A Special Message On Membership Growth

From R.I. President Herb Brown

Perhaps the single most effective way that club presidents can strenghten Rotary's ability to do good in the world is by increasing club membership. In addition to infusing your club with fresh ideas, energy and enthusiasm, new members can help you to broaden your service base, expanding the number or scope of the projects you undertake. During my year as president of R.I., I want to stress the importance of membership growth and strongly encourage all clubs and districts to increase their numbers. To foster the accomplishment of this goal, I am initiating the following incentive programs for 1995-96:

- ◆ The <u>Presidential Club Citation for Integrity</u>, <u>Love and Peace</u>, which includes a challenge for individual club net membership growth. See the 1995-96 Presidential Citation brochure (PA 2-900IA and IB-EN) for details.
- ♦ The <u>Two New Member Program</u>, which will recognize individual Rotarians who recruit two or more new members. These Rotarians will receive a certificate or recognition after their club president verified the new member and gain with an RI representative.
- The <u>Calgary Challenge</u>, a special program that will recognize those districts and clubs that achieve the highest net gains in membership between 1 July 1995 and 1 January 1996.

Pan Mooers Appointed To International Leadership

Evanston, Illinois, USA — Attorney Daniel W. Mooers, of South Portland, Maine, has been appointed as the chairman of the executive committee of Rotary International (RI). Incoming President Herbert G. Brown, of Clearwater, Florida, announced the appointment during Rotary's annual convention in Nice, France. More than 35,000 Rotarians and guests were in attendance.

His one-year term as chairman, starting July 1st, will complete two years' service on the 19 member RI board. Dan will direct the executive committee's administrative decisions on behalf of the board which develops policies and priorities for the global network of 27,000 Rotary clubs in 151 countries and 34 geographical regions.

Dan is a founding sponsor of the American Civil Justice Foundation and has worked with the local Urban Renewal Authority and Civil Service commission. Currently a director of the Samantha Smith Foundation, he has also served on the Board of Visitors for the Maine Men's Correctional Center and as a director for the local chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. He was incorporator, founding

director and clerk of the Susan B. Curtis

Mooers is a member of the American, Maine and Cumberland County Bar Associations; the American and Maine Trial Lawyers' Associations; the American Judicature Society; and the Panel of Arbitrators of the American Arbitrator Association.

Born in Maine, Mooers received his degree in government and public administration from American University in Washington, D.C., and earned his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Maine School of Law. His post graduate work has been conducted at the University of Southern Maine and Harvard Law School.

Prior to becoming a RI Director, Dan served on RI committees as an International Assembly instructor, Rotary information counselor, regional coordinator for the Rotary Foundation and district governor. A Rotarian since 1970, Dan is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of South Portland-Cape Elizabeth. He is recipient of the Rotary foundation Citation for Meritorious Service.

- Clubs set their own goals for membership growth. In consultation with your district governornominee, determine how much you can increase your club's membership between 1 July 1995 and 1 January 1996.
- Governors-nominee report club goals to the president-elect before the Nice Convention.
- At a special presentation on membership growth during the convention, I will announce the worldwide goal for growth based on the goals set by all clubs.
- District governors work with club presidents to plan growth strategies during the official visit. Your governor will bring several tools to help you promote membership growth, including a classification survey through which you can identify open classifications in your club, a five-year history of your club's membership growth, and a copy of "What Can Your Club Do To Increase Membership Today?" which offers tangible steps clubs can take to bring in new members. Pay special attention to the Five For One Plan, which involves dividing your membership into groups of five, with each group being responsible for bringing one new member.
- Winners will be based on figures in the semiannual reports. These forms must be received by the RI Secretariat no later than 23 February 1996. Reports received after that date will not be used to ascertain the winners.
- Fifty districts will be winners. In late March, RI staff will calculate the figures for all districts worldwide to determine which ones have achieved the highest percentage net gain in membership. There will be at least one winning district from each zone, and the district with the largest net gain will be the overall world winner. In the case of a tie, a drawing will be held to select the champion.

- Two top clubs will be selected from each winning district. To keep the competition more evenly matched, the clubs will be divided into two categories: clubs with fewer than 50 members and clubs with 51 members or more. Each of the winning governors will then determine which club in the district has achieved the largest net member gain for each category. In the event of a tie, the governor will hold a drawing to select a winner.
- Winning clubs and districts will receive handsome commemorative statuettes. At the Calgary Convention, I will invite the presidents and governors of those clubs and districts to join me on stage for special recognition.
- Grand winners will attend the Calgary Convention at RI expense. The governor from the district that is named overall world winner will be invited to bring his or her spouse and the presidents of the winning clubs and their spouses to the Calgary Convention at RI's expense. The grand winners will receive special recognition on stage.

DG Nomination Dealine

The deadline for receiving nominations from clubs for candidates for District Governor 1997-1998 and a member of the Budget and Finance Committee from Division C (Cumberland, Sagadahoc and Lincoln counties in Maine) 1996-1999 has been extended as announced by DG George Cashman in June, 1995. The extended deadline is August 5, 1995. Please submit the resolution adopted by your Board of Directors and Club membership to DG George Rice prior to August 5.
