News And Notes Around District 7780

April arrives in a busy District #7780, with spring greeted by every club with news of scholarships and awards, gardens and clean-ups, golf tournaments and...

The Sanford-Springvale club held a recent meeting at the regional Vocational Center, and reports of its students, the programs, and the club's support the were center enthusiastic. The club begins April with a session billed as "S-S Rotary Presents The Facts -All that you ever wanted to know about Rotary but were afraid to ask". We admit to being just a little hesitant to ask about this event, since it is on April Fool's Day... but are hoping that a description shows up in the Twin Town Reporter to elaborate. At the end of the month, on April 30th, club members will gather for a pot luck dinner. And in between, planning is underway for both the golf tournament in June, and the Year 2000 club calendar.

The Kennebunk Portside club continued its partnership with a club in Sao Paulo, Brazil when three club members traveled there in January on a Discovery Grant to see and assess needs. One of the trip highlights was seeing young cerebral palsy patients making use of all the physical therapy equipment the Portside club had purchased for the local clinic in 1997 as part of its first project there. The travelers reported to their club and the district that the gratitude of doctors and parents there, the kids courageously working at their therapy, and the sight of the Rotary emblem on the wall of the clinic left them all speechless with chills and tears of joy. The South Berwick club was awarded a Discovery Grant and was expecting to travel to Cozumel Mexico in March. The club is also leading the way in its part of the district to host a Friends Forever group in the fall, and the Sanford - Springvale club will be assisting the effort.

The Yarmouth club joined So. Elizabeth Portland/Cape in March for a Bowl-A-Thon fund-raiser for the Alternatives' program... The Royal River Rotarian reports Yarmouth club went from winning "Most Gutter Balls" last year to "Best Bowlers" this time out. The club also is planning a Barbershop Chorus event on May 22nd to raise funds for club singing lessons... okay, okay... funds will actually go the school music programs. And rakes, axes and brooms come out in force for annual neighborhood the cleanup project in May.

The Freeport club hosted a joint meeting with Yarmouth in March, and both clubs are working together to organize a "Close To The Coast" road race on June 12th.

The York club teamed up with their friends in Kennebunk to present the March 6th CPR training courses. Plans are underway for York's annual spring dinner dance.

The Fryeburg club finished up its flag project - the flags are flying! They've also started a Junior Achievement program in the local schools, and three boxes of books were donated for an international club project in Singapore. And a special Charter Night event is tentatively set for April 9th.

The Westbrook-Gorham club finished up its Fruit Sale in March, and held a collection for children's shoes for their club project to benefit a Latvian orphanage.

The Boothbay Harbor club's Rotary Star reported on a successful Valentine's dinner held by the club, and on a joint meeting in March with the local Lion's Club. Club members were busy in March with a blood drive and then their annual Rotary Basketball Tournament, duties ranging from game-timers baked-goods fruit and Vocational suppliers. TAKEN FROM THE MAINE SUNDAY TELEGRAM

MARCH 14, 1999

Q. I read that the eradication of polio is expected by next year. I always understood that Rotary Clubs were involved in this worldwide effort, but that wasn't mentioned. Can you explain Rotary's role?

A. Much of the impetus and money that has gone into quashing polio did indeed come from Evanston, Ill. based Rotary International. Polio vaccines developed in the United States in the 1950's and early 60's virtually rid the US and Western Europe of the disease by the 1970's. But only 5% of all Third World children were immunized by then, and polio continued to cut down millions. In the 1980's, a coalition of International agencies launched a plan to finally make the vaccines available to all children.

And that's where Rotary International came into the picture. In 1988, as the plan to destroy polio came together, Rotary raised \$400,000,000 to help it along. The Rotary money-which bought vaccines to immunize more than a billion children-has been a handy stick that Rotary has used to keep squabbling at a minimum among agencies, governments and experts as they struggle toward the goal. So Rotary indeed did play a major role, and a crucial one, to bring an end to the deadly virus.

DISTRICT RYLA CONFERENCE

On Sunday, March 27, 1999, eighty-plus Interactors, Rotarians and high school Faculty advisors, along with PRID Dan Mooers, DG Bill Skinner, PDG George Cashman, PDG Marie Williams, DGN Mike McGovern District 7739 DGN Chris Fraser, and ADG (1999-2000) Jack Schraeter attended the first District 7780 Interact Conference held at Newburyport High School in Newburyport, Massachusetts.

Interact is a Rotary sponsored service club for teenagers between the ages of 14 and 18 or secondary school aged young men and women. Eleven Rotary Clubs from District 7780 and one from District 7739 were represented at this conference, and other Rotary Clubs in District 7780 and 7739 expressed an interest in finding out more about involvement in the Interact movement.

The conference was designed to highlight and celebrate the accomplishments of the present Interact Clubs in our District and to raise the level of awareness about the enormous potential of Interact for the Rotary Clubs who are currently involved. These two themes were continually reflected in the days events that focused upon opportunities available in the areas of world and community/school service. Seminars were presented by District 7780 Chairs Brenda Thibodeau, World Community Service, Karen Dunfey, International Youth Exchange, Shannon Aldrich, RYLA, as well as NHS Interactors Jenn Parker and Caitlen Kneram, School and Community Service. Participants were able to learn about and discuss on a first hand basis the exciting events that are going on in our world today that directly benefit people on local, district and world wide levels.

General Assemblies presented information about forming and sustaining Interact Clubs, the types of activities that are possible with Interact and the many ways in which District 7780 can become a true Interact District. Participants were able to talk with members of active Interact Clubs, gather information about starting a Club and share expectations for the future with young men and women who are not only the leaders of tomorrow, but are in reality, future Rotarians.

Significant outcomes of this conference included the overwhelming message that this event needs to continue and perhaps even become a joint venture with District 7739, that more District level activities need to be done and that more communication among and between members of Interact Clubs needs to be fostered. DGN Mike has agreed to continue DG Bill's commitment to Interact and to include an "Interact page" in his newsletters.


