Our ten inbound Youth Exchange students are here and scheduled for their first get together the weekend of September 11-13.


The Russian fishermen arrive September 17.

What We Ought to Do!

Every Club President and every District Governor is told what they ought to do. The advice comes from dub members, from past officers and from folks in the Rotary hierarchy. We also hear from co-workers, from family members and from friends and neighbors. This lifelong experience began even before our births when the doctor suggested to our mothers when we ought to be born.

Some of us thrive on being encouraged what to do. Sometimes we listen and then do whatever we want. At other times, we listen and then heed the advice. Once in a while, we whisper to ourselves, "wish that advice had come last week!"

How should we react when we get "oughted to" several times in a conversation? Are we more polite than we should be, nodding and giving the impression that an idea is good when occasionally our thoughts are otherwise. Is this truly fair to all concerned and does it build goodwill and better friendships? Obviously not, but is it beneficial to all concerned if you frankly tell someone their idea would have been best left to themselves? It is probably better to be non-committal as the idea may grow on you as time moves forward.

How do we react when we hear a great idea? It is best to react quickly not only with words, but also with action.

This is a great time to tell me what we ought to do next year. Note, the term I used was "we". Once committees are appointed and dates are planned, it is not so easy to shift gears. The year is going to be radically different anyway with the new district leadership plan so why shouldn't we try other things that have not been experimented with before? The

sooner the ideas are generated the more likely I will be able to nod affirmatively and react with action.

All of the ideas that come forward will be tested with two questions. Why is this good for Rotary? Do you think Rotarians will welcome the change? Assuming the first two answers are positive, my next questions will be "what can I do to help? And what would you like to do to help?

Already, I have heard suggestions that will be implemented on the program for the District Assembly, the format and content of the District Directory and on where the Rotary Foundation Seminar will be held. Please let me know what we ought to be doing.



The Sanford-Springvale club has sponsored International Week at the YMCA, including a trip tofor 110 kids to a waterpark. The club took its Aug. 20th meeting to the Y to be part of the celebration. SP/CE reported a great turnout for the Aug. 30 road race, and was planning to hold an after-race brunch. The annual Greek Night is coming up Sept. 9th, a special Spouse's night meeting with, we hear, fantastic food.

The Portsmouth club held its "Bring Your Kids To Rotary Day" in a great, noisy mid-August, success. Work continues on planning an ice skating rink, their major community project this year. They're putting their web site to community service use by starting a free Seacoast Artists Registry to promote the arts by making artists more accessible. This year, the club has assigned its newest members topics to present for Rotary Information, with great results - new members get used to speaking to the group, and all of a sudden they know more about a Rotary project or program than many others. A great strategy for welcoming in new members.

The **Durham-Great Bay** club is helping out with the Sept. 12 Fun Run at the Lee Fair, and their club auction is scheduled for Sept. 18th. Their collection of club banners grows steadily as DG Bill makes his official visits around the district!

The **Brunswick** club has been challenged to reach for their club's 100th Paul Harris Fellowship this year. Coming up on Sept. 8th is a Polish Youth Jazz Trio concert. The 2.5 mile bike path for which the club raised \$50,000 is becoming a reality, with a 147 foot bridge spanning Rte. 1 now in place.
