


Spread Some Happiness

Thanks to the District 7430 Covid Relief Grant Funds, the **Upper Perk Rotarians** were able to pack 100 treat bags for area seniors through the Open Link in Pennsburg.

The treat bags were filled with heart shaped pasta, sauce, activity books, pens, pencils and a sweet treat for Valentine's Day.

The Rotary Club of Norristown played cupid to residents of the Montgomery Park Senior Housing Facility. The 50-unit site is the new low-income housing facility at the former site of Montgomery Hospital. The club was greeted by Christie Jones, a social worker. She said, "My residents truly appreciate it and it really made their day." Residents were given 56 bags containing items to show someone cares, such as a reusable mask, puzzle book, pen, note pad,

Lysol wipes, hand sanitizer, body lotion, Chapstick, chocolate Valentine heart, Rotary flyer and a valentine.

Also in Rotary Club of Norristown: armed with thermometers and registration lists, Rotarians Denise Ashe, Dave Shoemaker, and Judy Bucko were vaccination staff at the Montco OIC. They helped the crew vaccinate up to 1000 people.





Warminster Rotary Club. A reward fund created in 1993 to help catch the person(s) responsible for murdering two young Warminster men that year is being repurposed to help local food banks and disadvantaged youth, a request made by the victims' families who said they want to see the money help the community that helped them in their time of need.

In February, the Warminster Rotary Club Foundation accepted \$61,545.86 from the Benson-Campbell Reward Fund, which had been sitting dormant since it was created to help catch the killers of Bryan Benson and Seann Campbell, both 20, and from Warminster.

Benson and Campbell were best friends and working together at the West Coast Video in Rosemore Shopping Center when they were brutally murdered in 1993. Their killings remain unsolved.

At the time, the boys' parents helped establish the Benson-Campbell Reward Fund, and residents of Warminster and



surrounding communities donated more than \$52,000.

The money was placed into an account, and no disbursements of the reward money were ever made, but as time passed and with bank consolidations, the identity of the custodian of the Benson-Campbell Reward Fund became lost.

Recently, Attorney Sean Corr, representing Campbell's parents, with the assistance of Bucks County District Attorney Matthew Weintraub and the office's Victim Witness Coordinator Itzamir Pagan, was able to determine the ownership and origins of the reward fund.

Corr, a past member of the Warminster Rotary Club, met with both families and the Board of the Warminster Rotary Foundation.

Both families said they were touched by the support of the community over the last 28 years and, in consultation with Corr and District Attorney Weintraub, determined the money should be used to better the community.

While they have not lost faith that someone will help provide information that would bring the parties responsible for the murder of their sons to justice, both families felt the money should be reinvested locally.

"Brian and Sean deserve justice," District Attorney Matt Weintraub said. "But I take some solace by helping to see that their parents' wishes that something good could be done in our community with the reward fund once we were able to help recover this money for them."

The families said their hope was to see the funds managed by an organization with local roots, a strong leadership team that will focus efforts to improve the community who generated the funds and an organization that could continue to keep Bryan and Seann's memory alive in the community.

The Benson family said they wanted to see the money used to support local food pantries and the Youngers Family wished to help organizations that support youth with disadvantages.

The Warminster Rotary Foundation Board of Directors voted to establish the Bryan Benson and Seann Campbell Memorial Fund with the \$61,545.86, which is separate from their operating fund.

Rotary Club of Souderton Telford Supports the Souderton Community

Souderton Telford RC received a Rotary District Grant to assist the Perseverance Volunteer Fire Company of Souderton in building a new handicap accessible ramp into its building.

The lifeblood of the Fire Company is fundraising events, which include bingo, penny auctions, breakfasts, and more. The

building was constructed in 1966 and is not handicap accessible. This presents a major challenge during these fundraisers. These efforts will help make the local firehouse more welcoming and accessible, while helping the Fire Company meet its continued fundraising needs.

The Perseverance Volunteer Fire Company of Souderton has been serving the community since 1901. The fully volunteer force has approximately 65 active members and responds to an average of more than 400 emergency service calls a year in the Souderton area.

