South Berwick Rotary

When two of our club members (Bonnie Richardson and I) went to India for the Polio NID, we stayed with the incoming president of Delhi-West, Ashok Kontoor. We discussed in depth joining forces on a number of projects he will be doing during his year. We have an annual fundraiser in November, which is an auction and wine-tasting, and we would like to associate a good cause for this, so this year's is likely to be called something like "Deli Night for Delhi." We will give a presentation about the projects we will be supporting and our experiences in India and people will know that the funds will go to the various projects, which include:

1) Providing much-needed supplies and repairs to a home for former child-slaves who have been rescued from slavery and are given emotional support, counseling, care and housing, and training to ensure a brighter future for them. This includes mattresses and bedding,

revamping toilet facilities, kitchen facilities, and educational facilities. We call this the "Ashram Kukti Project" and Mark Little (an assistant governor of RI) of Norwich, England is also in a leadership role in this project and we are in contact with him, too, on this project.

2) Helping them establish a vocational center for poverty-stricken and educationally deprived women and children, providing education for children and training for their mothers in crafts, computers, and personal beauty care.

3) Funding various needed items in a center for the handicapped in Delhi (Amar Djoti), which provides services to handicapped children, training for care-givers of the handicapped, and rehabilitation and treatment for the handicapped.

4) Helping them establish a warehouse of disaster kits to be assembled by Rotarians for distribution to the needy in India when a disaster occurs.

After Ashok's year of presidency, he has planned a visit to South Berwick, ME to meet our club and talk about all the great work we will have done together. Mark Little, of the Norwich club, also plans to visit us and present the progress of the Ashram project in October 2004.

A New Look at the 4-Way Test

The Damariscotta-Newcastle club was recently treated to a very special program by students from the Coastal Christian School in Waldoboro, who were competing in a Rotary 4-Way Test speech contest. The students were accompanied by Principal Dennis Light and their English teacher Pam Townsend. This was the first time that a Rotary 4-Way Test speech contest was conducted in Maine.

The Rotary 4-Way Test is one of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics. It was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy. This 24-word test for employees to follow in their business and professional lives became the guide for sales, production, advertising, and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary in 1943, the 4-Way Test has been translated into more than a hundred languages and published in thousands of ways. It asks the following four questions: Of the things we think, say or do: 1. Is it the truth? 2. Is it fair to all concerned? 3. Will it build goodwill and better friendships? 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Three students from Coastal Christian School gave their speeches using the 4-Way Test to apply to special societal problems. All made eloquent presentations, substantiating their personal beliefs. Two of the students, Jason Skidgel and Danielle Armstrong, chose abortion as a topic, both making the case for being pro-life. The third student, Derik Barnes, chose the problem of steroid and drug use in major league baseball, arguing the case for regular testing of all pro ball players.

The results of the contest, judged by Robert Bouchard, Russell Thayer and William Murdock, were as follows:

- First place went to Jason Skidgel, a senior who will be attending Olivet Nazarene University in Illinois, where he will be a double major in radio communications and youth ministry. Jason received the first place trophy and a check for \$250 plus a sheet cake decorated with the Rotary Wheel and an inscription about the 4-Way Test. The cake will be shared with his classmates at school.
- Second place went to Danielle Armstrong, a junior who plans on majoring in psychology and religion in college. Danielle received the second place trophy and a check for \$100.
- Third place went to Derik Barnes who received a trophy and a check for \$75.

Your Club and Literacy in Review

As this is my last article for this Rotary year on Literacy, I feel it is important to review the importance of Literacy and the role your club can and is playing in helping alleviate this worldwide problem.

Why should your club get involved in Literacy?

- An estimated 25% of the adult population is functionally illiterate
- The need for assistance in making our communities or our business workforces more productive
- To assist fellow community members achieve higher goals with their lives
- Remember literacy providers for the most part are grass roots organizations, volunteers with limited resources to carry on this very valuable work
- As Rotarians, our role is to improve life in your community, our country and the world

How can you and your club do this?

- Seek out your local literacy providers to find our their needs of support
- Perform a club analysis to determine how your club should get involved
- Don't be afraid to ask other clubs what they are doing and copying their ideas, such as -
- Donating a book to the local school libraries in your guest speakers name instead of giving the guest speaker a pen or coffee mug
- Providing bookmarks with summer reading lists on them that are distributed by the local schools
- Reading to students at the local schools or libraries
- Mentoring students and adults in the need of assistance
- Produce a Literacy Cookbook as a fund-raiser. Help those with difficulty reading or seeing by encouraging others to buy this book as a donation to these people. This book is geared toward the limited reader and individuals with eyesight impairment.
- Work with your local literacy committee or help start one in your local community in conjunction with the local schools and library
- Get public service announcements on your local radio station or cable TV channel telling people
 where they can go for help
- Put up posters promoting literacy and stating where they can go for help

Keep in mind people that are illiterate are often ashamed to admit it so be sure that they are given the privacy, confidentially and encouragement they need to come forward.

Please keep up all that you are doing to promote literacy in your community, our country and the world as you continue to Lend a Hand and Celebrate Rotary.
