Scarborough

Scarborough was awarded a \$4000 district grant for an interpretive nature walk and improvements to an important Scarborough Marsh nature trail across from the Scarborough Marsh Nature Center at 92 Pine Point Road. Scarborough Marsh is Maine's largest salt marsh with 3,100 acres. It is a classroom for school children, a laboratory for biologists, prime territory for fishermen and hunters, and a fascinating, everchanging world for naturalists, especially birders.

This interpretive nature walk introduces visitors and students to marsh ecology and its importance through a series of 11 interpretive signs posted along the trail, and a location sign and a sign containing detailed marsh information. The 11 waterproof interpretive signs guide visitors while telling a "story" of the marsh using Kimberley Ridley's book "The Secret Bay". Scarborough Rotarians worked with the Scarborough Marsh Nature Center (Maine Audubon), Friends of the Scarborough Marsh, the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (Marsh land holders), and the Town of Scarborough on this project. Many regional schools use the Nature Center for field trips in the spring and fall to learn about the marsh ecosystem by exploring it. The trail and signage will help educators teach the environmental significance and conservation of the Scarborough Marsh for years to come. The work was completed on May 10.







Sebago Lake -Windham Area

Sebago Lake – Windham Area Club continues to support the District's Crutches for Africa project, having done so for 13 years. Member Don Drew, **Project Chair, delivered another truck load of** mobility devices to the District collection point where met by District Team Leader Dennis **Robillard.** Members assist Don in pulling together mobility devices and periodically he collects from local lending closets, nursing homes and a local collection site, Busy Bee Laundry. 


Westbrook-Gorham
