The business world is perpetually encumbered by sports analogies in regards to competition for profit. However, I believe the true value of athletic competition is the development of good character and good sportsmanship. In Rotary we are provided ethical guidelines through the Four Way Test. These simple rules are the basis for promoting good will and encouraging good character and good sportsmanship in our endeavors. As people we strive to promote our ideals and beliefs, and as Rotarians we have the Four Way Test to guide us in that endeavor.

A couple of weeks ago I had the privilege of sitting at the New England Dragway Awards banquet with a fellow racer by the name of Edward "Bud" Mullen and his wife. Bud finished in fourth place for the season but early in the year had been in first place and it looked like he was going to run away the championship. Bud and his red 1934 Ford Coupe have competed for many years and in 2003, he is young enough to have nine grandchildren. It looked like it was Bud's turn to be on the podium. But it was not to be and early season success turned into a series of defeats at the end of the year, which left Bud in fourth place.

What caught my eye the most about Bud this season was his willingness to Lend a Hand to his fellow racers. When my car snapped a throttle cable during a final round, Bud stayed late to help me fix the car to I could drive it two hours home. Bud was always willing to let you borrow a tire gauge, tools, or anything else to help a fellow racer. He would tell us about his wonderful wife or his grandchildren, and he was always the first one to offer a sandwich or a cold drink on a hot day.

When Bud's name was called for the Sportsman of the Year he was completely shocked. He didn't even get up at first as he couldn't believe it was his name that had been called and his wife had to push him out of his chair to go up on stage. Bud's recognition for being part of the racing community in a way that touched so many people and in a manner that exemplifies the ethics of the Four Way Test stands out to me as a highlight of the awards banquet. Sure there were racers that won larger trophies, or more races, but none were more deserving of their award than Bud.

It is what we put into our activities that helps define us as individuals and as a group. During Trish's term as governor, I have been continually amazed at the generosity of Rotarians and people I have met. I urge all of you this upcoming holiday season to dig a little deeper and give what you can back to our communities and to those less fortunate. As Trish is fond of saying, "One of the hidden benefits of helping people is that some of the blessing reflects back on us." For Bud Mullen this is certainly true. As Trisha's husband, I can also verify a high percentage of "blessing" that I have had the privilege of receiving. As a Rotarian, I urge you all to share in this wonderful feeling by continuing to give of your time and resources and encouraging others to do the same.

These efforts will provide a stable foundation for peace and promote international understanding.

"The Foundation offers Rotarians an opportunity to participate in humanitarian and educational projects that make a difference. They can refurbish a school, build a water well, deliver medical supplies, provide vocational training, and immunize a child. The Rotary Foundation allows Rotarians to transform their ideas into action and turn dreams into reality.

"As we approach our centennial in 2005, we can take pride in all that we have accomplished through the Foundation. One of our goals is "Every Rotarian, Every Year." I ask that every Rotarian contribute at least US\$100 every year to the Annual Programs Fund. This will allow us to continue so many worthwhile projects that deserve funding through our grant programs. It is our personal investment in peace, in hope, and in ourselves."

This is a month to really sink our teeth into our Foundation giving, and to find or continue work on Foundation projects in our clubs and districts.

Empowerment through Literacy

November is Foundation month, and hopefully, you have attended one of the Foundation seminars around the district. There, you were asked to give to Our Rotary Foundation and told you how your dollars help the people of the world receive food, job skills, medical assistance, etc. Think of all the good you have done with your outstanding donations to PolioPlus last year! Unfortunately, it is difficult to teach illiterate people the paths to good health, the advantages of family spacing, the way to increase crop yields, proper nutrition for their children and how to earn a living. Without the ability to read, they are denied so much of the knowledge they need. Already in poverty, they often cannot afford to turn their backs on any means of obtaining the necessities of life, even if that includes crime, prostitution, and drugs.

In developed countries, we see the impact of illiteracy in people who become antisocial when they cannot obtain a driver's license or read instructions on machines or labels. They are not promoted at their jobs because they cannot complete the job application nor do the necessary reports that may go along with the promotion. Please take a minute, and think about all the things you read today: your alarm clock; the label on your toothpaste, deodorant; the milk and juice bottles; the morning newspaper; your mail; your ATM/Debit card and the ATM machine, the Dunkin' Donut sign, the road signs, your gas gauge - all before you got to work! Then, when you got home, you looked at your child's school papers, helped them with their homework, prepared dinner, read about today's sports events, checked out the TV guide and read your child a story before they went to bed! What about all the things you had to read at work today! Aren't you fortunate to be able to read! Try to imagine how your life would have been affected if you couldn't have read any of those things.

In Africa, research has shown that women with less than four years' education have on average six children. Those with more than four years education have two. We also know that in Africa, women produce most of the crops. Add in the importance of the mother in the family's health, education and upbringing, and it is easy to see why educating women is so important. Despite this, in many developing countries, the literacy rate for women is appalling! One of the best values for our dollars to Our Rotary Foundation is the education of women. The benefits are long term and flow from generation to generation.

Lend a Hand this year by obtaining a matching grant to help empower the people through literacy in the developing countries and give generously to Our Rotary Foundation so the work of literacy can continue to be done in the years ahead.
