














We held a successful scratch raffle ticket fundraiser spearheaded by President Dan Allen. Photo top right.


Portland

We are very grateful to the 40 Rotarians who stepped up to help staff the booth for two months. Larry Gross won the coveted "Golden Deely Bopper" award, given to the Rotarian who showed up the most to help. He was truly deserving of the award that recognizes "Exceptional service for a good claws." We raised \$13,000 and had fun doing it!









President Elect Ian and his team opened Christmas Tree Sales early--a week before Thanksgiving. The Portsmouth High Interact Club unloaded a truckful of trees in steady rain, taking only an hour to do so.

As we went to press, the club was preparing to host its annual Thanksgiving Dinner. This is an event that feeds more than 400 folks, while delivering more than 200 meals to the Greater Seacoast area. Bad weather was threatening to challenge efforts. The first order of business was receiving some 75 pies, baked by Rotarians, and brought to the Jarvis Center the day before.

About \$3,000 dollars was raised to fund 150 care packages for our deployed New Hampshire Air National troops. Port City Air contributed \$1,000 to the cause.


Under Jess Hamilton's guidance, Rotarians participated in a Habitat for Humanity built for two veteran families in Rochester, N.H.

Elias Thomas, along with his grandson, recently returned from his 23rd trip to India where he assisted in building a check dam. The structure allows the water which comes in the monsoon season to saturate the ground. This means the village will have water in their wells to support family, livestock and agriculture, allowing for several crops a year. In addition to building the dam, done with a Global Grant, Rotarians distributed school supplies and shoes to nearly 200 students.











South Berwick - Eliot

These involve Solar Suitcases from We Share Solar. They are used to teach students about solar energy while building solar stations through guided curriculum. Several of these Suitcases were purchased by our Club and the remainder were purchased through the Marshwood Education Foundation, a grassroots school fundraising organization. Each year two of the Solar Stations are deployed to east Africa to help electrify a village.
