

# News And Notes Around District 7780

Throughout April, bulletins all over District #7780 reported on our many district-wide projects - the Camp Sebago and Camp Sunshine projects, the RYLA planning, the Interact Conference, the Group Study Exchange visits - that helped make every club expand the message to 'Follow Your Rotary Dream'. Here are just some of the other goings-on in #7780 clubs:

The Portsmouth Sunrise club has christened its weekly bulletin welcome to The Morning Outlook! Here's a bulletin with a lot to report - March's successful 'Four Way Test' speech contest results, work with the local Junior Achievement program, and plans for the 2nd annual 'Greatest Pizza' contest fundraiser in June. And all District #7780 car lovers take note: the club's newest fundraiser is a "Cruise Night" (that's vintage car cruising, not yachts) that will be held from 6-9pm on the 3rd Sat. of every month 'til October. The kick-off event will be May 22, at NAPA on Rte. 1, with everything from antique cars to classic 50's cruisers show for a good cause.

The Sanford-Springvale club held their "All You Ever Wanted To Know About Rotary" meeting in early April, with topics from membership development to the club budget. Break-out sessions then focused on expectations and project goals, with reports from each group. A redecorating committee will refurbish the Town Club, and a \$5,000 challenge grant was made to get a thermal imaging system for the local fire department.

The **Durham-Great Bay** club, home of DG Bill, has been busy with preparations for the District Conference, from stuffing and addressing 2500 mailings to finalizing event details. But they still had time to help with the Durham Crop Walk For Hunger,

hold a club forum, and on May 8th, they'll be hitting the road - on spring highway trash pick-up duty.

The Yarmouth club is putting final plans in order for its May 22nd Barbershop Chorus benefit for the school music programs. Grants were recently made to both the Royal River Performance Center and for local kids' "Walking Map of Yarmouth".

A Seabrook club team joined volunteers from clubs in Dover, Durham and Hampton to help out for a day at the International Medical Equipment Collaborative in Seabrook, preparing medical supplies for shipment. There is interest in continued weekly sessions at IMEC on Monday mornings and Wed. afternoons. Would your club be interested in this ongoing service project? We know DG Bill would be happy to hear from you!

The Kennebunk club holds a special evening meeting each year for the finale of their Scholarship Certificate fundraiser, with raffles of cash prizes for some lucky participants. The goal for the event, set for May 6th, is \$35,000. Another fundraiser had members preparing and selling lasagna, meatballs and salad at a local Home Show. The club's also finalizing host families for an incoming exchange student for next year.

The **Dover** club ended April with a "Bring A Prospective Member To Lunch" meeting, and reported a big success with its recent blood drive. (These events did *not* happen on the same day, but the phrase "new blood" does seem to spring to mind...) Club members held their spring "Hands-On" work day on May 1st, organized the Rotary Achievers Road Race on May 2nd to benefit the high school track programs, and

planned a baseball outing for mid-June. But the Big Day is May 14th: Happy 75th Anniversary, Dover!

The So. Portland-Cape Elizabeth club had a large contingent helping out at the District Assembly, as their new Rotary year as the Host Club of our incoming DG Mike McGovern approaches. The Two Lights already lists the District Conference 2000 on its weekly club calendar! (Ok, for you other organized types, it's May 18-21,2000.) And all members have been encouraged to attend this spring's conference to prepare for the big year ahead. A nice feature in the Two Lights is the column on Rotary history, ranging from profiles of the club's Charter Members to general Rotary information.

One of the spring projects of the **Kennebunk Portside** club is the installation of a flagpole for the local public library. In addition to the club's educational grants, scholarships for several students to attend a YMCA camp have been organized. A video made by the club's Brazil Discovery Grant team brought several possible projects alive for club members at a recent meeting.

The **Portland** club wrapped up its Social Auction with over \$25,000 raised, and, like many other clubs, is in the process of updating its roster. One member is taking charge of updating the songbook, tool The club recently presented its annual Youth Service Award, and continues its tradition of distributing extra tickets to events, from sports games to concerts, to area low-income families.

