During a special ceremony on May 17 at Mid Coast Hospital's Healing Garden, the Brunswick Rotary presented Atkins with its prestigious Paul Harris Fellow award. "We are delighted to present this special award to Daniel. He has been extraordinarily supportive of our local healthcare workers," said Fred Horch, Rotary Club president.

Since March 2020, when the region was just seeing its first cases of COVID-19, Atkins has been greeting healthcare workers with large, colorfully decorated signs by standing along Medical Center Drive in Brunswick, the entrance to Mid Coast Hospital. This shed will be used to keep the tools, hoses, and other supplies for this small community garden, created for and managed by Brunswick Landing's New Mainer community.
