The gift cards are each worth \$25 for a total donation of \$6250. The Club "rocked" it with an overwhelming response to the needs of the Birdsboro community. Club President Fran DeSensi drove to club members houses gathering over 120 lbs. of food for the food bank. He then delivered them to the church where he met an extremely grateful Reverend Harris.

## West Reading-Wyomissing Serving the Community

On Saturday, August 8<sup>th</sup> West Reading-Wyomissing Rotary Club did its part to keep Papermill Road clean. They have cleaned this section of Papermill Road for years and it's a great way to give back to the community.





Members also engaged in a service project and contributed back-to-school supplies for the Northwest Elementary School students in Reading PA. These supplies will assist with their learning projects. Principal Sheila Guadagno Simyak prepared a package of school supplies that was delivered to each student's home since they are beginning the school year virtually.

## Allentown, Lehigh Passport and Slatington Clubs Volunteer for Habitat Project

On Saturday, September 26, 2020, these clubs on a Habitat for Humanity Lehigh Valley house on Tacoma Street in Allentown. They are building eight houses (four twin homes) on former school lot and across from a church. It is a nice quiet, street close to the former Allentown State Hospital site. Working members included some from the club (Lisa along with her son Michael, Ken, Matt, Wally, George and Christy) as well as four from the Passport Club (Frank, Kirk, John) and one from Slatington (Ingrid Holder).



There were several groups working on different projects. One group caulked, primed and painted large wood pieces that are on the front porches, and they painted a porch that already had those pieces in place. A second group put insulation around all the windows and doors installed in one set of twins. Another group worked on building walls in one of the other houses, which did not yet have a roof. One group also put in blocking to be used to hang kitchen cabinets.

All workers were masks. The Habitat Crew members were very helpful and provided excellent training and oversight. The project lasted from 8-2, and everyone had a great time! Members said it was fun to see the work take shape and to be able to envision a family living there soon and enjoying their new home!






### **Allentown West**

Allentown West is living the 4-way test. Instead of reciting it at each meeting, members are asked to volunteer how they have used the 4-way test in their lives during the previous week. Whether it is at work, during a Rotary project, or in their personal lives, members have been explaining the ways in which the 4-way test helps them to make decisions in their everyday lives. As one member said, "If we aren't living our lives around the 4-way test, we aren't really Rotarians!"

Allentown West also completed two inaugural fundraisers: the first was the online raffle, which culminated in raising over \$8,000. The second fundraiser, called the "Look Book," consisted of photos taken during the Summer of Covid, supplied by members, and put together by member Gwenn Carr. The virtual Look Book, at a cost of \$25 each, was a way to keep members in touch with each other by seeing what we had done with our summers. It was completed in a month and raised close to \$1,000.



## **Springfield Township Adopt a Highway**

In a joint effort, Springfield Township Rotary and Springfield Township Young Professionals Club took part in de-littering sections of Church Road, and the local 309 on/off ramps. Approximately 30 trash bags were filled during the cleanup. This cleanup effort was the one of four cleanups planned for a two-year commitment.



#### An Historical, Virtual Event of Interest for Rotarians and our Families.



#### October 13, 2020 7pm (EST)

Let's revisit the past and learn from the most feared health crisis that our country has ever faced: Polio. A hundred years ago, Polio outbreaks began sweeping through this nation and countries around the world, decimating the lives of thousands, leaving paralysis and death in its wake. How would the US respond? How would the world?

Learning how the world responded to Polio can help us understand today's COVID-19 pandemic. Our panel will compare these two viruses and show how the work being done to eradicate the former will soon help the latter.

#### The participants:

#### Shawn Herron

Shawn grew up in Montgomery County, PA. Upon his graduation from Florida State University, he served in the US Army out of Fort Bragg NC. Afterward, he worked for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) in Washington DC. Shawn enjoys traveling and writing about his experiences. He lives in Bucks County, PA, works at the Doylestown Bookshop, and is a member of the Doylestown Rotary Club. Shawn is the author of the story Passion, Patience and Perseverance and is the creator of and writer for <a href="mailto:SmokelessMirror.com">SmokelessMirror.com</a>

#### Daniel Wilson, PhD

Dan grew up in Wisconsin where he developed polio at age 5 in 1955. Five years later he had a spinal fusion to correct scoliosis and spent most of a year in a body cast. He eventually went to college in Wisconsin majoring in history and English. Dan then did graduate work in history at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. He began teaching at Muhlenberg College in Allentown PA in 1978 and retired as Professor of History in 2018. Dan began working on the history of the polio epidemics in the early 1990s and focused on the experiences of those of who had the disease. He has published numerous scholarly and popular articles and three books on polio including Living with Polio: The Epidemic and its Survivors (2005), Polio Voices (with Dr. Julie Silver) (2007), and Polio: Biography of a Disease (2009). Over the last 20 years, Dan has experienced a variety of symptoms associated with post-polio syndrome. You can see Dr. Wilson's written work and Video Library HERE


#### Mike K. McGovern

Mike McGovern has served as the Chair of Rotary International's PolioPlus Committee since October 2014. In this role, he is the volunteer leader of Rotary's largest humanitarian project, the global eradication of polio. Rotary is the spearheading partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and has donated over \$2.0 billion to ending polio and has worked with other partners to reduce the number of polio-endemic countries from 125 in 1988 to 2 today. Mike also represents Rotary International on the Polio Oversight Board.
