Recognizing the immediacy of need in Turkey and Syria and inspired by the rapid response of RI President Jennifer Jones and The Rotary Foundation Trustees, the Board of Directors of the D-N Rotary Club Foundation donated \$10,000 to the Turkey/Syria Disaster Response Fund to aid earthquake relief projects.

The Damariscotta-Newcastle Club continues to help combat food insecurity and connect folks to services in Lincoln County, Maine, by supporting 5 local non-profit agencies.

During this past month \$5,000 was distributed to five organizations (\$1,000 each), the first three through the Central Lincoln County Y (www.clcymca.org):

- •Food for Families provides food for those in need and supports a "help yourself" shelf.
- •Community Navigation provides connection to services, answers questions and offers aid.
- •FARMS at the Y teaches children and adults to grow, prepare and cook healthy foods using locally sourced ingredients.
- •Veggies to Table (<u>www.veggiestotable.org</u>) grows and provides fresh vegetables and flowers through food pantries etc.
- •Healthy Lincoln County (<u>www.HealthyLincolnCounty.org</u>) builds thriving, healthy communities in Lincoln County, including food access and nutrition education.

#### **Portland**

Our Club's core international project 3H: Hearing, Hands & H2O. As part of that project, Club member David Small outlined ways Rotary has created clean water in the bateyes in the Dominican Republic, the shanty-town camps where sugarcane cutters live without electricity, plumbing or running water. Funds have been raised for the purchase of 50 water filters, 50 spare cartridges, and 50 inflatable solar lanterns. Soon families will have clean water to drink and cook with, and lanterns that lighten their heavy economic burden. Unfortunately, Maine broke its own record for overdose deaths in 2022. Milestone Recovery Center, a homeless shelter in Portland, has been forced to turn away 10-12 people a night. The Club donated \$1,000 to the Center and is collecting men's winter coats, long underwear, hats and gloves, and cold-weather sleeping bags and tents. #### Saco Bay Sunset

Club member Sharri MacDonald decided she wanted to do something for the students of Sweetser, a school/environment where children and youth can heal, learn, and grow. Their residential behavioral treatment centers and experiential learning programs are designed to help children at many different stages of development overcome unique challenges and strengthen their mental health. Sharri had heard a student remark that the only people who come to see us are our instructors. She set out to create a community room for the children at Sweetser. The once run down area now houses multiple large screen televisions, pool table, karaoke machine, craft room, kitchen, exercise room, and more! It is all related to incentives for the children. The project Sweetser Renovation For Student Community Rooms has been three years in the making and remains a work in progress, mainly because of slowdowns due to Covid. The entire project's estimated cost was \$45,000, accomplished through donations and volunteering. Leo Menard was a large contributor due to his expertise and contractor skills.










## South Portland-Cape Elizabeth
