From Governor Peter

This is a busy time of the year for Rotary. It is a time when club directors re-examine this year's goals and objectives, while at the same time next year's president is preparing for the upcoming year. This is a good time for all of us to do a little self-evaluation, both on a personal and club level, to ask ourselves as Rotarians, "Who are we and why are we here?"

Many of you have heard me comment about how important it is that we not take Rotary's existence for granted, for without the structure of vibrant and vital clubs none of our many accomplishments would occur. I have focused in the past on some of our local achievements; today's column is about three international opportunities.

One page three of this newsletter you will read that Past Director Dan Mooers will soon travel to China, giving him a unique opportunity to help with a wheelchair project. Please consider how your club can support this project.

Alternatively, you might wish to help with one or both of two projects which came about as a result of last year's Group Study Exchange with eastern Africa. Their team leader, Sudesh Walia, spoke about her club in Kenya. One of their many projects is eye cataract surgery. A person blind in both eyes is eligible for surgery. Only one eye is repaired, but for \$50 US (!) a person's sight is restored. Our District is collecting club donations which should be sent to Dave Moravick, 6 Heather Lane, Biddeford, ME 04005.

The other African project comes from our team leader, Craig Kelleher. He visited a "normal" elementary school in Kenya. Startlingly, this school has no plumbing: the more than 1500 students share 12 open pit latrines. Craig would like to address this problem and see that their sanitation needs are improved. Please consider these three opportunities for international aid as you plan the rest of your Rotary year. Remember "Mankind is Our Business."

District Conference

District Governor Elect's Corner

Our Rotary journey has begun. In January, Glad and I attended the International Assembly in Anaheim, California. It was an unbelievable experience for both of us.

If I thought I knew all about the scope of Rotary International, I was wrong. I cannot possibly explain all that went on out there, but it was exciting to learn as much as I could in one week. Others before us had tried to describe what to expect, but until we saw for ourselves it was just words. It was all and more than they had promised.

The procession of the flags of 203 countries at the opening ceremonics brought tears to our eyes. The parade of Rotarians in their country's costumes was simply breath-taking. When we say "Rotary International" that is exactly what it means: *International*. District Governors Elect from each country were gathered in one room to exchange knowledge and share fellowship. Some barely spoke English and we spoke not a word of any of their languages, but when we were together the language barrier was overcome ... everyone got the message.

I met the District Governor Elect of New Delhi, India, District 3013. We will be partners with them for a Group Study Exchange in Rotary year 2002-2003. A team will be going to New Delhi in January 2003 and their team will be joining us at our District Conference in May 2003. So, Rotarians, we will be looking for a team leader to travel to India. Think about it. This will be a great opportunity to bond a working relationship with another country.

To fulfill Rotary's commitment to eradicate polio from the world by 2005 the Foundation has named PolioPlus as one of the two fund-raising programs for 2002-2003. The goal is to raise \$80M worldwide. There are foundations that will match Rotary's goal dollar for dollar. This could become up to a 5-to-1 ratio. District 7780 has not received its goal at this time, but I will let you know as soon as I am told. By accomplishing our goals we would raise \$430M for the cause of erasing this dread disease from the earth.

Rotary International is going to be 100 years old in 2005. A huge celebration is being planned for the entire year with the finale in Chicago at the Rotary International Convention. During the next three years every club will be asked to participate by committing to a lasting service project in their community, i.e. a park, a garden, a monument, etc. We will be hearing more about the celebration in the near future.

It seems the programs that Rotary International supports are endless, but the projects that are taken on at club level are just as important. As Rotary International's President Elect Bhichai Rattakul says "Rotary works from the bottom up." So keep up the good work at home as well as supporting international aid. We are all asked to do much, but there is much to do, and unless members like you join in the work cannot be accomplished.

I am excited about the future of Rotary and hope I can convey my enthusiasm to you all throughout the coming year.

How Much is Mobility Worth? by Dan Mooers, PRID

Some 100 million of the world's citizens are today deprived of mobility because of warfare, disease, disaster, or advanced age. The wheelchairs they need simply to get across the street — or across the room — are out of reach. But Rotary can help.

In October, 2000, during a goodwill visit to the People's Republic of China, I met with Deng Pufeng, the son of China's late leader Deng Xiaoping, and learned that there is a tremendous need for wheelchairs. In the PRC, Den Pufeng, himself paralyzed and confined to a wheelchair, heads the China Disabled Persons' Federation. He pleaded with the Rotary delegation to assist with wheelchairs and we pledged our support.

In late March I am planning to return to the PRC with RI President Rick King for another goodwill visit and at that time we plan to deliver two containers of wheelchairs, in cooperation with the Wheelchair Foundation. For every \$75.00 donated by a Rotarian or Rotary club, the Wheelchair Foundation will match the donation and provide one wheelchair at the designated location. Mobility for \$150.00!

Can you and your club help with our effort in China? Just \$75 from your club will provide mobility to a disabled person. How many people can you help?

Rotaplast Acquires Many New Friends Through One Rotarian in Wells

The name for the project came to Terry Hodskins in a rare quiet moment: "Wrap A Smile." Now more than two hundred hand-made quilts are ready to go to the smiling infants and toddlers who are the beneficiaries of Rotaplast.

