Rotary Youth Leadership Awards Conference

Leadership Conference June 26, 27, 28, 1991 Bridgton Academy, Maine

The Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) Conference is a program for high school sophomores who have shown leadership in their home, school and community life. The conference attempts to introduce the students to thoughts and ideas which, if utilized would strengthen and develop their leadership skills.

RYLA is a young people's program that was adopted officially by Rotary in 1971. Conducted on the district level, RYLA also offers Rotarians an opportunity to participate personally in developing leadership qualities in young men and women who are selected by Rotary clubs to participate in a conference which features educational and recreational activities in an atmosphere promoting the development of leadership skills.

Last year alone, RYLA programs provided experiential learning opportunities to over 9,000 students in 30 countries opportunities which were designed to increase student leadership skills and promote their overall effectiveness.

Although RYLA has been an established program, last year's conference was the first one for District 7780. The attendance of 48 students representing 25 clubs demonstrates 85 percent participation by the clubs in the district. We hope that all clubs in the district will participate this year, and we are allocating space for two participants per club.

RYLA has very active support from DG Bob Patten, PDG Dan Mooers, DGN Mort Schmidt and DGD Dick Clark, who

CLUBNE

The Rotary Club of Durham-Great Bay recently sent five members to Wellingford, Vermont, for a "Special Make-up," which none of them needed, to see the Paul Harris Memorial Building. The club is currently participating in a "Gift of Reading" program. Five hundred low-income children have the privilege of selecting a new book, through monetary contributions from the Durham-Great Bay club, among other local organizations.

The Biddeford Rotary Club recently raised over \$3,900 for the Maine Children's Cancer Program. Twentyseven teams participated in the three separate softball tournament events. There's much talk among other clubs about next year's revenge.

The Kittery Rotary Club was recently honored, receiving a Certificate of Appreciation in recognition of the club's interest, enthusiasm and unselfish efforts which enabled a special person to learn, grow and experience the joy of sports. The award was presented to Dennis Dean, president of Kittery Special Olympics, and was accepted by Dan Thornhill, special needs chair.

NH Special Olympics also notified Thornhill that he was among those nominated for Volunteer of the Year, 1990-91. Under his leadership, Kittery Rotary Club members have volunteered at the Special Olympics Games at the University of New Hampshire for the past two years, and previously assisted at the Maine games held at the University of Maine at Orono.

The South Portland-Cape Elizabeth Rotary Club has established the first jointly sponsored "Rotary Village Corps" in Xalapa, Mexico, with the Rotary Club of Xalapa, Veracruz, Mexico. The idea for a Village Corps in the Xalapa neighborhood originated with PDG Dan Mooers after his visit to that community in May 1991. Xalapa Rotarians took Dan and Shirley Mooers to a poverty-stricken neighborhood and showed them the "Naciones Unidas" school, built initially through the efforts of the Rotary Club of Xalapa, and expanded by the personal labor of students' parents with materials provided by the government.

Dan returned to his club determined to help a community which so wanted to help itself. He encouraged the club's International Service Committee to consider sponsoring, both emotionally and financially, with the Xalapa Club, an RVC (a community neighborhood action organization of non-Rotarians sponsored by one or more Rotary clubs), in the United Nations School neighborhood. Both clubs have moved quickly to foster the growth of this project.

The RVC will encourage the residents of Xalapa to undertake projects which will benefit their community or neighborhood. Representatives of the SP-CE club intend to travel to Xalapa, Mexico early next year.

By his family, friends, colleagues, patients, neighbors, fellow firefighters, Rotarians, the life of Andy Longley, Jr., was celebrated at the Elijah Kellogg Church, Harpswell Center, November 25th, when the hour of two o'clock was tolled throughout the community.

Even then the fact that Andy was no longer with us was so difficult to believe, let alone comprehend.

Crowded church, moments of his busy, happy life recalled, the plaintive notes from the organ, the hymns, the prayers, the whispered conversations, the tears and later the bountiful reception at the Grange Hall all spoke eloquently of the full but tragically shortened life of Andrew M. Longley, Jr., 1948-1991.

He came to Cundy's Harbor in 1975, set up his medical practice, married "Becky" Darling, fathered two lovely children, became a community leader, joined the Brunswick Rotary, later became its president and currently was serving as District Chair of Community Service and Rotary Volunteers in Action.

From the latter was conceived "Adopt a Maine Island" project championed by Andy. He knew and loved Casco Bay and a gem of an island there, Jewell, that needed to have its true luster restored.

It shall be.

District 7780 has adopted Andy's plan. The Newburyport Rotary Club, former home club of Andy's father, has made a generous donation as a firm commitment to that goal.

Its continuation now will be a living memorial that Andy dreamed of when he formulated the concept, made the necessary contacts and enthusiastically promoted the project to the assembled Rotarians at the recent District Conference.

For all Rotarians, for Stella and me our hearts and hands are open with warmth, affection and prayers for Becky, Andy III, Meriel and both families.

At this moment, to my mind, none can more eloquently express my sentiments than Alfred Lord Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar." This lyric, at the poet's request, was always placed at the end of every edition of his poems.

> Sunset and evening star, And one clear call for me! And may there be no moaning of the bar, When I put out to sea,

But such a tide as moving seems asleep, Too full for sound and foam, When that which drew from out the boundless deep Turns again home.

Twilight and evening bell, And after that the dark! And may there be no sadness of farewell, When I embark;

For though from out our bourne of Time and Place The flood may bear me far, I hope to see my Pilot face to face When I have crost the bar.

was last year's RYLA chair. There is now a District 7780 committee which F. Herbert Barnes of the Portland club is chairing; Lynn Hendricks of the Biddeford club is vice-chair. The committee is hard at work planning the 1992 RYLA Conference.

Herb Barnes brings a lot of experience to this committee. He has been a member of The Rotary Club of Portland since 1983. His club activities include Youth Services Committee (he was committee chairman) and International Service committee, as well as membership on the club's board of directors. He was one of the founding fathers of the Youth Exchange Program in District 7780 and in District 7890 in Connecticut, where he was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Litchfield. He first joined Rotary in 1967 in Pennsylvania, and served District 7430 as a member of its Youth Exchange Program and as chair of a special District 7430 summer program, LeGrand Exchange. Professionally, Herb is very active in the social service arena, being a licensed clinical social worker in the state of Maine.

Last year's students urged the RYLA committee to make this year's program longer, and taking their considerations into account, it will be a little longer. The theme of the RYLA '92 Conference is LOOK BEYOND YOURSELF-YOUCAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE. Registration begins at 11:00 a.m. Then it will move into a challenge course right after lunch, brought to the students by the same University of New Hampshire staff which conducted last year's program. A presentation on Interact will be made to the students during the conference. The closing session will provide an opportunity to present the Youth Exchange Program to the students and their parents.

How do you get involved? The first step is designating a chairperson for this year'sclub RYLA program, and a co-chair who will be in charge of coordinating RYLA for your club the following year.
