The second semi-annual report on your club membership for 1 Jan - 30 June 1990 is due on 1 January. You should have the forms in hand.

Establishment Of Commemoration Week.

RI has established the week of 27 January – the date Paul Harris died – as a time to officially remember those members who have passed away and to note their contributions to Rotary. It will become an annual observance.

The Satisfaction In Helping Others.

(From RI) Being a Rotarian means enjoying the warm fellowship of weekly meetings. It means feeling proud when a young person from your community makes a significant contribution to society using what was learned as a Rotary scholar. It means sharing the joy of a person who sees their family for the first time in years after cataract surgury performed at a Rotary eye camp. It means fostering better understanding between people in different countries through exchange programs and goodwill activities.

Why not share the satisfaction that comes from being a Rotarian? Let's invite other service-minded men and women in our community to become club members so that they can ENJOY Rotary too!

A late World Health Organization report shows II larger nations and 19 small Caribbean nations are now essentially polio free! At the end of July there were only 66 cases reported in the hemisphere versus 192 last year.

Rotary's \$27,364,960 in Polio Plus grants to 27 countries has made a big difference we can all feel good about.
