

World Understanding And Peace Day.

RI has given 23 February this title and it's <u>also</u> RI's 85th Anniversary. How about working both of these meanings into your club meeting closest to this date.

Rotary Leadership. (Excerpt: Ray Klinginsmith)

"Buzz" Tennent, RI President in 1957-58 got to the heart of things saying: "The magic, the genius, the power of Rotary is friendly service finding expression in the lives of men." There is a certain magic about Rotary, and that magic is found in our principles, our objectives, and our programs — all of which have been created by leaders at all levels of our organization.

Our debt to them can be summarized in two simple questions? (1) Where would Rotary (Your Club) be today without the efforts of its past leaders? And, (2) Were will Rotary (Your Club) be tomorrow without your efforts? What a debt we owe! What a responsibility we share!

Make one new, real friend a month.

No "bad mouthing" or gossip. Protest without a program is worthless.

Say something nice to those feared/hated and mean it. Meet fear head-on through positive confrontation.

Have one idea for positive change a month. (Business and/or home) Be detailed — with resources, strengths and weaknesses, results intended and how to accomplish.

THINK. Put aside specific time to consider life.

Where are you going and how do you plan to get there? How do you plan to improve/change?

Develop a WRITTEN life plan and keep it current.

What's Interact?

It's part of RI's Service To Youth. Specifically, INTERACT is for young people 14-18 years of age. Each club annually carries out at least one project that benefits its school or community plus an international project. It all started in Melbourne, Florida in 1962. Number-wise, there were 130,372 members in 5,926 clubs in 88 countries.

<u>Third</u>. The application of the Ideal of <u>Service</u> by every Rotarian to their personal, business, and community life.

<u>Fourth</u>. The advancement of international understanding, good will and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional people united in the Ideal of <u>Service</u>.
