



COVID, Vaccines and Building Bridges in our Communities

We are all so close to seeing the benefits of the COVID19 vaccines right here, in our five counties: Berks, Bucks, Lehigh, Northampton & Montgomery. As Rotarians, we've been asked to serve in any way possible. Rotary leaders are urging members to connect with their local health agencies to determine how Rotary can support COVID-19 vaccine efforts. "We need to spread the message about the power of vaccines to save lives."

At the 2020 Rotary International Convention, they asked us to help "<u>Build the Bridges</u>" regarding vaccines in our own communities. When I read their recommendation from a COVID update in late December, there was no doubt we could bring it home to the communities in our District. Our counties all have <u>Immunization Coalitions</u> that have been actively engaged in the vaccine message and working hard to combat the vaccine hesitancy that exists in our areas. At the same time, each of our counties is focused on and prioritizing getting every resident, that can be, vaccinated for COVID-19.

Most of us are not health care professionals. What can WE do? What projects can we engage in? How can we serve in a way that is COVID safe?

From a personal perspective, having served on the Bucks County Immunization coalition for many years, these coalitions love engaging with volunteers who believe in the value of vaccines. They have specifically asked that Rotarians come on board to participate. Both Bucks and Montgomery Counties have asked for volunteers to assist the professional health care in staffing the mass vaccination centers that will be necessary to vaccinate all residents for COVID-19. All volunteer positions have our safety as their priority. Rotarians from both locations have answered that call. Perhaps your county has asked for volunteers in various capacities as well.

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Because of COVID, the Bucks County Immunization Coalition has had to put a hospital project on the "back burner". They have been recognizing the need for vaccine information materials to be packaged for new parents. The Doylestown Rotary Club is now engaged in a "stay at home, COVID safe" project to put these packets together so that they can be distributed to all new parents at three of our largest hospitals and clinics.

We will be putting 5,000 of these packets together as individuals (within our own homes). All the while, we will be joining together in spirit as a Club, combatting vaccine hesitancy, by fulfilling a project that provides effective resources to the parents of the babies born in our own community.

There's not a doubt in my mind that all of our Clubs can serve in a very special way, to support our community through this crisis. Both of these opportunities directly correlate to the critical message that we've been asked to share: Vaccines Work!


Rotary District 7430 "CAREmongers" Column

Allentown West Rotarians continue to serve the community by delivering produce from Second Harvest. In December, they served over 200 families, and that number continues to grow. They also bought, packed, and delivered holiday bags for Parkland CARES Food Pantry. Contents of the packages were donated by Rotarians and included a blanket, popcorn, sugar cookie mix, frosting and a holiday themed cookie cutter. Gift bags and cards were donated by

AW Rotarian Brad Meier and his State Farm team.

Allentown Rotary gave a Covid-19 Response grant to Lily's Hope Foundation, allowing families to focus on the health of their fragile newborns. Lily's Hope recently reached a milestone of 2400 families supported.



Warminster Rotary presented a \$500 check from the Warminster Rotary Foundation to Love Feeds of Willow Grove of SDA. It provided 150 meals to the community.

Springfield Township Rotary Club continued its support of Harston Hall, a long-term care organization. Many residents do not have family or friends close by, and Harston Hall was seeking members of the public to shop, wrap, and deliver gender-neutral gifts for distribution among the residents. Rotary heard the call and offered to collect donations from the community, shop, wrap, and deliver to make it easier and safer for the Springfield Township Community to participate. The club raised \$800 via a Facebook request alone, enough to package 100 gifts. A small group of Rotarians dressed in



festive gear dropped the gifts off at the door and were met with great appreciation from staff members. Each gift had a personal hand-written note, telling residents that their community was thinking about them during the holiday season.



Allentown West Rotary Club gave two grants in January; one to Community Bike Works for safety equipment, and one through the Lehigh Valley Aging in Place, given to Meals On Wheels and used to replace worn heat bags used to deliver hot meals to clients. Also in January, Allentown West honored Allentown Police Chief Glenn Granitz with a Paul Harris award, in recognition of his management style that focuses on the use of crisis personnel to deescalate tensions, and his view of the police as guardians as of the community.

Nazareth Rotarians spread good works over several months thanks to a jump start from the District 7430 Covid grant funds.

The club purchased summer reading backpacks for 600 young learners, a new sign for the Nazareth Lunch food distribution program, 100 experiment kits for students to do at home STEM projects and 55 bags of groceries for households within the local school district for weekend food support.

The Springfield Township Rotary Main Club has launched our **Springfield Township Community Relief Fund**. The mission of the emergency fund is to help low-income individuals who are struggling to shoulder the burden of a short-term emergency expense.

Teach Rwanda Global Grant

The Springfield Township Rotary Club is coordinating with other local and Rwandan Rotary clubs as well as TEACH Rwanda to qualify for a global grant. The funds would cover the construction of a kitchen for a Rwandan demonstration preprimary and elementary school. As you know, Rotary seeks to sustainably improve communities around the world. The addition of a new kitchen to this Rwandan school will allow it to earn more income to achieve sustainability, lead to an increase



in attendance of healthy children, reduce stunting, uplift the community, and meet new Rwandan school regulations. Currently, students receive one snack a day at school, which does not even satisfy their basic nutritional needs. A new kitchen will provide students with meals that will have a more meaningful impact on their physical and mental health, increasing their learning capacity.

This project is done around Valentine's Day each February and is spearheaded by Rotarian Terry Pundiak. Over 1,000 teddy bears have been distributed in the last 11 years. Each bear is tagged with a special note that says "Roses are Red, Violets are Blue. To help you feel better, here's a teddy for you".

placed beside the Angel Trees, and then the Rotary Club of Newtown transports all the gifts to the Newtown Presbyterian Church where the youth group sorts the gifts to be given out. Families who placed the Angel Wishes come to the church to pick up the gifts, rain or snow not a deterrent.


