with those terms.

The Program provides general liability insurance coverage to active U.S. Rotary clubs and districts for their liability arising out of bodily injury to a third party or damage to a third party's property arising from the acts or activities of the club/district. The Program will provide only limited coverage to other entities and only if a club/district is required in a written and signed contract, agreement, or permit to name the entity as an Additional Insured.

Did You Know? continued

Additional Insured status does not extend full general liability insurance coverage to the other entity, but rather provides limited coverage for that entity in the event a claim arose from a club/ district's acts or activities. An additional insured is not covered under the RI insurance policy for its own negligence.

It would be my recommendation as District Insurance Chair that all contracts are reviewed by legal counsel prior to signing. If anyone has questions concerning how insurance applies on contracts, you can contact Tom Hartzell, District Insurance Chair (thartzell@hmk-ins.com).
