

District Begins Strategic Planning

Process - Bob Laux, Billy Hobbs, Liz Cullen

In May, key Committee Chairs,
Assistant Governors and other District
Leaders began a process of "Strategic
Planning" with an anticipated outcome
of creating "continuity" in leadership
development, as encouraged by
President Elect Carl-Wilhelm
Stenhammar. On two separate
mornings approximately 25 dedicated
Rotarians engaged in active discussion
about planning the next three years of
District-wide efforts.

One of the first outcomes was the development of a "Mission Statement" for the District, which reads:

"Rotary International District 7780 exists to help Rotary Clubs fulfill the "Objects of Rotary". We pledge our commitment to:

Provide a vehicle for open and timely

communication

- Uphold the principles and values of Rotary
- Advance the "Four Avenues of Service"
- Encourage support of The Rotary Foundation
- Promote continuity in leadership development
- Create educational opportunities that increase skills and knowledge of Rotary
- Promote the public image of Rotary in our communities
- Foster local and world community service
- Furnish guidance in the adopted policies of Rotary International"

Future efforts will identify key priority areas and the development of specific goals and objectives for each. Many participants felt the process was quite positive and could have significant implications for the District's future.

Women in Rotary - Cynthia Moran-Laux

August is membership and retention month. In thinking about membership I began reflecting on why I became a Rotarian, what's kept me in Rotary and why I might want to invite someone to join.

I became a member of the Rotary Club of Portsmouth, NH, one of first women admitted back in the late 1980s. I joined for two reasons: first I was asked and secondly I saw an opportunity to quickly learn about my new community. The weekly programs gave me insight, the connections led to other community activities and the Rotary fundraisers added great fellowship.

Although Bob was my spouse and also a member, he was not my sponsor. My sponsor was, Gene Bailey, a wonderful man, Rotarian and a great support during my first years. With Gene's mentoring and assistance from others I quickly discovered that Rotary was the organization for me. My sponsor kept tabs on me, calling if I missed a meeting and encouraging me to participate in club activities. It became clear to me that even in a club of this size, I had made friends and my efforts were appreciated. The club indeed recognized the value of my membership, as a woman and a Rotarian.

In a small community like Bethel, everyone needs to "lend a hand" to make a club work. I didn't join this club to learn about the community, I joined because I had learned the true value of Rotary and the

work Rotarians provide. Addressing the needs of the world, both locally and internationally as well as the fellowship, is why I am proud to be a Rotarian today. I am extremely proud of being affiliated with organizations such as the UN, WHO and UNICEF, just to name a few.

I was thrilled to hear President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammer unveil his goals and theme in Anaheim, CA. He stated "it was time to expand the role of women in Rotary". "I am sending a message to the women in Rotary as well as those who are not yet Rotarians: There is a leading role for you in our organization". He has already announced the appointment of three woman past district governors to positions of importance - Carolyn E. Jones, the first woman ever appointed as a Trustee of the Rotary Foundation; Mary Margaret Fleming, as Chair of the new Public Image Resource Group, and Eileen M. Gentilcore, as Chair of the Literacy Resource Group.

In thinking about membership I encourage all clubs to use the same standard President Carl-Wilhelm has set in identifying new members. Go out and invite someone to a meeting today. Identify a qualified member of your community, invite them to a meeting and ask them to join the greatest service organization in the world. Welcome people of diversity and let them know you are "Proud to be a Rotarian". I am.

District 7780 Second in Zone 31 Giving To The Rotary Foundation – Tim Placey, Foundation Chair

Reports are in — our District did an outstanding job in annual giving to the Rotary Foundation last year! Hats off to all Club Foundation Chairs, District Committee members and Rotarians who have contributed to our extremely valued organization!

Our District goal of \$208,950 was surpassed with an achievement of \$208,980! The three top Clubs in annual giving were Portsmouth with \$32,810, South Portland/Cape-Elizabeth with \$15,105 and Boothbay Harbor with \$10,030! Simply outstanding! The three Clubs with the highest per capita giving were: South Portland/Cape Elizabeth at \$274.64, Yarmouth at \$248.48 and Boothbay Harbor at \$204.69!