The Damariscotta-Newcastle club celebrates spring with their Vidalia Onion Sale, with delivery set for May 7th. The club's discussions on their mission, projects and resources with

people from the community brought forth an impressive report on public impressions of the club. The most important need for the club (and likely for others as well) was found to be a major, visible community project - it would improve the community but also add to club spirit, make new member development easier, involve local youth and build community support, as well. A Damariscotta-to-Newcastle path system is one project under study.

We hear that a "Traveling Gavel" is moving through the district... according to tradition, the club in possession of it must have three or more of its members visit another club to present it within 30 days to the next club. Last we heard, it had traveled from So. Portland-Cape Elizabeth to Durham-Great Bay, and from there to the Dover club.

The Boothbay Harbor Rotary Star reports on their Vidalia Onion Sale, and on a club assembly to discuss their Scout building project. After a successful Awards Night celebration in late March, the club had scheduled one April meeting as "Clean up The Clubhouse" meeting, with a cookout after all the work was done.

The headline in a recent Exeter Powderhouse read: Hurrah for Hampton! Exeter Rotarians not only enjoyed being honored guests at the Hampton 30th Anniversary celebration, they were even presented with a new gavel... to replace theirs that'd gone missing. Meanwhile, the Exeter club learned that Hampton was using a gavel left behind by the Kiwanis club, and arranged to give Hampton a new one of its own! The special event included remarks from three of the Hampton club's Charter Members, and a history of the high points (and the funny, embarrassing ones) spanning thirty years.

The Exeter club had two well-attended rabies clinics in April, held at the fire station. We hear a few cats narrowly missed receiving dog licenses, one dog arrived on its own from his home several towns away (and was returned to its owner), and amid the two- and four-footed crowd, firemen were sliding down the pole in the background. Folks, it's just not that often that the words "Kafkaesque scenario" come up in Rotary bulletins! The club also started a public speaking award program for high school Juniors, club members giving with presentations about it to 320 students in 8 separate sessions. A great response from students followed, and judges reported remarkable and stimulating speeches from participants.

The Westbrook-Gorham club had a lot of members helping out with the Patriots Day Road Race in mid-April, and have given funds to help the town fire department with an innovative program - a child safety seat training program for firefighters to check for proper installation and usage, and to prevent all too frequent and needless child injuries. And a tip of the hat to Westbrook-Gorham for their unique Rotarian-Of-The-Month awards. With every month and season come projects that need special intensive effort. This just sounds like a great way to say thanks to those who serve well.

The Rochester club held a successful first annual club ski trip for some spring skiing, and in mid-April, had its 3rd annual Bowl-A-Thon. The club continues to work with the local Housing Authority to provide for special needs of residents, and its school Readers program.

The **South Berwick** club held a special award dinner to recognize a local couple for their years of community service, complete with

a "This Is Your Life" program. Judging from the nice press coverage, it was a well-organized and well-deserved award event.

The Saco Bay club held its Spring Fling dance in late April to benefit the Charlie Snow Scholarship Fund, and was set for the gavel to open the annual auction fundraiser on May 2nd. The club anticipates sending more than 25 volunteers to the Camp Sunshine work project later this month - a great effort! And grants went out recently to Little League, Girls Softball, and Senior Baseball. Ah, Spring!

The Brunswick club continues to use their new project action plans to good effect, with 18 committees working on different projects, and virtually all club members actively involved in at least two of the working groups. A major press release about the projects is being sent out to keep the community updated.

Wendy Pieh, state representative and organization development consultant served as facilitator for 20 community leaders on March 3, and did an outstanding job leading the discussion group.

The response was generally quite positive. Some of the favorable perceptions from the group were "they have a dedicated membership", "they are a highly visible group", " they give a lot of scholarships", and "they are supportive of one another in times of need". Some of the more negative perceptions were "their attendance requirements prevents community people from joining", "it's difficult to combine Rotary and do other things", "young people may find ritualistic activities outdated such as the Pledge of Allegiance, singing of America, and the blessing".