Bridget Burns, a member and Past President of the Wells Club and the District Coordinator for Rotaplast, made a presentation to her club, showing children of South America before and after surgery to correct cleft lips and palates. Terry noticed that the children were swaddled in some stiff looking material, and Bridget explained that it was plastic-backed paper, the sort used in hospitals as undersheets. Terry, an avid quilter, asked if it wouldn't be nicer for the patients to have a comfortable quilt, and how many children are involved in a typical Rotaplast trip? "About ninety," Bridget replied, "but we would only need about twelve quilts, because, of course, we could reuse them." Terry was not taken with that idea at all. "Each child should take a quilt home!" "Not possible," said "Don't say that to a Bridget. redhead," replied Terry. And "Wrap A Smile" was born.

Terry belongs to three quilting groups, Evergreen Quilters in Wells, Shiretown Stitchers in Alfred, and Winding Ways in Dover, NH. She proposed the project to those groups in November, with the caveat that the

quilts would be needed by the end of January. At the next meeting of the Evergreen group (which has about 60 members), Terry was presented with 80 quilts. And that was just the beginning.

14 quilts were completed in a single all-day workshop. After an article about the project appeared in the Portland Press Herald, Terry began hearing from independent quilters offering to contribute. One woman sent her 18 quilts. Another

Maine State Quilting Guild, Cobblestone Quilters, had a holiday party and presented her with six. She has quilts from Internet contacts in Florida, California, and Michigan, and three from a woman in upstate New York who told Terry that she had been a Rotary Exchange Student to the Netherlands, and that she would do

anything she could to help the organization.

A class of second grade students from Hollis, ME, made two, and a Girl Scout troop from the same town made two more. Terry took the message to the Bethel Club and involved two more quilting groups. She is going to speak to the Fryeburg Club, and her contact there said that she already has 22 quilts waiting from a group in Conway. Terry did a make-up at the Four Peaks Club in Fountain Hills, Arizona, and that club is interested in taking up the project. John Uth, President of Rotaplast International, visited the Wells Club and took a sample quilt to the California headquarters. knows where this project may go?

What we do know is that 115 quilts were shipped off in mid-February to Cumana, Venezuela. And we know that Terry has at least 90 more quilts put away, to be sent to the next Rotaplast surgery site, San Salvador. Hats off to Terry Hodskins, who "grabbed her piece of Rotary" (DG Peter's phrase) and whose infectious enthusiasm resulted in a project that has taken off like a rocket.



RI President Rick King has made some significant changes in the program for the convention, insuring that it will be more inclusive, informative, and cost-effective than ever. A special, free Rotary Fellowship Salute will welcome you to the enchanting city of Barcelona, where you can meet the RI Board and Rotary Foundation Trustees and enjoy a variety of local entertainment. There will be a special orientation session for first-time attendees. A plenary session titled "Rotary's Investment in Youth" will be an inspirational highlight of the program.

District Governor Peter, his wife Carolyn, District Governor-Elect Tim Placey and Gladys, and at least six more Rotarians from our District will be attending. The Rotary Club of Pietersburg is extending an invitation to Rotarians and friends to answer the call of Africa and join us in a Classic Safari of Yesteryear — opulent, elegant, exclusive, and exciting — to share in this natural wonder.

To provide you with the opportunity to view the eclipse in a truly private and unique ambience, a luxury tented camp will be specially erected in the world famous Chobe Game Reserve in Northern Botswana on the direct line of the eclipse. The camp will be 5 Star Platinum Class in traditional en-suite Safari Style tents. After adventure-filled days in the truly unspoiled corner of Africa, the safari will transfer to a luxury lodge in another African marvel — the Okavango Delta.

Interact Clubs Offer Valuable Services

Not enough notice has been given in this publication of District 7780's wonderful Interact Clubs. Vibrant and active, continuing to grow in both numbers of clubs and individual participants, conducted with all the enthusiasm a group of motivated teenagers can bring to any enterprise, these clubs improve their communities in many ways.

The Dover Interact Club was organized last year with about 20 students; it will be chartered this coming April with 42 fully active members. The club is committed to community service, and so effective are its projects that the officers of the club were invited to speak at a school board meeting about the subject.

They average a project a week. One day a week a group goes to a pre-school to read to the children and to tutor. Another group (with a Rotarian) goes to a homeless shelter to cook a meal. There is a group which goes to local nursing homes to do projects with Alzheimer's

patients, and the whole club became involved in a quilting project — producing quilts for at-risk teenage girls living in a local shelter.

This club, being service oriented, does not need to raise a great deal of money, but they do hold bake sales and lollipop sales to provide funds for needed materials. They have only written one check, and that one was for a matching grant with another Interact Club and two Rotary Clubs to send medical equipment to Cumana for the Rotaplast trip.

The York High School Interact Club has about 30 members. Their current project is to produce a book for publication. Each member of the club works with four elementary school children to write and illustrate a story. When the project is completed, the book will be offered for sale.

This club has also collected and sent books to schools in Pakistan. The members are participating in a fund-raising walk for Habitat for Humanity in Kennebunk in March.

The Yarmouth Interact Club, like the Dover one, is only two years old, but 40 members strong. Their primary focus this year is to fund and equip a "Joy Cart" for the Maine Children's Cancer Center at Maine Medical Center.

This project, which will give "graduation presents" to patients who have completed what is typically two years of cancer treatment, is being organized in memory of two Yarmouth High School students who died of cancer over the past three years.

The Yarmouth students ran a snowshoveling service last winter and is hosting a Bowl-a-Thon to raise money for the Joy Cart.

These and the other remarkable Interact Clubs in the District give us all good reason to be very, very proud of our teenage members.
