

PUBLIC Responsibility RELATIONS

IN Your Club's public relations planning, you should try to look ahead as much as a year. Planning is always worthwhile. Ask yourself, what will this club be doing during the Christmas period? Anything newsworthy? What about the summer period? Will your club be working with youth groups or Boys Scouts, or Little League? Do you have anything

planned to help the local high school when they come back in the fall? Any holiday connections with your club? Are you planning to renovate a local historic site, or create a park? Be thinking . . . and planning . . . well in advance so that opportunities for good public relations can be create. At the very least, if you plan well is advance, it will reduce the opportunities lost!

ROTARY VOLUNTEERS IN ACTION An Opportunity for Service Above Self

RVIA developed out of a long history of Rotary interest in volunteerism. In the 1960s, R.I. established the Rotary Volunteers Abroad (RVA) program to match skilled Rotarians with volunteer needs in countries other than their own.

In the 1970s, the RVA concept became a part of the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) program, established to commemorate Rotary's 75th anniversary. The volunteers were known as 3-H Volunteers and many of them worked in Rotary projects that received 3-H grants. The 3-H Program, including 3-H Volunteers, later became one of the programs of The Rotary Foundation. Then, in 1986, the volunteer component of the 3-H Program became a separate program, known as Rotary Volunteers.

The Rotary Volunteers program of The Rotary Foundation is today a vital part of the Foundation's activity. It finds volunteers for Foundation projects, such as 3-H and Polio Plus, and for several service sites to which it has an ongoing commitment to provide volunteers. Rotarians planning to volunteer abroad at the invitation of a host Rotary club or district for four to eight weeks can also apply to the program for a partial subsidy, usually one half the round trip economy air fare and up to \$20 per day for expenses. Participants in international RVIA can take advantage of this opportunity.

Then, two years ago, RVIA was established by the R.I. Board of Directors, which saw the need for a coordinated volunteerism effort, encompassing not just international volunteering, but also community and district efforts.

At the international level, RVIA and Rotary Foundation Rotary Volunteers cooperate closely. RVIA fulfills the information networking function, maintaining the registry of volunteers and projects needing volunteers, while the Foundation's Rotary Volunteers program provides partial funding for those international volunteers who meet established criteria.



At past District Conferences and other Rotary events Rotarians have frequently sung "Let There Be Peace on Earth". Recently I ran across this piece and I thought it might interest you.

"LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH"

(Let it begin with me) By Sy Miller and Jill Jackson

Let there be peace on earth And let it begin with me; Let there be peace on earth The peace that was meant to be.

With God as our Father, Brothers all are we. Let me walk with my brother In perfect harmony. Let peace begin with me, Let this be the moment now. With every step I take, Let this be my solemn vow:

To take each moment and live each moment
In peace eternally.
Let there be peace on earth
And let it begin with me.

One summer evening in 1955, a group of 180 teenagers of all races and religions, meeting at a workshop high in the California mountains locked arms, formed a circle and sang a song of peace. They felt that singing the song, with its simple basic sentiment-"Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me," helped to create a climate for world peace and understanding.

When they came down from the mountain, these inspired young people brought the song with them and started sharing it. And, as though on wings, "Let There Be Peace On Earth" began an amazing journey around the globe. It traveled first, of course with the young campers back to their homes and schools, churches and clubs. Then the circle started by the tenagers began to grow. Soon the song was being shared in all fifty states—at school graduations and at PTA meetings, at Christmas and Easter gatherings and as part of the celebration of Brotherhood Week. It was a theme for Veteran's Day, Human Rights Day and U.N. Day. 4H Clubs and the United Auto Workers began singing it. So did the American Legion, the B'nai B'rith, the Rotary Clubs and CORE. It was taped, recorded, copied, printed in song books, and passed by word of mouth.

The song spread overseas to Holland, England, France, Germany, Lebanon. To South America, Asia and Australia. The Maoris in New Zealand sang it--even the Zulus in Africa sang it.

Professional singers took it up. Among them, Emie Ford, Andy Williams, Danny Kaye, Nat Cole, the Smothers Brothers, Roy Rogers, Dale Evans, Eddie Albert, Edie Adams, John Gary, Pearl Bailey, Roberta Shore, Champ Butler, the King Sisters, Mary Tyler Moore, John Raitt, Robie Lester, Liberace, Bob Crosby, the Inter-national Children's Choir, Jack Halloran, Gisele MacKenzie, Richard Summers, Lloyd Bridges, Patti Page, Angela Cartwright, the Young Americans, Carole Wells, Jack Smith, Pat Boone, Johnny Mathis, Rhonda Fleming, Stan Melton, Norman Luboff, the Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, Lome Greene, and Ted Mack TV Shows and Father Keller's Christopher TV Series.

The song began to win awards. "Let There Be Peace On Earth" was awarded the George Washington Honor Medal by the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for "Outstanding achievement in helping to bring about a better understanding of the American Way of Life." It also received a Brotherhood Award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

This simple thought, "Let There Be Peace On Earth, and Let it Begin With Me" first born on a mountain top in the voices of youth, continues to travel heart to heart-gathering in people everywhere who wish to become a note in a song of understanding and peace-peace for all mankind.

Plans for the first District 778 Conference are reaching the final stages and the committee hopes that they will include your participation. On the genda is the election of a representative to the council on legislation and a visit from our Group Study Exchange team who then will have been back from Mexico only a few days. The second plenary session will focus on club activities with the opportunity for clubs and district officers to share ideas and ways to ei ce our club's community whether local or world - commitment. We are fortunate to have both Past R.I. Director Art Richardson (see page 3) of our own district helping us

with the conference and Past R.I. Vice President George Arceneaux, Jr. playing an active role in his capacity as Representative of President Paulo. These two knowledgeable and dedicated Rotarians serve together on the international "Preserve Planet Earth" Committee and clubs should take every opportunity to gain from George and Art a better insight into the "Preserve Planet Earth" endeavors and commitment of Rotary International.

A full schedule is planned for Shirley Mooers and Lucille Cloutier will be hosting a Friday luncheon for spouses of current club Presidents and, on Saturday morning, Stella Patten and Betty Jenson will host a breakfast for spouses of incoming club Presidents.


If you cannot attend the entire conference, each club, at the very least, should have members attending the Saturday morning symposium and workshops. The information you gain from these meetings will provide you and your club a real chance to undertake meaningful environmental projects in your communities next year. Governor Dan Mooers and Governor Roland Cloutier will be on hand to say "Welcome!" - "Bienvenue!"

Quebec is so unique that it has attracted world interest: it is the first North American city to be included on UNESCO's prestigious World Heritage list along with the Pyramids of Gizeh, the Statue of Liberty, and the cities of Tunis, Cairo, Warsaw, Jerusalem, Rome and others. 
