At bottom, Rotarians gathered in early May at the Sunday River Brewing Co to enjoy a meal and celebrate all the great work we have done together this past winter.








Bridgton-Lake Region

Over the past year, the Bridgton-Lake Region Rotary Club has placed the four Little Free Libraries built by the Lake Region Vocational Center in Waterford, Sweden, Denmark and at the Stevens Brook Elementary School in Bridgton. They are a welcome addition to each of the communities and are all being used to share books with no obligation to return them. Library visitors take the books home and make them their own.

Little Free Library is a non-profit organization whose goal is to inspire readers of all ages by having individuals, businesses or civic organizations sponsor a network of 24/7 little library boxes. Visitors are encouraged to take a book or drop one off in good condition for others to share. The books are always changing so it's fun to visit the Little Free Libraries to see what's new. 

We thanked our partners in this venture - Gorham Parks & Rec for their help with receipt and installation, and Gorham Savings Bank for closing a funding gap. Without their support, this project would not have been possible. Of course, we also thanked District 7780 and all donors to the Annual Fund of the Rotary Foundation. As part of the celebration, we all enjoyed lunch from Millside Creations, a local food truck.










Three of the five pole banner designs to be rotated seasonally
