

Outgoing President Lynn Schott presented her outgoing Board of Directors with license plate covers that say Oxford Hills Rotary.






Portland

Portland Sunrise

Project Title - Addressing Insufficiencies at the ICU of National Hospital Abuja, Nigeria.

Project Objective - To rapidly respond to the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic by addressing insufficiencies within the ICU of the National Hospital Abuja with equipment that can be readily deployed and aid in the treatment of COVID patients.

Items included in this grant:

1. Two units of Genrui WP21BE Semi Automated Chemistry Analyzer; 2. Huge supplies of reagents to run on the two pieces of equipment; 3. A unit of Uninterrupted Power Supply system (UPS) to avoid sudden power outages avoiding damage to equipment; 4. An electrical extension cable for connectivity; 5. Training of staff on proper use as well as care of machines. They in turn are able to train others.

This grant was a stepping stone to a global grant to create a fully equipped portion of the hospital and transform it into a functional Infectious Disease Unit (IDU) that will cater to highly infectious conditions during and after the pandemic. The project helps to ensure the sustainability of disease prevention and treatment and long-term economic impact as the trainees provide a higher quality of service in Nigeria, and patients are receiving quality services with great joy.
