


## **Good News from the Clubs**

## **Bridgton-Lake Region**

GROWING READERS AT STEVENS BROOK - The most basic of skills-reading-is the fundamental skill that all children need to succeed in school and in life. Yet many children, regardless of intellectual ability or family income, have difficulty reading and will struggle in every course. Our Club hopes to make a difference by teaming up with the Stevens Brook Elementary School (SBES) to support striving readers. The Club was awarded a \$4000 grant by the District and with an added \$500 of its own has provided specialized classroom reading materials and new books for the school library.

But more books aren't the answer unless the children can read them, so the Rotary Club is recruiting Rotarians and community members to give children in the third and fourth grades an extra opportunity to practice reading. Jessica Emery, the Literacy Instructor for SBES, is thrilled with the additional new classroom books. "These are all high interest books that the children will <u>want</u> to read." The classroom teachers provide guidance to the volunteers and encourage the children's participation.

Recently, Justin Ward, co-owner of Bridgton Books, delivered the first of \$2250 in new books for the school's library. The deep discount that Bridgton Books offers non-profit organizations allowed Aliza Wyman, the school librarian, to get the most out of the grant budget.

The program started on October 15 and will continue for the rest of the academic year. The children and the volunteers are enjoying working together and both are learning something new. Dr. Lisa Ryan, President of Bridgton-Lake Region Rotary Club, remarked "As a pediatrician I see children every day and know that reading adds to their health and wellbeing. In support of Polio eradication, members designated all Happy Dollars to Polio Plus.








#### Spreading the Word about OGT Rotary


The third annual *Bridge the Gap to End Polio* bridge walk and *Pints for Polio* fundraiser.


The club is helping to fund and/or stuff 130 "care packages" for members of the N.H. Air National Guard who are deploying for several months.

On a sad note, Basil Richardson passed away in late October. He had served the club very well for 48 years. His daughter Beth joined the club earlier this year.



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
