

District 7780, along with 11 other New England Districts, will host **Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar**, President of Rotary International for his only appearance in New England during his term of office. President **Carl-Wilhelm** will be the featured speaker at a "Rotary Club Meeting" on **Wednesday**, **March 8, 2006 being held at the Wyndham Westborough Hotel in Westborough, MA**. A reception with cash bar will be held from 5:00-6:45 PM, followed by dinner and the meeting from 7:00-9:00 PM.

Tickets are extremely limited, based on the number of Rotarians represented in 12 Rotary Districts. Governor Bob requested and was granted 50 tickets for District 7780 offering them first to Club Presidents who serve under **Carl-Wilhelm**, along with Assistant Governors. Tickets that are not reserved by

Club Presidents with be offered to other members of the District Leadership Team, and Past District Governors. A sold out event is certainly anticipated.

The responsibilities incorporated in the role of President of Rotary International are truly amazing. ### "Club Leadership Planning" Will Lead Rotary Into The Next Century of Service - Bob Laux, District Governor

One of the inherent frustrations in Rotary, just like many other volunteer organizations, is the constant change in leadership positions. Just think how difficult it would be to run a company where the CEO changed every year, all regional representatives and branch managers were replaced likewise, every year. And one-half of your Board of Directors changed annually. That is the organizational structure of Rotary and in order to build a strong basis for continuity in leadership at the local Club level things need to change.

A few years ago, the RI's Board of Directors began a process of reviewing how Rotary works administratively at the Club, District and the International level. Most Club Board's are based on the traditional "Avenues of Service" (Vocational, International, Community and Club) plus the primary officers. Although the Avenues of Service

represent what Rotary does, they don't adequately reflect an effect administrative structure that provides effective long-term planning and continuity in leadership.

Over the past year, there has been a quiet transition at the District level moving leadership positions from the traditional to one more reflective of needed change, one that concentrates on five major areas: Membership, Public Relations, Service Projects, The Rotary Foundation and Administration, along with the traditional officers. The change has produced positive results in strategic planning and will be promoted in the coming year to clubs as "Club Leadership Plan".

When you first meet Carolyn Jones her self-confidence and warm personality are readily apparent. She is an accomplished educator and legal professional, graduating from Stanford University with distinction and receiving her law degree from Yale Law School. She was an Assistant Attorney General for the State of Alaska for 23 years before retirement in 1998. Carolyn served as the chair of the Alaska Bar Association from 1988-1998, a member of the Khabarovsk-Alaska Rule of Law Committee from 2002-2004 and on the Alaska Pro Bono Panel from 1990-1998.

Carolyn has received many honors including the Alaska State commission for Human Rights Award for distinguished and dedicated service and the Alaska **Bar Association Distinguished Service** Award. She was named over 149 other nominees as the "Volunteer of the Year" by the Russian Children's Foundation. She is also a published author and her story of her experience as a Rotary volunteer in Russia was included in the 2002 edition of "Chicken Soup For The Volunteers' Soul."

Carolyn joined the Rotary Club of Anchorage East in 1987. Since then she has held many positions at the Club and District level, including District Governor of District 5010. She has been a President's Representative to Districts in Italy, Canada, Slovakia and the USA; International Training Leader, delegate to two Councils of Legislations and served on

a variety of RI and Rotary Foundation committees including vice-chair of the World and Community Service Programs Task Force. Carolyn has received the Service Above Self Award and the Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service Award.

Recognizing her immense contributions President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar recently named Carolyn as the first woman Trustee to the Rotary Foundation. 
