### THE GOVERNOR'S CORNER

Betty and I are so much enjoying our visitations that I rarely have time to sit and think -- today I'm doing just sitting and thinking. Several items come to mind of great importance and I hope you are thinking about them also.

**REDISTRICTING** - I have received letters from two PDGs opposing my suggestion to form two Rotary International Districts out of our one. One suggests we "keep the district intact as long as possible," which I believe we have already accomplished and the other writer sticks to his opinion "that we do nothing." On the other side I've heard in writing from two PDGs, one who says in part, "I strongly feel that forty clubs should be MAXIMUM." Two other PDGs have phoned my their support. The curious response has been from four men who I would consider to be top contenders for District Governor in the future. They all encouraged me to redistrict as soon as possible. One suggestion made at the Zone 4 presidents meeting on September 5th has a great deal of merit - extend my deadline for response. I asked for your letters prior to October 1st. I think it's reasonable to extend that to November 1st -- so that's what you have. An additional four weeks to consider my letter. I've thought of no new information you should have.

There was a suggestion that the subject of redistricting should be considered by a Governor's Council and I said in my initial letter that I did not intend to hold such a council this year. Our PDGs all are able to read, write and use the telephone and this newsletter goes to all of them. After noting in the annual financial report that the district operating fund is thousands of dollars in debt to other district funds, I do not accept the idea of spending more to hold a meeting to reiterate the same information. This, of course makes it VITAL that you PDGs who have something to say on this subject contact me immediately -- and I'll attempt to call each of you whenever I can. I respect all of your opinions, for or against..... Please see a related item elsewhere in this bulletin.

### MESSAGE DU GOUVERNEUR

Betty et moi trouvons nos visites si agréables que j'ai rarement le temps de m'asseoir simplement pour réfléchir - aujourd'hui, c'est ce que je fais. Plusieurs choses importantes me présentent à l'esprit. J'espère que vous y pensez aussi.

**DIVISION DU DISTRICT** - J'ai reçu des lettres de deux PDG qui s'opposent à ma suggestion de diviser notre district entre deux Districts Rotary Internationaux. L'un suggère que "nous retenons le district intact autant que possible." D'après moi, c'est ce que nous avons déjà accompli. L'autre persévère dans son avis que "nous n'y faisons rien." De l'autre côté, deux autres PDG m'ont écrit, l'un disant, "C'est mon sentiment qu'on doit avoir 40 clubs au maximum." Encore deux autres m'ont téléphoné à la faveur de leur appui. La réponse curieuse était de quatre hommes qui me semblent être parmi les concurrents principaux pour l'office de Gouverneur du District. Tous m'ont encouragé de faire la division aussitôt qu'il sera possible. À la réunion des présidents de Zone 4, le cinq septembre, on m'a suggéré de prolonger le temps de rendre réponse à cette question. Je vous ai demandé les réponses avant le premier octobre. Je le trouve raisonnable de prolonger le temps au premier novembre. Ainsi, vous avez quatre semaines additionnelles pour considérer la question. Je n'ai aucune nouvelle information à cet égard.

On a suggéré que la question de faire la division soit considéré par le Conseil de Gouverneurs. Comme j'ai dit dans ma première lettre, je ne compte pas assembler le conseil cette année. Nos PDG savent tous lire, écrire, téléphoner et tous reçoivent ce bulletin. Après avoir fait remarqué dans le rapport financier annuel que les fonds pour opérer le district sont endettés aux autres fonds du district par des milliers de dollars, je ne peux pas justifier le dépens additionnel de nous faire assembler seulement pour réitérer la même information. Ainsi, il est essentiel que les PDG qui ont quelque chose à dire à ce sujet se mettent en rapport avec moi tout de suite. De ma part, je ferai effort pour vous tous téléphoner. Je suis respectueux de tous vos opinions. Veuillez voir un autre article à cet égard dans ce bulletin.

PR - PUBLICIZE ROTARY

There should be periodic notes in your club newsletter from or by, your PR chairman. There should be regular reminders to members that they need to share their ideas for publicity and good will in the community. Members need to let the PR chairman or the president know if they will be doing something themselves that lends itself to favorable coverage for the Rotary Club. By putting notes in the newsletter periodically, you remind members that the public relations effort of a successful club is not the job of just one or two members; it is the responsibility of everyone in the club.

GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE

The district has again been invited to take part in a regular Group Study Exchange during the year 1987-88. In order to apply for such a program, I must have the support of 2/3 of the clubs in the district which must be received by December 1st and may be by mail ballot. I'm going to again use a technique which I learned a long time ago ---

IF YOU OBJECT TO DISTRICT 779 HAVING A GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE IN OUR 1987-88 ROTARY YEAR, LET ME KNOW PRIOR TO DECEMBER 1ST - OTHERWISE I WILL CONSIDER THAT YOU HAVE VOTED IN FAVOR."

The second part of that is the naming of a chairman for the exchange. Please check with your membership NOW and let me know the names of any individual(s) interested in getting involved in this very important Rotary work.

How to form a Rotaract Club?? What is a Rotaract Club???

These questions, and many more, will find their answer in booklets prepared for you by Rotary and available from the Secretariat. However, it is important to remind Rotarians that there are two kinds of Rotaract Clubs: those grouping young adult workers of either sex (those resemble most a regular Rotary Club) and those which are started in educational institutions of higher learning (Colleges or Universities). Here are a few sample and simple steps to form a club:

1. Elect to your club a suitable Educational minded man.
2. Contact the Student Council and convince them to make this program into one of their projects.
3. Find a Charter President among leaders in the student body.
4. Bring him as well as a few select friends, to several of your Rotary meetings, particularly those where Community service items are being discussed.
5. Insure that bi-monthly Rotaract meetings are called to recruit members, and be sure that in addition to the Rotary representative (his attendance is compulsory), two or three other colleagues are there.

**Service Briefs**

Members of the Rotary Club of Aabybro, Denmark, have made several excursions to Poland—a non-Rotary country—where they distributed clothes and other necessities to needy people. They also “adopted” a home for blind Polish children which they visit every Christmas bearing gifts of toys and food. . . . The Rotary Club of Waterville, Maine, U.S.A., is helping to restore healthy elm trees (ravaged by Dutch elm disease) to its community. The club donated US\$5,000 for the care and maintenance by Boy Scouts of seedling disease-resistant elms nurtured on land provided by the local college. The goal: to plant the trees at selected sites and bring back to Waterville its long-held nickname “The Elm City.”

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO...

Cynthia Fake was a Rotary Scholar 1977-78 to Cairo, Egypt. She graduated in 1979 from Dartmouth College Cum Laude with Special Distinction in her major, Russian Studies.

To try her skills in rowing, she went to Seattle to train with an Olympic Coach. She found she didn't have the dedication of an Olympic athlete, so turned to another interest.

Accepted by the Peace Corps in 1982, she worked in agricultural education in Togo, West Africa for 2 1/2 years. She was able to use the Arabic learned as a Rotary Scholar in Egypt. Her year there certainly helped her to adapt to the Togolese culture. In addition to her volunteer service, she has been employed as a trainer for new Peace Corps volunteers in Togo for 2 summers.

Presently, she is working in Berkeley, California and planning to go to graduate school in the field of agricultural extension work.

Nouvelles du Rotaract

Comment former un Rotaract Club???  
Qu'est-ce qu'un Rotaract Club???

Toutes ces questions trouvent leur réponse dans la documentation fournie par le Rotary sur demande au secrétariat. Cependant, il faut se rappeler qu'il existe deux sortes de Rotaract Clubs, ceux qui regroupent de jeunes travailleurs des deux sexes (et qui ressemblent le plus à un Rotary Club en plus jeune) et ceux qui existent à l'intérieur d'une institution d'enseignement supérieur (Cegep ou université).

Les étapes à suivre sont en gros:

1. Elire un Rotarien qui oeuvre dans l'institution visée.
2. Passer par le conseil étudiant pour les sensibiliser au service à autrui et faire du Rotaract un de leurs projets.
3. Trouver un président fondateur parmi les élèves qui possèdent un certain leadership à l'intérieur de l'institution.
4. L'amener, ainsi que quelques-uns de ses amis, à plusieurs réunions hebdomadaires de votre Rotary Club, particulièrement s'il y est question de service communautaire.
5. S'assurer que des réunions de formation bimensuelles sont tenues pour recruter le noyau du club et y encourager la présence non seulement du parrain rotarien officiel (obligatoire), mais au moins de deux ou trois autres.

**Nouvelles brèves**

Les membres du Rotary Club d'Aabybro, Danemark, ont organisé plusieurs excursions en Pologne, pays où le Rotary n'est pas implanté, pour distribuer des vêtements usagés et des produits de première nécessité aux indigents. Ils ont en outre «adopté» un foyer polonais pour enfants non voyants à qui ils rendent visite tous les ans, à l'époque des fêtes de Noël, pour les combler de cadeaux. . . . Le Rotary Club de Waterville, Maine, E.-U., participe à une tentative de reboisement de sa région après qu'une épidémie ait décimé tous les ormes des magnifiques parcs situés au centre et aux environs de la ville.