The club has had a personal connection with the Souderton Police Department as the recently retired Police Chief, James P Leary, is also a member of the club. STRC maintains a Souderton Police Department (SPD) fund for the Department to use when community members are in need. In addition, several STRC members contribute to this fund anonymously throughout the year. Recent examples of how these funds are used:

- A family had experienced some significant health issues and financial distress. The STRC fund provided \$200 dollars in gift cards.
- A family had experienced the loss of a loved one. The family lacked the resources to appropriately inter the deceased. The STRC fund provided \$150 so that the proper interment could occur.
- Ongoing food deliveries to individual people
- A single-mother had become the victim of a very expensive fraud. The woman lost her savings to an internet scam. She will not recover her losses. The club provided her with \$150 in grocery gift cards. In speaking with a community member, he paid for the gift cards. Thus the STRC served as a conduit for assistance and we gained yet another supporter for our community.

Over these last many years, the STRC/SPD Fund has touched so many people in need. The club is grateful for Chief Leary (retired) to facilitate much of that help.



West Reading-Wyomissing Supports Berks County COVID-19 Community Needs

The Rotary Club of West Reading-Wyomissing applied for and was awarded a grant from Rotary District 7430 to support Covid-19 relief efforts in its local community. Members engaged and collaborated with Co-County Wellness Services that promote public health and welfare at the recommendation of Commissioner Barnhardt's office.

Co-County Wellness Services (<u>www.cocounty.org</u>) has been key in meeting Berks County's response during the Covid pandemic. The club reached out to them to identify current needs including contact tracing. They requested we focus on providing covid safety supplies to keep clients and staff safe along with food items to support people who are not able to leave home to shop for groceries.



"When our club learned there was grant money available for clubs to use in their own backyard to assist with Covid-19-related causes, we knew we had to act quickly. The West Reading-Wyomissing Rotary Club is active in the community and willing to lend a hand for our neighbors in need. This was an easy-to-execute and far-reaching project providing a great benefit to our local community." said Carolyne Jordan, president-elect for the Rotary Club of West Reading-Wyomissing.

Thanks to fellow Rotarians and community participants, the food drive at the Berkshire Blvd. Redner's Fresh Market on March 20 was a great success. The club collected 43 large boxes filled with non-perishable foods, and \$220 in cash that were turned into Redner's gift cards for Co-County Wellness Services to purchase perishable foods when needed. Canned meats, peanut butter and jelly, macaroni and cheese, rice and beans and pastas were among the foods donated. Additionally, the West Reading-Wyomissing Rotary club provided reusable bags to transport the food to the people in need. Covid safety supplies donated included three cases of nitrile gloves and a case of N95 masks.

- Chloe Park Wilson Area High School March 2021 Chloe serves as a teacher's assistant at a Korean School and volunteered on a mission trip to Mexico. She loves performing music and hopes to earn a four-yearcollege degree and pursue a career in dermatology.
- Anthoney Morales Career Institute of Technology April 2021 Anthoney attends Easton Area High School and is a student in the health-related technology program at the Career Institute of Technology. He is a blood drive volunteer and has clinical experiences at an Abington facility. He loves to help people and plans to attend Northampton Community College to become a registered nurse.

Whitehall Area Rotary Update

During the February virtual monthly meeting, the club heard from guest speaker Craig Taylor, program manager from YouthBuild Allentown. YouthBuild is an international program aimed at men and women, from 17 to 24 years of age, who left school without graduating. YouthBuild Allentown is a six-month program that includes GED instruction, certificate programs at Lehigh Career and Technical Institute, and on-the-job training at HADC project sites.

In mid-February, with funds from a District 7430 COVID Relief grant and some of the Jingle Bell Run proceeds, the Club was able to help St. Stephen's Food Pantry purchase a much-needed new refrigerator.

The club also received an additional donation and presented two more Aldi gift cards to the Whitehall Coplay School District to help district families struggling with food insecurity.

On March 17, five young women, taught by Whitehall High School English teacher, Michelle Abbadessa, were showcased in the Club's 4-Way Test Speech Contest. Their stellar entries made it difficult, but ultimately the judges selected Mariah R. as the winner. Her moving and persuasive speech focused on the inequity in pricing of healthy vs. unhealthy food options and subsequent health consequences for those who are financially challenged. Club President Denise Continenza (virtually)



presented her with a check for \$250. Mariah will represent Whitehall High School and the Club at the Regional Contest on April 7. Read more about the contest <u>HERE</u>.



