# Friends Forever

In April of 1988, a slender 18-year old girl from Carrickfergus, Northern Ireland, stepped to the mike during a Portsmouth, N.H. Rotary luncheon to recite her latest poem. It was a poem no child of ours could write. In her "wee Irish voice," little Karyn Woods moved the capacity crowd to stunned silence, telling softly but painfully of the fears and frustrations of trying to grow up with hopes in a society where a bomb in a friend's car, or blood on the kitchen floor, might happen at any time . . . and too often does.

Karyn was in Portsmouth with "Friends Forever," a program conceived in 1986 by then-Portsmouth Rotarian Bob Raiche, and which each year brings to New England carefully selected Northern Irish teens (a deliberate mix of Catholic and Protestant with leadership potential) for a two-week experience that launches them into the multi-year program.

In 1990, the Portsmouth club launched an effort outside its district to enlist other Rotary clubs seeking an international mission. With increased Rotary participation, the number of children advanced from the usual 10 and 12 to 18, and in 1991 (the first full year of Rotary recruiting), to 30. More communities in Northern Ireland were represented, and Rotary in NorthernIreland helped in the recruiting effort, too.

Then in July 1990, the Rotary Club of Cambridge, Mass., with only one actual experience with kids, made a commitment to fund an entire two-week program for 10 or more young people (about a \$10,000 challenge), the first club other than Portsmouth to do so.

We salute "Friends Forever," which has earned the recognition of the British government and the prestigious American Ireland Fund, and has attracted the interest of President Bush who has met with several of the groups. Hailed by many as "the perfect Rotary project," the "Friends Forever" approach has proven extraordinarily effective, combining four equally important, interdependent elements in a unique manner.

# Rotary Dollars Buys Healthmobile for Brazil

Thirteen Rotary clubs from District 7780 and two clubs from District 7790

have participated in a fund-raising project which has implimented a Mobile Health Outreach Program for Rio Grande Do Norte, Brazil.

Organized by the Rotary Club of Biddeford-Saco, \$30,000 has been raised to purchase and equip a "Healthmobile," a four-wheel drive vehicle which will be used by The Mission Sisters of the Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary to supply medical help in remote areas of Brazil where such help is unavailable. Cooperating in the project are Rotarians from Brazil.

Sister Priscilla Roy, a Biddeford native who has been working in an extremely poor section of Brazil for over 20 years, will supervise the use of the vehicle by professional nurses, nutritionists and health care givers.

The local Rotary clubs raised \$15,000 for the project, which was matched by \$15,000 from the Rotary Foundation.
Contributors were clubs in Waterville, Old Town, Westbrook-Gorham, South Portland-Maine Mall, Bethel, Kittery, Wells, Scarborough, Saco Bay, Bath, Biddeford-Saco, Sanford-Springvale and Kennebunk in Maine, and Portsmouth and Seabrook in New Hampshire.

"Thank you for the great effort made by so many clubs," said Sister Theresa Couture, Provincial Superior of the of the S. C. I. M. in Saco, Maine. "Before we even start, we already know of 539 infants and children up to three years of age who need our care. There are at least 160 more expectant mothers in need of pre-natal care, and education..."
