Middle School Students of the Month Eleanor Gorman and James Gould were celebrated.



Thanksgiving Dinner - Under the capable direction of Priscilla MacInnis, Rotary once again pulled off a successful Thanksgiving Dinner. Despite driving rain, wind and a few snowflakes, a team of more than 15 drivers delivered 348 meals from Cape Neddick, ME, to Seabrook, NH. Another 95 guests enjoyed sit-down meals at the Jarvis Center. About 70 volunteers made the event happen. Neil Cohn completed his 36th year carving up 75 turkey breasts donated and cooked by Portsmouth Hospital. Later, twelve of those birds, potatoes, stuffing, and some pies were donated to Crossroads House.

Care Packages - Our "care packages" for the deployed New Hampshire Air National Guard members were delivered to Pease. They included 27 items in each, among them 30 pounds of coffee.
