

One of the most talked about segments of the recent District Conference were the two "Fireside Chats" held by our District Leadership. The intent was to provide an opportunity for any Rotarian, family member or guest to ask questions about Rotary from Rotarian leaders in the District and our Presidential Representative **Brenda Cressey**. These after-hour events appeared to hit a need.

In recent months our District Leadership, as you know, has been working on a Strategic Plan for the District. What better way to gain input into the direction sought from the membership than to conduct "Fireside Chats" around the District and to talk about the needs, concerns and expectations of District members. So beginning in January, DG Bob, along with Billy Hobbs, DGE, Liz Cullen, DGN, Assistant Governors, Committee Chairs, Resource Group Leaders and others will be

hosting at least four regional events around the District, most likely in the south, north, west and central part of the District. They will be open to all Rotarians who want to know about Rotary and have questions or concerns about District management, Our Rotary Foundation, membership issues, or the District budget. These open forums will serve to assist members in better understanding how Rotary works.

Events will be planned in the early evening, most likely from 5:30-7:00 PM, allowing Rotarians time to join their family or friends for dinner after. "All we really need is a friendly place with a fireplace, good fellowship and conversation to make it work!" sights Governor **Bob**. Watch for notice of a Fireside Chat coming to a neighborhood near you beginning in early January '06, just after the holidays!

"Continuity" And "Cooperation" Key Elements in Club and District Planning - Bob Laux, District Governor

Rotary International President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar's charge this year should have a broad-based impact on the organization, from the leadership of RI, through each Rotary District, right down to the Club level. The introduction of such a simple word like "continuity" brings a challenge to every level of Rotary to begin planning for transition in leadership, service projects and planning efforts. And by challenging us to think in terms of "cooperation" with others, allows each Club to achieve more by partnering with others who might have similar goals in world and community service.

Continuity in leadership at the Club level challenges each Club officer to begin the process of planning for their replacement, identifying emerging leaders within the Club and constantly developing leadership capacity.

"Each job in the Club should have someone in training for that job and everyone in the Club should have a defined responsibility to contribute and make the Club better", sites DG Bob. Continuity comes about by realizing that leadership is not an annual thing for Clubs but a constant and evolving process of keeping a Club on track toward its goals.

Rotary has already demonstrated the concept of cooperation, through its joint efforts with UNICEF, WHO and CDC, in polio eradication around the world. This simple concept can also challenge Clubs to develop joint partnerships with others. By working with groups like your local church, YMCA or Lions Club, Rotarians can expand their scope of community service while providing valuable education and awareness opportunities about our amazing organization, Rotary.

District Simplified Grants – Our Rotary Foundation at Work in Your Community – Tim Placey, Foundation Chair

One of the unique characteristics of "The Annual Giving Program" of the Rotary Foundation is the ability of a District to direct funds under the SHARE program. In any given year the funds a District and its Clubs provide the Foundation are apportioned three years later with a split: 50% to the District under **District Designated Funds (DDF) and 50% to** the World Fund. The World Fund pays for things like Group Study Exchange Teams (GSE), Peace Scholars and 3-H Grants, among other activities of the Foundation. DDF funds are directed back to Districts for utilization in Matching Grants along with 20% going toward "District Simplified **Grants**" (DSG). This year our DSG funds totaled just over \$15,000.

Our District Grants Committee recently

announced the 2005-2006 DSG fund recipients. Although a record breaking 16 Clubs applied, nine were awarded some level of funding. Here are the award recipients and the projects being developed in our communities:

- The Saco Bay Club received \$1,854 for a portable AED machine for rescue units
- The Windham Club received \$1,850 for a pediatric trauma kit for the Sebago Emergency Medical Services Rescue Unit
- The Rochester Club received \$900 to add a reading component to the community first grade safety program
- The Sanford-Springvale Club received \$2,750 for an adult literacy program
- The South Berwick Club received \$2,000 for a literacy project in the elementary school

- The **Brunswick Coastal** Club received \$1,121 toward the purchase of equipment used to assist a health clinic
- The **Kennebunk Portside** Club received \$1,500 for a community health campaign
- The **Bethel** Club received \$2,000 toward a "smile fund" that provides dental work to improve health, employment opportunities and self-confidence.
- The Newburyport Club received \$1,200 toward a "challenge soccer program" involving kids with disabilities.

