The governor plans and hosts a district conference and other special events.






District Structure / By-Laws

- Districts are led by a governor. The governor is the officer of RI in the district and is charged with furthering the object of Rotary by providing leadership and supervision of the clubs.
- Clubs in the district nominate their own governor using procedures set forth in manual of procedure and district resolutions.
- Rotarians volunteer in the district to help other clubs and other Rotarians accomplish what the clubs want.







Fundamental Duties of the District Governor

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- Districy Training Assembly (DTA)
- President Elect Training Seminar (PETS)
- District Conference
- Business/legislative meeting
- Management of district finances district sponsored projects and administration and development of Rotary in the district
- Management of grants district and local



District By-Laws



- District bylaws are the codification of legislative matters clubs have chosen
- Clubs are provided a notice by the district governor 5 months before the district conference with the procedure for amending the resolutions
- Clubs may submit proposals for resolutions until 90 days before the business meeting
- Bylaws Committee reviews and will send proposed changes to the clubs 45 days before the business meeting
- Clubs should review the proposals with their membership and decide how they want to vote on the proposition.



District Business Meeting



- The Business Meeting is the legislative meeting of the district
- Normally Business Meetings take place at the district conference
- Each club sends one or more delegates (depending on club size) to vote on matters

affecting the district

Assistant Governor Duties

1) Visit your clubs regularly:

- a. Meet with each club at least once a quarter either in person, by phone, or by web conference.
- b. Listening to them enables you to discuss their concerns and needs
- c. Provide information, resources, and advice that will allow them to be more successful.
- Promote the best practices recommended in Be a Vibrant Club: Your Club Leadership Plan. Help club leaders implement those practices.





Assistant Governor Duties (cont'd)

- 3) Keep the governor up to date on each club's progress and identify areas that may need attention
- 4) Help club leaders prepare for the governor's official visit.
 - a. Monitor the progress of your clubs toward their goals.
 - b. After a club visit, report your assessment and feedback through Rotary Club Central.
 - c. Use this online tool to make sure your clubs are on track with their goals and achievements in areas such as membership, service initiatives, and giving to The Rotary Foundation.





Assistant Governor Duties (cont'd)

5) Your Assistant Governor is your liaison to the District and the District Governor. He or she should be used as a resource before and during your Presidential year.
