NEWS FROM ROTARY INTERNATIONAL



ENDOWMENT RECEIVES BEQUEST FROM KENTUCKY ROTARIAN'S ESTATE

The Rotary Foundation's permanent endowment funds has received a bequest of more than a half million dollars from the estate of a Kentucky Rotarian. E. Randall Allen was the retired vice president and co-owner of Dolfinger's, Inc., a prominent Louisville retailer specializing in fine china, crystal and silverware. He

died March 21, 1992, at age 84, not long after the death of his, Virginia. The couple had no children.

The Rotary Foundation's Endowment for World Understanding and Peace is one of three benevolences benefitting from Mr. Allen's estate. Others are the Cancer Fund and the Salvation Army. The Foundation's share of the estate was received in two installments—\$75,000 within the year after his death and \$466 recently received on final settlement of the estate.

CALIFORNIA ROTARIANS GIVE YOUNGSTERS PICK OF THE PATCH AT HALLOWEEN

Appealing to one of the most anticipated October activities among young children, the Rotary Club of Santee-Lakeside, California for four years has been providing pumpkins for elementary school students the week before Halloween. Rather than simply passing out the jack-o'-lanterns to be, the Rotarians leave the choice up to the children. They purchase 300 pumpkins from a Nurseryland store in San Diego and set up a patch--complete with rented bales of strawoutside a school in either Santee or Lakeside. Throughout the day, classrooms of kindergartners and first and second graders come out and look for a pumpkin to take home. The only rule is that the youngsters must be able to carry their finds out of the patch themselves.

PRESIDENTIAL CITATION FOR COMMUNITY CONCERNS CHALLENGE

A Presidential challenge has been issued for Rotary clubs to use the personal efforts of their members as a way to serve and address the needs of their community. Clubs will receive a Presidential Citation based on the number of their accomplishments within each of the Four Avenues of Service as outlined below. More than a competition, this is a challenge for your Rotary club members to attain unprecedented achievements in the Four Avenues of Service and to demonstrate your commitment to improving the world around you.

CRITERIA AND DEADLINES

To participate, first locate your club size on the chart below. The chart will tell you how many accomplishments your club must have within each avenue of Service. Next, review the menu of activities under each Avenue of Service. Select the ones your club can accomplish and set them as goals. Emphasize to your club the importance of personal involvement in meeting those goals. Your club must meet these goals between July a 1994 and April 1 1995.

Once these goals have been met within the time frame, your District Governor must certify your club size and which activities your club has accomplished, and send them to the RI President by April 1, 1995. Those clubs that qualify for the award will then receive a certificate signed by the RI President.

CLUE

Provide a subscription of your region's official Rotary magazine to a local school, university or library.

Write a history of your club and its role in the community which can be given to local libraries, newspapers, schools, etc.

Have a net membership gain of at least 10% in the first six months of the Rotary year.

Sponsor a new club. Conduct at least two Rotary information programs for all club members (club forum, roundtable, etc.)

Have 10% of members register at District Conference.

Have at least one member of the club registered to attend the RI Convention in Nice, France.

Have the incoming president, secretary and treasurer attend the District Assembly.

Improve your club's attendance percentage by 5% in the first 6 months of the Rotary year.

Increase the number of classifications by three.

Host the District Conference. Have incoming club officers attend a Rotary Foundation meeting. COMMUNITY

Sponsor or participate in a literacy project.

Sponsor a project which addresses the needs of the aging or disabled.

Organize an Interact/Rotaract or Rotary Volunteer Corp.

Sponsor or participate in a drug abuse prevention project.

Sponsor or participate in a local program of immunization of disease prevention for children in your community.

Sponsor or participate in a Preserve Planet Earth project.

Sponsor or participate in a project that addresses the needs of the hungry in your community.

Sponsor or participate in a project to counsel and assist homeless youth.

Establish a registry of clubvolunteers who can be called upon to serve in community service projects.

Involve the local media to help promote one of the club's international or local community service projects.

VOCATIONAL

Sponsor or participate in a career development project for youth or an innovative project dealing with youth unemployment.

Conduct a "stay in school" project in your community.

Sponsor or participate in a career development project for the disabled Sponsor or participate in a skills retraining program.

Sponsor or participate in a project to counsel persons in the over 40 age group and assist them in finding new employment.

Distribute the 4-Way Test to local schools.

Sponsor or participate in a local literacy project for those in the workplace.

Recognize one of more community members for his/her achievement within his/her vocation.

Distribute the "Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions" to all club members.

Provide district Vocational Service chairman with a registry of club members' vocation for placing volunteers.

INTERNATIONAL

Hold a community fundraising event to benefit the Rotary Foundation.

Have at least one club member become a Foundation benefactor.

Support a project registered with the World Community Service Projects Exchange.

Serve as a volunteer on a World Community Service project.

Host or have a club member serve as a counselor for a Youth Exchange student.

Register one of your club's projects on the Rotary Volunteers International Site/Volunteer List (only if needs assistance from abroad).

Participate in an international donated goods project or request goods or services through the Donations in Kind Information Network.

Sponsor a Rotary
Recreational and Vocational
Fellowship (formerly called World
Fellowship Activities) event in your
community in conjunction with a
Fellowship.

Invite the community to learn more about Rotary's international involvement by hosting an informational fair featuring the international projects with which your club has been involved.

Attain 100% Paul Harris sustaining members in your club.

In reviewing the menus, you may discover that your club is already eligible for a Presidential Citation. All that remains to do is to submit the evidence of your accomplishment to District Governor George Cashman by April 15, 1995 so that he, in turn, can submit his data to RI.
