

My Dear Fellow Rotarians,

It is really great to meet so many of you in this vibrant, friendly district that's so dedicated to serving others. If each of you could be with us, it would become increasingly clear that we, through Rotary ARE making a difference in our community, our district and in the world. I am sure that we all know and share the feeling of satisfaction that one has from helping others.

August is Membership & Extension month. But we really need to stress this important area all year long. Make that extra effort to promote good fellowship within the club and to include new members in all activities. Someone invited us to join Rotary and to share in the fellowship of service. We all have that same responsibility to invite other qualified individuals to do the same. Members are our most important asset and are too valuable to lose through neglect.

What about specifics? Extend the opportunity for fellowship with plans and goals for bringing in new members. (We all owe our Rotary membership to some very astute, prior member.) Demonstrate the ideal of service by personal example and by increasing club involvement in community service. And, broaden the Rotary experience through aggressive club support of RI programs.

Even more specifically, I've set these quite makable District 779 goals for the year:

- · 10% Net membership increase per club.
- 8 new clubs. (3 in new 779, 5 in 778)
- \$10 per member for Intercultural Nursing.
- 60% Club participation in RI 89-90 Presidential Citation Program.
- 10% Of members as RI Foundation Benefactors. (Total: 400)
- \$125K Unrestricted donations for RI Foundation.

We can do it!

The auditor often suggests updated methods, advises on any new state requirements, and may know of ways to improve cash flow and return on unspent funds. Remember that funds co-mingling is a "no-no".

New (1989) RI Manual of Procedure

The 1989 meeting of the Council on Legislation in Singapore enacted significant changes in RIRules. They will be reflected in a new MOP due out in September '89.

We don't always ask the general membership whether they would like to order a copy. The response might be surprising. (The RI 89-90 Directory too!...\$7)

1989-90 RI Presidential Citation Program

Please note page 33 of the July 1989 Rotarian and its coverage. DG Jim has asked that 60% of our clubs participate in this program. (Also check out the nice biography on RI President Hugh Archer on pp 24-27.)

There's not enough room in this Newsletter to recopy items from the <u>Rotarian</u>, but we will highlight some to you from time to time.

More on World Fellowship Activities.

"Rotarians who share common interests in worthwhile recreational or avocational activities are encouraged to associate themselves in groups for the purpose of furthering acquaintance and fellowship." RI Pub. No. PA2-729-EN.

This pub goes on to list a cross-section of the areas where organizations already exist that you can get in touch with. Here's a few: Amatuer Radio (Like RI Pres. Archer), Golf, Music, Stamps, Travel and, oh yes, Wine Appreciation. New ones are being added all the time. The chairman of each is also listed in the RI Official Directory.

Doug Stewart, Past Pres. of the Cape Elizabeth/S. Portland club, is in charge. (15 Mountain View Rd., Cape Eliz. 04107. Home phone (207) 767-2351) Doug's interested in assisting and/or hearing of your experiences in this program – a great way to ENJOY ROTARY.

Handle External Solicitations with Care.

There's a recent RI warning that clubs use care in responding to outside requests for financial assistance. Valid one's will come via RI or the District Governor. For example, there is no current RI program for disaster aid. When in doubt, call our RI Rep Russ Barefield.

World Community Service (WCS).

"What has to be done is to get people and clubs together to match resources and needs worldwide so that international goodwill is translated into concrete projects that serve the gaping needs of mankind, particularly the poor." M.A.T. Caparas – RI Pres. 86-87.

District 779's Intercultural Nursing and Water Well programs are concrete and continuing examples of what's possible. But, what can individual clubs do on their own?

To start, learn more about World Community Service and let others know. Read or review Volume 5 of the Rotary Basic Library. Consider buying "World Community Service – Rotary's Torchlight of Hope." It's a 40-slide set with script. (PA2-788-MU) Or, the videotape "Pathways of Promise." And, you can include speakers who highlight a serious world problem.

Youth Activities.

September will be with us soon, and with it comes RI's accent, and ours, of Youth Activities. It's aptly stated that "Every Rotarian (is) an example to youth." And, we trust, a particularly good example too.

It's obvoius that Rotarians have a natural obligation to provide that good example to our potential Rotarians of the future. RI requests that clubs use September as a time for programs that accent the needs and opportunities of youth.

Want to know more? Check out volume 6 of the Rotary Library presented to all club presidents by DG Jim. And, the RI 89-90 Catalog has some interesting offerings.

As Socrates has said: "The right way to begin is to pay attention to to the young, and make them just as good as possible." Amen. What a fine way to ENJOY ROTARY!

<u>Second</u>. High ethical standards in business and professions; The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; And the dignifying by each Rotarian of their occupation as an opportunity to <u>Service</u> society.

<u>Third</u>. The application of the Ideal of <u>Service</u> by every Rotarian to their personal, business, and community life.

Fourth. The advancement of international understanding, good will and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional people united in the Ideal of Service.
