# TWO WORLD LEADERS LIFELONG FRIENDS

Past RI President and Former General of the Salvation Army School Chums in Canada.

Arnold Brown, born in London, England moved to Belleville, Canada, at the age of ten where Jack Davis lived in a nearby farming community, Foxboro. Both attended school in Belleville, Ontario. Three years after Davis moved to Bermuda in 1931, Arnold joined the Salvation Army in Bowmanville and from there steadily advanced in the Corps until he became international leader in July, 1977. He was installed the very same day on July 1, 1977 when his friend took office as Rotary's International President. Brown became a Paul Harris Fellow that year. Prior to assuming the Generalship, Brown was Territorial Commander for Canada and Bermuda where Davis was extremely active in the Coral Island's community and business life.

President Jack died on April 1, 1981. It was at Jack's memorial service that General Brown led the dedication ceremony in the unveiling of a monument in honor of his lifelong Rotarian friend.

At the age of 79, General Brown's energy and spirit belie his years. He was featured speaker at the recent Salvation Army's Annual luncheon in Portland on April 29th. He will be present at a summer encampment here and on September 24th guest speaker at a service club Salvation Army benefit luncheon in Newburyport, Massachusetts. Several weeks ago, he gave the 80th Anniversary Commemorative Address to the Rotary Club of London, England, the first Rotary Club in Europe.



### W. JACK DAVIS 1909-1981

Called an "uncommon international leader", W. Jack Davis was a man who devoted his entire life to worthwhile pursuits; a man successful in business, with business relationships extending over three continents, a church leader who made his influence felt in many Christian movements; a community leader who supported many successful projects, and an active and enthusiastic sportsman and world traveler.

Jack served as President of Rotary International in 1977-78. He was a founding member of the Advisory Board of the Salvation Army in Bermuda and its Finance Chairman.

After moving to Bermuda from Canada, he became a partner in his company and expanded its trading activities worldwide.

Becoming a member of the Rotary Club of Hamilton in 1943, he served as its president in 1948-49. From there his Rotary activities expanded at an accelerated pace to the culmination of his leadership of the international organization in 1977.

Jack and Doris had two married daughters and four grandchildren. Jack died in 1981 at the age of 72.



### GENERAL ARNOLD BROWN, O.C.

General Arnold Brown was world leader of the Salvation Army from 1977 until the end of 1981. Earlier, he served for five years as Chief of the Staff - second-in-command of this global movement and as leader of youth service work throughout Canada and the Bermuda Territory.

He is an Officer of the Order of Canada, a Freeman of the City of London, England, and has been granted, honoris causa, the degrees of L.H.D. (Asbury College, U.S.A.) and D.D. (Olivet College, U.S.A.) While in London he received from Earl Mountbatten of Burma the World Humanitarian Award shortly before the Earl's untimely death.

General Brown has authored several books including his autobiography, "The Gate and the Light".

Prominent in the Rotary movement, he is an honorary member of the Rotary Club of London, England, and the Rotary Club of Toronto, a Paul Harris Fellow, and has been principle speaker at two international conventions. He was President of the London Club.

He and his wife have retired in Canada. He has two married daughters.

# PORTSMOUTH ROTARY HOSTS "FRIENDS FOREVER" STUDENTS FROM NORTHERN IRELAND

The Rotary club of Portsmouth recently hosted 40 students from Northern Ireland, here as part of a two-week program sponsored by "Friends Forever." The purpose of Friends Forever is to promote understanding and peace by breaking down the barriers of sectarian prejudice in Northern Ireland through its youth. This year's group, the largest since the program's founding in 1986, hosted 20 Protestant and 20 Catholic children.

Friends Forever is an official joint program of the Seacoast Family YMCA and the Carrickfergus YMCA in Northern Ireland. This year, Ireland's Belfast YMCA participated as well. The program is supported as an International Service Project of the Portsmouth Rotary Club, with additional support from other area Rotary clubs. The program brings a carefully selected group of Catholic and Protestant teenagers together with American families; t students gain a new sense of tolerance as hope for the future, while the host families come away with increased international understanding and personal insight.

The students' stay here in America is reinforced by follow-up programs back in Ireland that further develop leadership,

helping "the next generation rise above old attitudes, and bridge the gap that divides them with understanding," according to Bill Fleming, Cross Community Director of the Belfast YMCA.

Representatives of the group told Portsmouth Rotarians that "we've all been 'wounded' by violence; we've never known or experienced peace in our lives." Participants stated that the Friends Forever program gives them a respite an opportunity to "break down the barriers that separate people" because "here, we have the confidence to speak our minds and the ability to dream together about how our country can be."

Elizabeth Kennedy, Executive Director of Friends Forever, reminded Rotarians that it is "no small thing to learn how to get along, to really learn the power of friendship."


