





### Free Vegetable Gardens Sprouting Up Around France



Versailles Rotaractors and friends launch a Potalib project in Vélizy-Villacoublay.

Imagine a community where the residents are all free to plant, grow, harvest, and eat healthy food whenever they want without

having to pay for it. Sound too good to be true?

That's exactly what residents of more than 20 cities and towns in France are doing through a project called Potalib. Launched by the Rotaract Club of Versailles, Potalib was inspired by the Incredible Edible project, an international food-sharing movement founded by Nick Green in England. The Rotaract members obtained Green's permission to apply the concept in France, changing the name to "Potalib," a contraction of "potager libre" (free vegetable garden).

The club registered the Potalib name, created a brand, and now sells the project as a kit to French institutions, local communities, and corporations. The materials include seeds for as many as 18 kinds of vegetables, information on how to cultivate them, and 12 wooden bins, each about a cubic meter in size and filled with around 270 kilograms of soil. In cities where the gardens are planted, the club sponsors a festive opening-day ceremony, featuring a free meal cooked by club members and a professional chef.

"The goal is quite simple: To give everyone, from the wealthiest to the poorest, the opportunity to eat quality vegetables. Potalib also offers the homeless a reliable source of free healthy food.

People readily take responsibility for maintaining the vegetable gardens and no instances of theft, hoarding, or vandalism have been reported. Instead, Potalib is bringing communities closer together.



**and certified** for District Grants is on the afternoon of October 25th at the TRF Seminar. In King of Prussia.


# Bike Ride for Rotaplast Sponsored by Area 6 Rotarians

# **Eight Steps to a Team Win**

Any organization must continue to grow and evolve over time and Rotary is no different. Rotary is a vital organization that has an impact throughout the world with Polio vaccinations; Health, Hunger, and Humanity grants; Rotary Youth programs; and community service projects. It is an organization that has a legacy of Service Above Self and as Rotarians we must do our part to fulfill the work done by those before us. Here are eight suggestions to use Club Public Relations and Membership as a team effort to maintain and promote the local Rotary Club.

#### **STEP I. SELF EXAMINATION**

Examine your Club's public image. What do non-Rotarians think/ know about Rotary and your Club? Ask every member find three people who are business professionals (of every age, gender, and race) and ask them five or six questions about Rotary. Questions for a non-Rotarian like:

What qualifications DO YOU THINK are required to join Rotary?

- I.What do you think is the purpose of Rotary?
- 2.Describe your image of the typical Rotarian?
- 3.Why would you be interested/not interested in joining Rotary?
- 4.Do you have to belong to a political party to be a Rotarian?


Note: THIS IS NOT A RECRUITMENT EFFORT, ONLY FACT FINDING. Document the answers and discuss them at a Club Assembly. Determine what kind of public image your Club has among non-Rotarians. What issues keep potential Rotarians from being interested? Does the public image of your Club vary based upon the age/gender/race of the person asked? If so, what are the members doing that might cause that?

#### **STEP 2. BRANDING**

Armed with a better understanding of the public image determine:

How you can respond to incorrect perceptions using various internal and external Public Relations tools.

I. What, if any, negative perceptions are being generated by the acts of club members and how they can be made aware of their negative influence on Club PR (e.g.; telling political or religious jokes in club meetings)





### **Rotary Public Relations and Membership:**

2. Discuss how members can raise awareness of themselves as Rotarians (e.g.; wearing Rotary pin, Rotary license plate holders, posting membership certificate on the wall at work, etc.)

3. Review the methods that a person can find out more about the club (e.g.; Can the club website be found by a Google search?)

#### **STEP 3. IMPROVE THE INTERNAL MESSAGE**

Determine if club members are passionate about their Rotary club. If not, what internal communication tools can be used to boost excitement about the club (e.g.; speakers/programs, newsletter, website, Facebook, LinkedIn).

#### **STEP 4. GET OUT OF THE BOX**

Seriously review your Club's ability to adapt and incorporate new and different ideas. The acid test: If a new member started suggesting new ideas would they be seriously considered, or would the current leadership tend to be offended by the brashness of the new member? Try anything and celebrate failure as the next step to success!

#### **STEP 5. LET THE POTENTIAL MEMBER KNOW YOU CARE**

Use three to five members to recruit one member. Make the recruit feel wanted by the club.

#### **STEP 6. NEW MEMBERS AS A CLASS**

Every month (or every quarter) inductee's are a new class. All the members inducted in May of 2010 are the Class of May 2010 and they all work together to complete the New Member orientation and requirements to achieve their blue badge. Each class has a 'Den Mother': A Rotarian that is their advisor of all things Rotary.


#### **STEP 7. FAMILY, FAMILY, FAMILY**

Every member's family to be involved in the club. The line between member and spouse to be almost invisible. Look for ways to communicate to spouse, children, and members. (Why shouldn't a member's children know as much or more about YES/ RYE and RYLA than the member?)

#### **STEP 8. ELEVATE THE CLUB PRESIDENT**

Use a three-year succession plan to ensure the Club President plans for her/his year in advance. Create an atmosphere where the Club President is a respected leader, not the butt of member jokes during the meetings.





