## RI President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar's Message

Rotary International President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar made a pledge to bring Rotary into the next century of service by providing "continuity" and "cooperation". Calling continuity a new wind blowing in Rotary, Stenhammar announced that in the new year Rotary clubs and districts will carry on with the presidential emphases already in place: literacy and water management. Those emphases will include an additional focus of "alleviating hunger and improving the health and well-being of all who are deprived of these essential resources", he said.

The President said that Rotary International will continue to seek and embrace opportunities to cooperate with other organizations in areas of mutual interest. He sited the excellent working relationship achieved through Rotary's successful polio eradication efforts, achieved in concert with the World Health Organization (WHO), the Center for Disease Control (CDC), among others. "We simply will never have the resources available to solve all the problems of the world. We must work cooperatively with others to achieve more."

The President then introduced the 2005-2006 Theme of "Service Above Self" the "the best logo ever created for Rotary International: our trademark, the Rotary wheel". "I am into recycling!" Stenhammar said.

# Your Rotary Foundation At Work! District 7780 Simplified Grants – Lee Patenaude

A District Simplified Grant (DSG) is a tool Rotary districts use to support short-term, humanitarian projects that benefit the community. District 7780 has available \$15,000 for DSGs this Rotary Year. This funding is available based on our District Clubs' active support of the Rotary Foundation in past years and will be spent on worthy local projects in our district.

District 7780 clubs are welcome to submit proposals for projects for consideration by the Governor and the Rotary Foundation Committee. Projects that further this Rotary Year's goals in the areas of local Community Literacy/Education, Clean Water Supplies/ Health and Hunger alleviation or involving citizens with disabilities are especially welcomed. Clubs should actively look at their community needs and propose a project. We are especially interested in proposals from clubs that have not applied for these grants in the past.

The District Simplified Grant Committee (DSGC) will act as the agent to collate and present these proposals.

The following is the DSGC schedule:

- DSGC solicit one-page inquiry proposals from incoming club Pres-Elects on June 30, 2005.
- Inquiry proposals (one page with cost estimate) due to DSGC August 15, 2005

- DSGC advise clubs of finalists August 25, 2005
- Detailed proposals from finalists (to matching grant application level of detail) to DSGC by September, 2005