Many excellent examples of how Rotary Clubs can utilize "Our Rotary Foundation" and the Annual Giving Program in their home communities! Congratulations to all!

of Hampton's delightful Victoria Inn, to raise over \$19,000 for the St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, victims of Hurricane Katrina. Though somewhat small in number, the Rotary Club of Exeter came up with a painless fundraiser to benefit one of the International goals. They average close to \$30 per week and last year they raised enough by this method to fund 2 life changing operations. During a recent meeting of the **Rotary Club of Brunswick Coastal**, a waitress brought a phone and introduced Club President **Mary Tenant**, along with Vice President **Margaret Lonsdale** and Club member **Bruce Goodman**, calling from South Africa. They were visiting their sponsored AIDS hospice, delivering training programs to Community Outreach volunteers, organizing the rebuilding of a crumbling wall at an elementary school and visiting a nursing college, among other things.

In other recent news, **Brunswick Coastal Club** member **John Woollacott**, paired up with **Indrani Dennen**, to ship eight large boxes of stuffed toys to a Rotarian outside of the New Orleans District. This Rotarian just happened to be principal of a local elementary school and offered this insight: "The children in New Orleans must be devastated and could really benefit from something to hug. It also provides us an opportunity to build awareness of Rotary in the Community."

The Rotary Club of **Freeport** hosted its First Annual "Thank You Dinner" for **Public Service Providers on November** 15th. President **Bob Hanson** presided over the white table cloth event as Rotarians both served and cooked for 107 municipal officials, educators and pubic service providers. Maine State Senate leader Beth Edmonds and State Rep David Webster both spoke to the roll in which reeport Rotary plays in serving its community. The event was a smashing success and served not only to thank those who do so much for so little but also to build awareness of Rotary in the Community.

The Rotary Club of **Yarmouth** and the Yarmouth Interact Club volunteered October 28-30 in a state-wide program called "Keep ME Warm". This program sends teams of volunteers to the homes of low-income elderly and citizens with disabilities to assist them in winterizing their homes, hopefully cutting their heating bills and making them more comfortable through the winter months. The Rotary Club of **Brunswick** is participating in this program as well.

The Rotary Club of **Yarmouth** is also

working with the **Rotary Club de la Comercial** of Montevideo, Uruguay (RI
District 4980) on a project related to the
urgent needs of children and adolescents
from one rural area of the country. The
Yarmouth Club is hoping to partner with
other Clubs in the District to raise money

The Rotary Club of **Brunswick** recently featured speaker Keerthi de Silva from Sri Lanka. Keerthi spoke on the devastation that his country is enduring in the aftermath of the Tsunami of last December. Some statistics: 38,000 killed, 22,000 injured and 5,000 missing. Over 1 million people are displaced, meaning 25% of the population was affected, and 25-33% of those are below the poverty line, which consists of \$1 a day. 35,100 homes were destroyed and another 47,500 damaged. 1000 miles of roads and 23 bridges were damaged. 4000 miles of power lines were destroyed. Water problems included damage to delivery pipes and contamination of supplies, mostly through saltwater contamination. 182 schools were damaged and the surviving schools were used as shelters. So education ground to a halt. 15,300 fishing boats were destroyed as were a million nets. And when the industry started to come back, people wouldn't eat the fish out of concerns about the fish coming from the sea that had attacked them.

But the country is beginning to come back. Schools are schools again, as temporary housing has been built. And houses are being rebuilt. Rotary has committed to rebuild 22 schools at a cost of \$12 million in the Duwe Modera area, which will go a long way to continue getting education back on track. And we are working on rebuilding livelihoods. In this ocean side area, fishing is a primary occupation. The **Brunswick** Club has applied for a \$75,000 Rotary Foundation Grant to help in this effort. \$37,500 will go to boats, \$12,500 to working capital and \$25,000 to infrastructure. That is \$75,000 to revive an entire industry. Proof positive that a little bit goes a long way.

Members of the Rotary Club of **Bethel** had a tour Nov. 1 of the Bumpus Mine, located in Albany Township near Bethel. The mine, which was formerly an important source of beryl and feldspar, ceased operations in the 1960s. It now serves as a historical and educational site, with tours provided by the Maine Mineralogy Expedition Company.

Rotarians in **Bethel** also held their biannual "Country Breakfast" at Gould Academy, serving over 270. They were greatly assisted in their work with the local Interact Club, which consists of local Telstar High School and Gould Academy students. Great fellowship, great grubs!