PORTLAND ROTARY CLUB

I said a lot last month about the Pittsburgh program of housing people at their hospital -- now learn about a similar program here in district 779. Portland Rotary Club developed the Rotary House Fund to make housing available, at no cost, to families in need of a place to stay during a loved one's hospitalization. Eligibility for Rotary House Fund assistance is established by the social service departments of the participating hospitals in the Portland area. This is a GREAT program, one other clubs might be interested in trying on their local level.

**WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE**

Rotary Clubs in District 107 provide an Emergency Box System; a central spot where they try to keep in stock 1,000 boxes ready for immediate dispatch to any disaster in the world. Boxes are standard size — and made of wood.

Clubs fill one or more boxes each year and send it to the central store. The outside of the box has a label attached which is returned to the club stating where in the world the case has been dispatched to.

Contents of the boxes: Ground sheet, blankets, clothing — outer & underwear for males, females & children, shoes, cooking utensils, plates and mugs (metal), knives, forks and spoons, a penknife, rope or twine, and bandages.

When needed, the boxes are sent to the disaster areas through the efforts of the Red Cross or similar agency.

Which of you would like to take this on as a club project? I think that somewhere in District 779 there is a Rotarian who is just waiting to be asked. Who is he????

**POLIO PLUS**

District effort is underway! Is your club involved? If not, please start. Keep the effort internal as we still await news from RI on the nation-wide effort to include corporate and other outside of Rotary gifts.

Ideas — "Happy Bucks" program — direct funds to Polio Plus. Dover/Durham has started and club will match each dollar from treasure up to \$1,300 annual limit. Portsmouth Club added a 50 cent per member per meeting gift to an internal project. The extra 50 cents per member adds up quickly.

Please advise Dick Clark how you intend to participate. He'll share the info with other clubs. Tell him of the amount you have sent to Rotary Foundation for Polio Plus. Remember these dollars count for Paul Harris Fellowship credit.

## REDISTRICTING - WHAT DO OTHERS THINK??

Although many have voiced their encouragement for my move to redistrict, and some have written their support, all is certainly not on the positive side...Following are their views and my comments.

First - and the ones who have done the best job in saying NO - is from the Newburyport Rotary Club. You all were mailed a copy by the Newburyport club so I ask that you read it carefully. I do not fully agree with their arguments regarding the age of the District Governor. I have nothing against Albert Einstein, Thomas Edison or Ronald Reagan (in this context!!) but neither of them ever tried to lead 67 volunteers. Look elsewhere in my newsletter regarding the minimum of 80 clubs; I can predict them within two or three years, easily.

Second - a letter from Portsmouth says in part "While our Board members and most of our past presidents agree that future redistricting is probably inevitable, we do object to your proposal as regards timing and procedure. In June, at the Balsams, we heard that R.I. decided to leave 779 as is and at the Kennebunkport Clambake, M.A.T. Caparas said "if not broke, don't fix."

What was heard at the Balsams was that R.I. does not have the power to redistrict, if we don't do it, they cannot. In regard to what MATT said at Kennebunkport, I have it all on video tape and I cannot find him saying this. What I have on tape is this: MAT said that in 1964 his district had 50 clubs spread over a distance of 1,000 miles; and that in 1964 the district was split in two. Then he said, "I would not have accepted the job of District Governor if the district had not been divided. It would have been impossible for a comparatively young struggling lawyer like I to accept such a responsibility. But when I was told that my district would have only 27 clubs, then I felt it was a task that I could, with some help, perform. The crucial decision in promoting the extension of Rotary is the decision to divide the district."

He added a thought that I think has a great deal of merit. After the redistricting (there are now 9 districts instead of the 2), the presidents of all of the clubs get together every one or two years in a reunion of friendship and sharing of Rotary ideas. I think that if we redistrict, this should certainly be done in the future as often as we want. If any of you would like your very own VHS copy of MATT'S presentation at the Shawmut Inn, I'll make it for you and mail it - \$6.00 per copy (my cost). The quality is not great (I'm just a beginner) but the sound is clear.

Don Tardif asked if I would have been willing to accept the DG job knowing that Dist 779 could have 67 clubs. You bet I would have. What is more important to me is that I now have to ask someone to be DG with 80 clubs!!!!!! I have a lot of trouble with that.
