Each added a unique dimension to our gathering. If you missed any one of them, you missed a world-class presentation!

I am extremely proud to announce the clubs that achieved 2001-02 Distinguished Club Recognition, including the Rotary Global Quest goal of net five new members. The criteria this year were especially stringent, so I hope every reader of this newsletter will

make a point of congratulating the Presidents and members of the following clubs: Bath, John Evans; Bethel, Bob Laux; Biddeford-Saco, Keith Jacques, Bridgton-Lake Region, Dick Enright; Brunswick Coastal, Bruce Goodman; Damariscotta-Newcastle, Howard Levitan; Exeter, Allison Field; Falmouth, Aaron Rugh; Freeport, Marg Miglincoio; Kennebunk Portside, Rand Gesing; Portsmouth, Aileen Dugan; Wells, Lee Hansen; and Windham, Ken Spooner.

One of the requirements to attain Distinguished Club Recognition was attendance at the District Conference. The conference this year had the highest reported attendance in nine years, but not all clubs were able to achieve the stipulated level of participation. (As but two examples, both Rochester and Ogunquit had major fund-raisers going on that weekend.) Save for this one attendance requirement, we would have also been able to recognize Rumford, Fryeburg, Saco Bay, Scarborough, Kennebunk, Durham-Great Bay, Rochester, South Berwick, Hampton, Newburyport, and likely a few others I've missed (my apologies) as Citation Clubs.

In truth, every club deserves a citation of one sort or another. Perhaps the most rewarding aspect of serving as District Governor was the opportunity to realize just how much you accomplish. The list is staggering, and I can't enumerate it here, knowing full well how much I would have to omit.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you will see an unofficial Global Quest recap. Please remember it is not about the numbers. It is about the product. Two of our clubs

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doubled in size: Falmouth stressed its newness — it is now challenged to direct its energies; and Scarborough stressed its emphasis on youth — it is now challenged to keep the ball rolling. Others which grew by ten or more include Rochester, which simply decided it was time to ask people to join; Damariscotta-Newcastle, Hampton, and Bath decided they needed to bring in some new, younger members; Exeter decided it was time to "do Rotary" a little differently and have a greater impact; and Newburyport might be forced to find (yet again) new space in which to meet as they continue to fill each available chair.

I am extremely pleased and proud to have had the opportunity to serve as your District Governor. It has been a most rewarding experience, and an experience I will forever treasure. Many, many people helped along

the way: the members of the Rotary Club of Yarmouth, (with special "thank yous" and kudos to District Conference Chair Maura Halkiotis and District Newsletter Editor Holly Holbrook), each and every member of each District Committee, and the entire complement of Past 7780 District Governors. They all have my deepest thanks and gratitude. I would also like to put into print a special thanks to one of our newer Rotarians, Carolyn, who has been an extra-special blessing.


PolioPlus

In 1986, Rotary International's Council on Legislation endorsed leadership's decision to immunize all the children of the world against polio by the centennial celebration in 2005.

From the inception of the PolioPlus program through the end of 2001, the number of polio-endemic countries has decreased from 125 to 10.

At this very moment, some four million children who might have been stricken with polio are playing and enjoying life because they have been immunized.

We have reached almost 99% of the world's children. Our goal is in sight.



Exchange students from Japan, Belgium, Finland, Germany, France, Argentina, Venezuela, Chile, Brazil, and Kyrgyzstan spent a year in District 7780. They arrived shortly before September 11, and demonstrated great courage by staying in this country during such troubled times. Their presence was an inspiration and source of joy to their host families and host clubs.

Group Study Exchange Trip to Quezon City Was a Hot Ticket

Led by retired U.S. Air Force Colonel Dr. Amos Townsend — a member of the Durham-Great Bay Rotary Club — a small team left for the Philippines bright and early on June 1. They arrived in Quezon City at 10:30 p.m. on June 2, and finally got to bed at 2:00 a.m. on June 3. (There is a 12 hour time difference.) The weather was consistent: 90° and 90% humidity every day.

The Philippines is an archipelago of over 3000 islands. Rotary District 3780 — Quezon City — has a larger population than the state of Maine, and more than 90 Rotary clubs. A discouraging statistic is that 40% of families live below the poverty line, which, in the Philippines, is \$80 a month for a family of four.


The team spent a week of their one-month stay in the area of San Fabian, northwest of Manila. They went to Corregidor Island and Santiago (an old Spanish fortress) and toured Clark Air Force Base and a cemetery south of Manila. They stayed with several different families, including the Chairman of the G.S.E.

Visiting the Philippines was an ongoing history lesson, and each fact they learned brought up dozens of new questions. Their experiences were exhilarating and rewarding. Dr. Townsend hopes to be able to return — during December and January!


Coming Up - New Delhi




