

Rotary International Home Exchange Fellowship Invites Participants

How would you like to vacation in Paris, or Monaco, or Japan, or (wh erever) and live in your own home or villa enjoying the fellowship and friendship of Rotarians in the area?

The Rotary International Home Exchange Fellowship is approaching that time of the year when they once again solicit your interest. The main objectives of the program are:

* To provide an opportunity to increase international understanding by visiting and vacationing in another country and actually becoming involved in the lifestyle of other Rotarians and their families.

* To provide opportunities for exchanges within one's own country so to better appreciate it and also to promote the Fellowship of Rotary. The Fellowship directory is published once per year, usually in January, listing details of all Rotarians who wish to participate (exchange homes) in the current year. On receipt of the directory, it is then up to each individual to enter into further correspondence with other Rotarians who are listed, to make whatever arrangements they can to schedule a Home Exchange at a mutually convenient time.

Registrations must be in the hands of the Fellowship by October 31st to be included in the 1995 directory. By registering, there is no commitment to proceed with any particular exchange, though the majority of Rotarians do, in fact, arrange such an exchange.

The initial cost to register is \$25 which is not a great amount. Each exchange, by the way, usually includes the use of the other Rotarian's car and sometimes boat or R.V. At the completion of an exchange, the

Rotarian is requested to submit a brief report on the experience, to be used to further promote the fellowship.

The opportunities for vacation and travel available to Rotarians who register with the Home Exchange Fellowship are legion, so why not think about "Swapping-Rotary-Style." Attention - All Clubs BY-LAWS CHANGE



The RI Board now recommends the following text (previously called the "alternate plan") for Articles I, II & IV of the club bylaws. The common practice of a club's membership electing the board of directors at the annual meeting and then having the club's incoming board elect the officers for the next year is unconstitutional. The Standard Rotary Club Constitution clearly requires that the officers be elected at the annual meeting.

Article I - Election of Directors and Officers

Section 1—At a regular meeting one month prior to the meeting for election of officers, the presiding officer shall ask for nominations by members of the club for president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and _____ members of the board of directors. The nominations may be presented by a nominating committee or by members from the floor, by either or by both as a club may determine. If it is determined to have a nominating committee, such committee shall be appointed as the club may determine. The nominations duly made shall be placed on a ballot in alphabetical order under each office and shall be voted for at the annual meeting. The candidates for president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. The candidates for director receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected as directors. The president elected in such balloting shall serve as a member of the board as president-elect for the year commencing on the first day of July next following his election as president en the first day of July immediately following his year of service on the board as president-elect.

Section 2—The officers and directors, so elected, together with the immediate past president shall constitute the board of directors. Within one week after their election the board of directors-elect shall meet and elect some member of the club to act as sergeant-at-arms.

Section 3—A vacancy in the board of directors or any office shall be filled by action of the remaining members of the board.

Section 4—A vacancy in the position of any officer-elect or director-elect shall be filled by action of the remaining members of the board of directors-elect.

Article II - Board of Directors

The governing body of this club shall be the board of directors consisting of ___members of this club, namely, ___directors elected in accordance with article 1, section 1, of these bylaws, the president, vice-president, president-elect, secretary, treasurer, and the immediate past president.

Article IV - Meetings

Section 1—Annual Meeting, An annual meeting of this club shall be held on the ______ in each year, at which time the election of officers and directors to serve for the ensuing year shall take place. (Annual meeting to be held between 1 July and 31 December.)

Section 3—One-third of the membership shall constitute a quorum at the annual and regular meetings of this club.

Section 4—Regular meetings . of the board shall be held on ______ of each month. Special meetings of the board shall be called by the president, whenever deemed necessary, or upon the request of two (2) members of the board due notice having been given.

Section 5—A majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum of the board.