The club's annual Make a Difference Day in recognition of its Charter anniversary was held on March 27. Rotarians worked with Sixth Street Shelter employees to sort and organize household donations. The Shelter provides temporary housing for Lehigh Valley homeless families with children, as well as case management, in-house programming, and referrals to appropriate services.

Emmaus Rotary Club Celebrates International Women's Day

For the fourth year since 2018, the Emmaus Rotary Club celebrated International Women's Day on Thursday, March 11, by honoring and recognizing a Rotarian and a Community woman from the Lehigh Valley for their "Service Above Self," their achievements in the field of volunteer humanitarian work, peace and understanding, manifested through their exemplary and outstanding humanitarian service to our local and international communities. The Celebration was held at the Brookside Country Club, in Macungie, PA.

On March 8, the world celebrates International Women's Day. It was the suffragettes who started Dnternational Women's day as part of their decisive action for equality, with the first official event held in 1911 in Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland, supported by over a million people. Today, all around the world and in every continent, from Australia, to Europe, to Africa, to the United States, many exciting and important events are run to support International Women's Day.

Since 1988, a year after the US Congress passed The Joint Resolution Public Law 100-9 in 1987 designating the month of March as Women's History Month, U.S. presidents have issued the annual proclamation to observe it with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

Also, this month, Rotary clubs all over the world celebrate 'Women In Rotary' by sharing inspiring stories and honoring the countless women making an impact in their communities, their nation, and the world.



This year, Linda Mayger from the Saucon, Center Valley Rotary Club received the Rotary Award and a Paul Harris Fellow recognition from Club President Lexa Shallcross. Linda represents all we do as Rotarians. She embodies the soul and spirit of our organization. Locally, she is active with the Environmental Education center and has chaired the Saucon Valley Foundation for Educational Innovation, raising over \$250,000 to help build and fund a pollinator garden there. She has helped organize the Saucon Valley Book Fairy project, helping send volunteers to read to first graders, and providing over 1,600 books per year to the effort.

Internationally, Linda is actively involved with a project in Myanmar, helping children in rural schools learn science and health by teaching kids to make soap. She wrote the grant that funded half the project and travelled to Myanmar to implement it. She has also worked on a project in Haiti, writing a grant to build a school kitchen to make hot lunches, collaborating with another Rotary and the organization Mommy Sue's Children.

Emmaus Rotary continued

Club President Lexa Shallcross presented Prabha Sinha with the Community Award and a \$500 check to the Pratyush Sinha Foundation in Allentown. When Prabha's only child, her son Pratyush, passed away in 2011 in his twenties, her grief was so deep, and she used yoga to help her through each day. Pratyush was a young man who always talked of wanting to make the world a better place for those less fortunate. He was greatly affected by what he saw as inequalities in the world.



Prabha was drawn to dedicating her life in service to others to honor his memory. Using their own money from their 401K account, Prabha and her husband started the Pratyush Sinha Foundation in October 2012, with 2 free classes, providing mindfulness and yoga interventions in schools and communities. State Senator Pat Browne helped them secure a \$500,000 grant to start a pilot program in grades 1-12 in the Allentown School District, called Trauma Informed Appropriate Education. The program builds through mindfulness: self-awareness management, emotional regulations and compassion, social awareness and relationship skills and responsible decision making. As of January 2020, the Pratyush Sinha Foundation is reaching over 12,000 children, adolescents, and adults all over Lehigh Valley Schools and Community, providing mindfulness and yoga as a preemptive tool to deal with social and economic pressures.

Paul Harris Fellows were also awarded retroactively and presented by club President Shallcross to the women who received our club's Rotary Award on International Women's Day: 2018 Debra Geiger, Bethlehem Rotary Club; 2019 Dr. Barbara Kistler, Allentown West Rotary Club; and 2020 Jill Long, Bethlehem Rotary Club.

Likewise, a \$500 check to their respective Foundations or non-profit organization was awarded retroactively to the three women who received the Community Award: 2018 Jennifer Driscoll to the Lilly's Hope Foundation; 2019 Jenae Holtzhafer to The Kindness Exchange; and 2020 Corinne Good to the Eastern PA Trans Equity Project.

In addition, PA 131st District State House Representative Milou MacKenzie presented a Citation to Linda Mayger, and PA 132nd District State House Representative Michael Schlossberg presented a Citation to Prabha Sinha. He also presented Citations to Linda and Prabha from PA State Senator Pat Browne.