Morrisville-Yardley Area Rotary Club Created a PR Event to Draw Attention to Contributions Made to the Community of Morrisville


The club established the Rotary Recognition Garden in Morrisville's Williamson Park to draw attention to the contributions the club and some of its distinguished members have made to the community over the past 86 years. The small garden and flagpole is next to the Rotary pavilion in the park which few knew was erected by the Rotary club members and commemorated to William Burgess, Jr., a local businessman and former Mayor. The garden includes a new Rotary plaque referring to the pavilion and an historic marker that was discovered elsewhere in the park that recognizes Harry Simpson, another early Mayor and Rotarian who was District Governor.

The club sold commemorative bricks to help finance the project and one of the bricks is dedicated to Thomas Stockham who was a prominent civic and business leader, an engineer and architect, Mayor, and a member of the PA House of Representatives.

Some 75 community leaders and residents, along with Rotarians and friends, attended the dedication event on September 4, 2014, and press coverage was given by the Bucks County Courier Times and the Advance of Bucks County.


we toured Martin Guitar and saw Eric Clapton's order for \$250,000 worth of instruments. We finished up the day touring downtown Bethlehem and shopping more!



### **Create Your Own PR Plan**

Public Image must be a priority for all of us. Now, while PR Grants are in hiatus and under review, it is even more important than ever that we make our public image dollars count. At the recent Zone 24E Success Seminars, participants had the chance to practice creating PR plans. We quickly learned that solid plans answer these questions:

- I. What is your goal for this project?
- 2. Who is your target audience for your campaign?
- 3. What role will Rotarians or the community take in the project?
- 4. What are the key messages for your target audience?
- 5. What type of outreach will you use?
- 6. What is your marketing approach?
- 7. How will you measure the success of the campaign?

Here is an example of how these questions help support a straight-forward service project such as the Dictionary Project:

- Goal: encourage literacy to third grade students; set budget; Rotarians present dictionaries to class
- Key Message: Rotary is a champion for literacy worldwide; Educate and Engage Youth in Rotary; Targeting youth clubs, partner with "Me to We" and have Rotary speakers at their events (Day of Giving as an example)...involves Rotarians, In-teractors, and Rotaractors
- Outreach through social media, websites, PSAs, logos on clothing. Promote more joint projects, joint meetings, provide student bursaries and scholarships
- Key Message: Rotary serves humanities...a service organization
- Measurement: More awareness and engagement of youth and Rotarians.

The same questions can help craft a more amorphous project, such as the ongoing need to Increase Membership:

- Goal: raise public awareness of Rotary in community
- Target: People who want to make an impact
- Messaging: Club impacts community by supporting our neighbors at home and abroad, so if you are looking to make a difference, Rotary is the place for you



### Create Your Own PR Plan continued

- Outreach; update website including "you can make a difference button," Social media, post activities that support community/ world impact, direct followers back to club website for more info. Meet your local media to talk about what the club does and determine media support. Organize an open house, invite potential members, key community leaders. Offer prizes for business cards with email ad-dresses and add to newsletter list. Consider options that provide more flexibility, like Associate Membership, Corporate membership or spousal membership, as well as ways to cut costs of meetings
- Measurement: Measure membership outcomes in medium- and long-term; not by short-term gains







#### Ten Reasons to Believe the End is in Sight By Dr. Bob Scott, retired chair, International Polio Plus Committee


Dr. Bob Scott, who has served since 2006 as chair of the International Polio Plus Committee, stepped down from that role the end of June. It's hard to imagine Bob in "retirement," so we asked him to reflect on the state of polio eradication. Here is his upbeat assessment:

This morning, August 9, 2014, a young medical student came to my home to talk about polio. She will graduate in June of 2015. She is interested in global health as a career and wanted to be updated on the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. We talked generally about the Initiative and then I suggested to her that she does not need to worry as by the time she graduates with her specialty degree three years from now, polio will not be a problem.

Am I correct with this assessment? Ten reasons why I believe my advice is correct:

- This year India along with 10 other countries in South East Asia were **CERTIFIED** polio free. Now 80 per-cent of the world's parents need never worry again of having a child become crippled for life.
- The world knows how to eradicate polio. Consider that there are only three countries where polio is still endemic and two of the three — Nigeria and Afghanistan — have markedly declining cases.
- Polio types 2 and 3 have been eradicated and only Type I remains.










### Polio News continued

- Pakistan is the only country remaining with rising numbers of infection, and this is due to a ban on vaccination in some areas in the north of the country.
- Despite the outbreak in Pakistan with 117 cases out of 149, the total numbers this year to date are 35 fewer worldwide.
- In Syria, despite thé unrest, good vaccination rounds have been held and only one case reported since early January.
- Funding is significantly bullish, with \$5 billion pledged out of a budget of \$5.5 billion.
- Rotarians continue to support the program in a tremendously generous manner, At least \$35 million is granted to the program by Rotary in order to receive \$70 million each year
- from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for further grants
  Rotarians continue to support National Immunization Days on the ground in many different ways.
- A Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC) has been declared by WHO which insists that all travelers from Pakistan, Cameroon, Equatorial Guinea and Syria must have a valid certificate of polio vaccination before leaving the country. This is very positive step to prevent further "export" of polio from Pakistan, in particular, especially to Middle East countries.

The world is "This Close" to "Ending Polio Now!"





A Foundation Area Coordinator still is needed for Area 9.






